




CARRICKMINES

JUNE and AUGUST TOURNAMENTS

If the gods were to play croquet, at Carrickmines they would feel quite at home; languishing amid its terraces and hills and peace; sure of a welcome from Mary O'Reilly, the most warm-hearted manager on the circuit

This year one of the gods (in the form of Humphrey Hicks) did in fact descend—amid Sahara dust—on the June tournament, but was so enchanted by the lulling atmosphere that he lost like a lamb to

that bounciest of court jesters, David O'Connor.

Between jokes, David is a terror to Carrickmines. It is four years

since his first tournament there, but only once has he lost a singles match, level or handicap, before the final. In August a 5-bisquer was so scared that, before David's second ball was in play, he had spent four of his bisques already.

David won the Irish Championship in June and the Co. Dublin Championship in August without losing a game in either. In fact, in the County Dublin no one ever got far enough to give him a lift.

His sunny style was a perfect imitation of the weather, if not in August, certainly in that great week in June. Our ten visitors may have brought the most beautiful mackintoshes, but we never saw them. Sunstroke, rather, was the constant threat.

Imagine then the weariness of Mrs. Read and Miss Joly who battled from ten till eight. Miss Joly had the honour, after ten hours, of hitting the peg first in the third game; but as it was a rush (from the boundary) it was also a disaster—and Mrs. Read was the

Mrs. Read was the winner twice again when they met in August in the semi-finals of both draw and process. These two games on successive days lasted five hours each. It was like a performance of Wagner's Ring.

The June tournament cast up for post-mortem two heart-stirring handicap games. E. H. Shelton, of Budleigh, v. Captain Campbell. Campbell's red was already out when he shot yellow for the peg from the north boundary. An excellent shot, absolutely straightbut six inches short. Five minutes later Shelton, now ready to go out, had the pleasure of watching Campbell's yellow on the right track again, but it stopped politely, this time half-a-yard short.

Carrickmines fans didn't blow quite hard enough on this occasion,

but they managed in the end to keep all the silver at home-despite ten visitors in a field of 25. Of these ten, Mrs. MacMillan and Mrs. Puxon came closest to victory.

Mrs. Puxon has a most attractive style, straight from Lloyd-Pratt's purple period, but Myles MacWeeney played far too well for her in the high-bisquers' final. He could even afford the luxury of missing the peg from two inches.

Mrs. MacMillan was the heroine of the other great handicap struggle. She pegged out Mrs. Read just before lunchtime, and the drama that followed spoilt one of Mrs. Baird's most delicious lunches, as no spectator worth his salt bothered about food. After various agonies poor Mrs. Read missed the last shot and lost by one.

It was left to Reggie Leonard to beat Mrs. MacMillan in the final. He also won the August handicap after a final with David O'Connor. Reggie is not a neat break-player, but he has one of the loveliest swings in the game—his mallet curving smoothly like the base of an anchor. He puts far more effort into the Carrickmines club than anyone else—weed-killing and rolling and generally making a slave of himself. Everyone is delighted when he wins.

The August tournament was more parochial than the June (only four visitors, alas), but the Doubles saw the debut of a bright young

player from China, Johnny Ang.

It was a remarkable Doubles competition. All results were in single figures. Two nine-year-olds, Nicholas Duff and Mark Strachan (who is Solomonesque in style), played with their fathers. Mark was 71 years younger than one of his opponents.

In the end Reggie Leonard and partner won - Reggie's third doubles win in the last four Carrickmines tournaments with three different partners. His latest partner is Brendan O'Connor, 17 years old and quite certainly a terror-to-be.

Some day the Irish final may be a brotherly affair-O'Connor v. O'Connor - or paterno-filial - Strachan v. Strachan. What a pity Douglas, after five wins in a row, wasn't able to defend his Irish title. But we can look forward to years of rivalry between these two latter-day Irish maestros—David and Douglas—the one bubbling with brilliance, the other calm and controlled like a surgeon.

NOTTINGHAM

AUGUST 19th-24th

A full programme, a good entry, quite exceptional kindness and intelligent management combined to make this a memorable week Faced with 136 matches and only seven courts (two of which had to be given up by 6 p.m.) some managers would have cried "non possum" at the outset, but Gerald Birch managed his lawns so well that on several days he averaged four matches per court-no mean feat with two wet days and two with temperatures in the eighties.

Of the 14 young men, ten came through to the finals, the standard being so level that it was hard to predict the winners. The local tip was Taylor, a quick, effervescent player, but, playing five games on the Friday, he was knocked out of the Opens by Hopewell and Col. Prichard. The next day he lost his Robin Hood Gold Cup

to Nicholls, a sturdy fighter who is steadily improving.

Another natural player was Hands who won both Draw and Process. He addresses his ball with no practice strokes, almost no aiming, his body quite motionlesss during swing and stroke, and his hitting in is quite phenomenal. and when the peg that he construct the peg that he construct a straight and tried to triple his way through the "X" (succeeding once against Mrs. Cork) but he overreached himself in the final and fell to Col. Prichard who was playing with accuracy and economy of effort in his fifth match of the day. Last year's winner-also the back-marker-Lloyd-Pratt, was sadly misssed.

No woman reached the finals though Miss E. C. Brumpton (in spite of all her club duties) was still in three events on Friday. She, with Haworth, won two rounds of Doubles in dramatic close finishes while Robinson and Mrs. Rolfe also gave good value to the spectators, giving the eventual winners, Col. Prichard and William, their hardest match. William was a consistent junior partner, always getting his ball to penultimate in the early stages. In the Final, Hands and Elmes were only given the innings once and were seldom allowed a free shot, a mark of respect to these two fine shots.

The final of the Over 5 bisquers was of a very high standard. Hemsted has a golfer-like slouch stance and played most accurately, as indeed he had to, to beat the holder, Wheeler.

The "Y" final was the last on court and a real cliff-hanger it was. Haworth, who seemed never to have been off the courts all week, and Colin Prichard hit 13 of their last 15 long shots. But it was Colin's lucky day and it was Haworth who missed the last one to lose by two.

That the locals were less successful than the visitors was a tribute to the unselfish way they worked for our benefit. The rightly famous Nottingham lunches and teas demand unstinted effort and their flexibility contributed to the smooth running of this happy tournament.

Generous hoops and tenacious lawns made for continuous breaks and undrawn-out games: together with genial weather Hunstanton was at its best. Results speak for themselves, but pride of place must go to the new Norfolk Champion (who incidentally won also his first silver medal). It had seemed earlier in the week that Lloyd Pratt and Hopewell would share all honours between them. The Draw results reflected this foreseeable pattern but in the Process the inconsistencies of the game were demonstrated. REPORTS ON EIGHTS WEEK

THE PRESIDENT'S CUP

SEPTEMBER 9th-13th

That Croquet is now a Young Man's Game has ceased to be a paradox and become a truism which this year's Eight goes only to confirm. One wonders whether there was ever an entry in this event in which there was only a single player of 60 and another in his forties, with at least three, one believes, in their twenties. It may be a surprise to some of our readers to learn that this leaning towards youth in our Masters' Tournament represents a reversion to the dozen years before World War I. When Lilias Gower won the "Champion Cup" in 1904 she was not long out of her teens; the Corbally brothers must have been in their twenties when they began to compete in it, and Duff Mathews, Keith Izard and Sweet-Escott were still undergraduates when they first did so; Maxwell Browne was a similar age when he won the event, at his third attempt, in 1911. Between the wars the age level tended to rise, and it was not till 1955 that the first of John Solomon's eight victories heralded the take-over bid of youth, most significantly of all exhibited by John Bolton's win in 1965 while still in his teens.

This year's Eight had an especial interest in view of six of its number being members of one of the strongest Test Teams which our country has ever put in the field. By common consent it would have been even stronger had the winner of the Cup last year been able to accept the invitation to go overseas. But for him "life is real, life is earnest" and the winning peg is not its goal; Keith Wylie did not feel himself justified even in defending the title he won in this tournament last year, for lack of the opportunity to bring his play up to the level which he felt the event demanded. Few, if any, of us will suppose that he would have fallen below it had he decided to "have a go". No "Best Eight" can be quite the best without him.

Had Wylie accepted there would have been only one player competing who was new to the event. This was Roger Bray whose play

this year, crowned by his victory at Hurlingham, carried him into the English team. As it was there were two, the second being Bill Perry, who had come within one turn of reaching the final of the Men's Championship. His qualities as a player are not so well known in London as they are to visitors to Budleigh Salterton, and his arrival in the competition must have given great satisfaction to members of our leading provincial club. By contrast John Solomon's appearance was his 17th consecutive one, bringing his record not far from that of William Longman's 21, which five more years should surely show John as having exceeded. Many of us must have regretted that his traditional rival, Patrick Cotter, with his long record of victories, did not quite manage to "make it" this year.

On Monday - a lovely summer day, so rare this year - John Solomon got off to a flying start, winning all three games with scores in the twenties in a confident manner which seemed to suggest that, as England's new Captain, he must leave no doubt about his claim to the position. Another who appeared hardly less confident at first was Bernard Neal, but he could not resist a resolute challenge in the evening game from Douglas Strachan, now assured of his claim as a team mate. There was a splendid effort by Bill Perry in the same round when, after William Ormerod had got both his clips on the peg while his opponent's were only on the second hoop, Bill pulled the game round so far as to have reached the peg and rover hoop before William hit what might well have been the last shot, at close on 8 p.m.

Solomon won another game by 25 against Strachan on Tuesday morning, but the other three matches in this round were close, yielding victories for Ormerod, Aspinall and Neal. But play in some of these games was rather patchy, as it continued to be in the afternoon, when both Perry and Simon "broke their ducks", the latter, however, with an infinitely patient 26 over Strachan. There were "patches" too in the game between Aspinall and Ormerod, in which at one point four relatively short roquets were missed in succession by both players. But suddenly Aspinall struck a brilliant vein with one of his specialities, a two-ball break from the 5th hoop to the rover. The innings thereupon lost was soon recovered by a fine long shot and Nigel confirmed his status as one of the Big Three of 1968. There were two conclusive victories in the evening to the credit of Roger Bray and Ormerod, the latter achieving the first defeat of his captain by some of the most beautiful play so far seen in the competition, with breaks picked up by a series of strikingly accurate take-offs and long rushes.

Wednesday is always a crucial day in this event, and this year it showed three players drawing ahead of the rest. At lunchtime, with the end of the first series, Aspinall had six games, having lost only to Solomon, who had five, as Ormerod had also. Nobody else was near to these figures, and by the evening Solomon and Ormerod each had seven, Aspinall having lost again to Solomon, and in the evening to Strachan after a terrific finish. Douglas had pegged Nigel out leaving him with a clip on the third hoop while his other ball was for 4 back. Aspinall faced this challenge alike with courage and skill, and only failed of success by a single point. Perry had a good start from Neal, but allowed his opponent to overtake him as fairly certainly he would have done so completely had not the Devonian hit the "last shot" (or something very like it) and by a series of brilliant strokes reached the peg, comfortably wired from Bernard, on a two-ball break. Neal consoled himself later with an enterprising double peel on his opponent's (Bray's) ball, and Solomon in the evening overcame Perry, who had reached 4 back, by an ingenious "quadruple" which though not quite completed left John virtually certain of victory in the next turn. Ormerod reached a score of seven games to tie with Solomon after an easy if rather long-delayed victory over Neal, who was tied with Bray (who beat Simon) in the middle of the table with five games, Strachan and Perry having three and Simon two.

Thursday is the day on which spectators begin to speculate on a triple tie (which somehow never eventuates, though this year it seemed by no means improbable). The situation was a piquant one for the further reason that Solomon's title of "Champion of Champions" might be put in question if it was not he who won the President's Cup. John, however, finding himself in the lead as a result of Aspinall's single-point loss the previous evening, showed not the slightest disposition to let go of it and played a lot of beautiful croquet during the day. But Aspinall revealed no sign either of abandoning the chase and was only one point behind when darkness (rather prematurely) set in. By disposing of Ormerod (who had a bad day) he had eliminated his only other possible rival. The strain on the two leaders seemed to be far more lightly borne than was that on competitors further down; more mistakes were made than had been the case previously, and when Round 12 was completed there were three earlier pegged-down games which were not! Some of these had to be postponed to the following morning. But one of the contestants, Roger Bray, had had a good day with three victories to his credit, and a score of six.

On the last morning both the leaders, between whom the issue seemed to lie, met with defeat-Solomon at the hands of Ormerod as a result of an all-round break of dazzling unorthodoxy, and Aspinall through one by Neal of painstaking accuracy. In each

"contact" was given and the experiment succeeded; is this strategy destined to replace the "triple", of which fewer were seen (except by their leading executant, Solomon) than is usual in this event? Simon, suddenly substituting celerity for deliberation, almost literally ran out a winner to beat Perry, and Bray in a more leisurely game beat Strachan. Now if Aspinall won his last game, as he did, and Solomon lost his, a play-off would result. Neither John nor his opponent Bray were fauitless, but the Champion made fewer and less costly errors than did his adversary. And so England's captain asserted his superiority, as was perhaps but fitting; he had only once been headed throughout the week, and one had then the feeling that he was not going to be again.

In the final table the competitors were grouped into three sections: Solomon (11), Aspinall (10) and Ormerod (9) at the top-Ormerod's third place preserved his remarkable record of never being out of the top half of the competition in any of the eight seasons in which he has taken part in it. Neal and Bray were tied in the middle with seven games each—a creditable score, especially perhaps for Bray whose first appearance in the event it was. Perry (5). Simon (4) and Strachan (3) completed the table. Perry, the veteran of the competition and also a newcomer to the event, made a plucky recovery from a rather unlucky start; Simon had a battle to fight not only with his adversaries but with himself, but never gave in; Strachan was competing in a season in which he had had

few opportunities of first-class play. It would take more space than is available to give any satisfactory impression of the week's play as a whole. The 311/16 hoop clearly remains a more formidable obstacle than the players sometimes seemed to assume, but there was some notably good hoop running, by Perry in a restrained fashion, and by Ormerod and Aspinall in a more forthright manner. The "short lift" for a shot at boundary balls was being hit so often that competitors began to seek alternatives to it; the "contact" method has already been mentioned, and we even saw a revival of the old "cross peg".

The presentation of trophies by Mrs. Rivington and Mrs. Stoker was made the occasion of tributes both to the serene management of Col. Cave and his brilliant series of visual aids to the appreciation of exactly how the competition stood at the end of each round; and to Tom Gray who had brought the lovely courts to a high level of perfection. The weather added much to the enjoyment of the week and the trophies glinted brightly in a final evening of

THE CHAIRMAN'S SALVER

The Chairman's Salver was won by Edgar Jackson with 11 out of 12 games, his only loss being to Patrick Cotter, who was second with 10. Giles Borrett beat Cotter by 4 and when about to beat Jackson failed at the penultimate—that was the difference. Jackson played with great accuracy throughout and gave his opponents little chance, his shooting being extremely good. Cotter after the first day never looked like losing a game and won one with a triple in 29 minutes. Borrett showed excellent form in many of his games but did not maintain his usual consistency. Harold Clemons played well in the first series but lost his touch in the second. He strikes the ball beautifully but is inclined to take dangerous shots. Kitty Sessions, who shot well, did very creditably in winning five games, but Joan Warwick and Richard Rothwell did not produce the good croquet of which they are capable.

It was most regrettable that John Cooper had to retire after six

The competition was most enjoyable-excellent lunches, teas and coffee - and Miss E. C. Brumpton did very well her first time of managing.

THE SURREY CUP

There are scores of suitable players who are eager to play in the Surrey Cup. Yet, this year, the Croquet Association only managed to send seven players to Cheltenham. This broke the rhythm of regular play for the players and made things no easier for the Manager. It must be an avoidable mistake.

Dr. Martin Murray was the outstanding player. He not only won but also played with great enterprise and never missed a chance to go for a triple peel-sometimes successfully. The Surrey Cup is not noted for attacking play so his victory was very pleasing to the spectators. His opponents liked it too.

Colonel Prichard had occasional bouts of hoopitis, but was otherwise his usual steady self. He grumbled a bit about his hitting-in,

but so did his opponents.

Mrs. Rotherham started badly by losing her first four games. She then recaptured her skill at break-making and won four of her last five games. It is possible that some of her losses were due to lawns that did not suit her.

Moore's carefree style of play is popular at Cheltenham. He seemed to be able to hit-or, for that matter, miss-anything, and

the expression on his face was the same whichever.

Colonel Wheeler's erratic play caused him to lose to every other player and also to beat every other player except Mrs. Rotherham. His passion for pegging out his opponent contributed to some of his defeats, but he likes it that way

Martin Bushnell was off form for most of the week, though he played one really good game to beat Colonel Prichard.

Figgis's hoop-running was probably the best in the tournament, but his long shots were consistently unlucky. In one game he found himself playing a break with a steel-shafted mallet for the first time in his life-it was his opponent's mallet. Now, me bhoy, would that ever happen to an Englishman?

The weather was good, the catering was excellent. With Dorothy Daniels at the helm it is not surprising that the Surrey Cup was more than the seven-eighths success that it might have been
