EDITORIAL

This and subsequent issues of the gazette will be printed by Charles Hall of Colchester. Mr. John Lewis of Woodbridge, Suffolk, who is a typographer, has helped us with many of the features of the design of this issue, and we offer him our sincere thanks for his valuable assistance.

This issue is printed by offset lithography and the print is unjustified. John Lewis writes: "There has been a revolution in jobbing printing. Everything used to done by letterpress i.e. from cast metal type and raised surface zinc or magnesium line blocks or copper halftone blocks. Today, the most inexpensive printing you can get is achieved by a combination of an IBM 72 typesetter (very like a typewriter) and simple offset machines using flat surface on which either text or pictures can be photographically transferred.' Justified print is more expensive, since on the IBM 72 the text is first set unjustified and then re-set to get the spacing right. The budget for the gazette is very tight and justified print is substantially more expensive. This and subsequent issues of the gazette will be printed on A4 paper, now a standard size and only slightly different from that formerly used for the gazette. This change will only affect those who have their copies of the gazette bound. Associates may be assured that A4 paper, which is metrically measured, is likely to continue as a standard size for the foreseable future.

While line drawings can be adequately reproduced by offset lithography, photographs cannot and require a different paper and method. To produce four pages of photographs would cost an extra £18, and it is very doubtful whether the present budget can run to this. I think it would be a pity if photographs were totally excluded from the gazette, and I believe that many associates would agree with me. If the gazette is to have justified print and photographs, additional C.A. finances will have to be raised for that purpose. Associates may feel that unjustified print is tolerable. As regards photographs, I think that some form of sponsorship may be the answer. Individuals or groups of people might like to raise the £18 necessary to have four pages of photographs.

The front cover of this issue is a reproduction of a drawing by Mrs. Alison Crane. We are very grateful to her for helping us in this way.

Although the distinction between official and unofficial tournaments has been dropped, it is editorial policy not to include accounts of weekend tournaments or of tournaments where the singles are played as an American tournament in blocks. Apologies are due to those who have written accounts for such tournaments this season. Although it would be possible to include such accounts when and if space were available, I think it is fairer if consistency is aimed at in such matters.

The Editors wish to apologise for the inconvenience caused by the late appearance of this issue, which is due to factors connected with the changeover to new printers and which are unlikely to occur again.

Rover Note

The following incident has been reported to us: A player, after time had been called, took her half-bisque, ran 3-Back (her hoop) the wrong way (i.e. as hoop 4), looked puzzled, but eventually put her clip on hoop 5. Her opponent failed or chose not to notice, and the game ended. To "un-score" four hoops in a turn in which no points may be made and to which the player was not entitled must, surely, be a record of some sort. Can any associate recall a similar incident in handicap play?

A Drawn Game of Croquet

There are only two balls left in the game. Red is a rover ball about 2 yards behind the Rover hoop slightly to one side. The Blue ball is in a good position for the Rover hoop, its

"I have 11/2 bisques in hand, so I must not stick", says Blue, the striker, quietly to himself. He plays firmly, the ball does not touch a wire and comes to rest about 4 yards

"I have only to keep my head and prepare to play a half bisque", says Blue to himself and plays gently. The ball comes to rest about 18 inches short of Red. "A half bisque", says Blue aloud and studies the line of his rush which is

"If I hit the ball slightly on the right side, I could rush it into the jaws of the fifth hoop", says Blue to himself, sensing danger; "This is the one thing I must avoid". Alas, the very thought magnetised the balls and Red went smartly into the jaws of the fifth hoop.

"Oh dear, I must not flap", says Blue to himself ruefully, and immediately begins to flap madly. The result of this flap was to produce in Blue's mind a fixation that he must continue to play his ball towards the peg, and he could only do this by playing both balls through the hoop. Whilst he was shaping up for the stroke, his adversary, an angry and wounded Tiger scowling behind the check fence, piped up, "I want that stroke watched!"

His wound was recently self-inflicted when he had stuck in the Rover hoop with the game at his mercy and had given Blue this last chance. The sound of the Tiger's voice sent a shudder through Blue and his complexion mounted. Even the back of his neck was flushed.

A Referee who had not been watching the game came running to the scene. The Tiger took it upon himself to do

"Blue is a rover and has croqueted Red into the jaws of the fifth hoop", said the Tiger; "He proposes to play it back through the hoop and I want you to watch the stroke in case he makes a crush". No mention was made of the fact that Blue was playing a half bisque. "Is that so?" the Referee asked Blue. Blue nodded his head and just managed to ask meekly "Can you tell me what constitutes a crush?"

"Yes", said the Referee. "You cannot impart a crush to Red, but if your mallet is in contact with Blue when Blue is in contact with the hoop, that would be a fault.'

Blue hastily made a fault. He could not do otherwise. It was a firm little jab stroke. His ball caught a wire and came The Croquet Gazette July 1971

to rest about 3 inches behind the hoop. But the Red ball proceeded towards the peg, tickled it and remained in

Blue looked on aghast. He looked wonderingly at the Referee and said "I've pegged him out". The Referee turned his eyes towards the peg in search of the Red clip. Blue then looked hard at the Tiger and said "I've pegged you out".

The Tiger did not face Blue's eyes. His eyes appeared to be wandering from chair to chair, inside the tent and under the trees which surrounded the Court. Finally his eyes caught Blue's eyes with their steadfast stare.

"You darned idiot", snarled the Tiger, "I'm not out. You are playing a half bisque Turn". Thereupon the most notorious spectator-interruptor who had half risen subsided again into his private portable chair.

"In that case" said the Referee, "you will play your continuation stroke, and, as I am here, I shall watch it".

But a transformation had come over Blue. He did not know how or why, but his instinct unerringly told him that he had won a moral victory over the Tiger, and miraculously his nerve returned.

In the circumstances he played a competent stroke and his ball finished about a yard short of the peg completely stymied by Red. The Referee was still on the Court.

"What happens if I hit the Red ball?" asked Blue.

"It will be pegged out", said the Referee. "What happens if I jump Red and hit the peg?" asked

"It will be your game", said the Referee.

Blue's mind was now working like greased lightning and he added gaily "What happens if I jump and hit peg and ball simultaneously?"

"It will be a drawn game", said the Referee. "Bisque", said Blue in confident tones.

As in the half bisque turn, the very thought magnetised the balls. His ball jumped and had just passed the peak of its arc as it struck Red and peg simultaneously.

A Variant of Golf Croquet

from The Secretary of The Ipswich and District Croquet Club

Our members were very interested to read of the "Cuddesdon Golf", as it closely resembles the game of "Four-Stroke Croquet" which we have played in the Ipswich Club for about seven years.

We used this type of game to interest new players when we were building up the club membership from 1965. At that time I wrote to The Secretary of the C.A. to enquire about possible rules for such a game. As this game was evidently not recognized we forthwith made our own rules, improving as the seasons went on.

This form of Croquet proved to be a very good exercise in the roquet shots and hoop running, and it was quickly learned and enjoyed.

From this we encouraged the game of Golf Croquet, with the tactics of placing balls as well as roqueting and hoop

These two variants help considerably in tackling the finer points in croquet. Both the "Four-Stroke" and Golf Croquet are played by several of our members who are only able to spare a short time for a game, but we are very pleased that a number of our players are now learning the game of croquet and approaching it with interest and ability.

A Drawn Game

I was interested to read Professor Ross' letter as to the possibility of a drawn game. There is, in fact, another method whereby this might occur and it almost happened to the writer in a game at Edgbaston a few years back. Red and black were both for the peg, blue and yellow having already been pegged out. Playing red I took croquet off black and for a reason which now escapes me executed a pass roll shot with very little angle of divergence from about three vards from the peg. The balls were exactly level and immediately adjacent to each other when the black ball struck the peg dead centre. Red in fact missed the peg by a whisker, but it occurred to me at the time that it would have been possible for both balls to have struck the peg simultaneously. Yours faithfully,

I was intrigued by Mr. Alan Ross' article about the drawn game as for a long time I assumed that a draw was an impossibility.

A draw is clearly not a practicality in top circles with all that knowledge and skill. The experts gladly teach us novices lots of things, but there are, per contra, things which the beginners can show the experienced even if it be only the amusing mistake or "how not to do your shots".

I was concerned with some folks, not without talent, whose true bisquage would have been about 30, and saw a game in which Blue and Yellow had, in defiance of partners. pegged themselves out. Black then hit in on Red, lurking foolishly near, and roqueted it to near hoop 1. Taking croquet off it and careless of both direction and strength he caused Red to ricochet off hoop 5, and alas both balls brushed opposite sides of the peg together.

Pegged Out?

The striker is playing Blue which is for the Rover hoop. Blue has made a croquet on Red, a Rover ball, and is about to take croquet from Red midway between the penultimate and the North boundary, nearly but not quite parallel with the final hoops and the peg. He attempts a big roll stroke, trying to get position for the hoop and drive Red towards the South boundary. He makes the Rover hoop in the croquet stroke, but Red hits the peg. Is Red pegged out? One would naturally assume that Red would have hit the peg before Blue had run the hoop. Is that the test? But what happens if Red runs through the penultimate before hitting the peg and thereby loses speed so that Blue runs the hoop before Red hits the peg? And what happens if the two material events happen simultaneously? Or shall we talk of something else, something quite simple, like a drawn

A draw? Why not! The replay is next Friday, Saturday and if necessary Sunday morning.

Professor Ross does not explain how the two balls left in the game reached what I shall call the Diagram position, namely, Red (to play) a Rover ball about two feet from the peg completely stymied by Blue, another Rover, about two inches from the peg. This could easily happen in a variety of ways, but all variations seem to converge to a stereotyped position before both players play their last turn before the Diagram position. One can pick up a game after Yellow has narrowly missed the peg with Red, and then the striker pegs out Yellow. Blue which is the only other ball in the game is for 4-back and has a lift. The striker takes the lift from the South boundary and roquets Red towards 4-back. He makes 4-back off Red but his rush is towards the North boundary. Blue rushes Red to the North boundary, takes off and runs the penultimate, but the best he can do is to get a close position for the hoop slightly to one side. Red now dribbles to the peg hoping to hit it, but comes to rest about two feet away. Blue now plays, runs the hoop but comes to rest about two inches behind the hoop. All that he can do is to play the ball back through the hoop and hope for the best. Blue then comes to rest about two inches from the peg stymying Red. Red would probably try the jump stroke because of the danger of knocking Blue on to the peg. Let us assume, as Professor Ross does, that he hits Blue and then both balls hit the peg simultaneously. This is not a draw. Red cannot make a point after he has made a roquet. To produce a draw in the Diagram position one must assume that, two strokes earlier in the turn, Red, already a Rover, had made a roquet on Blue, another Rover. It does not matter on what part of the court one assumes the roqueted ball to be when it came to rest, one cannot produce the Diagram position outside Wonderland. I gather that many players have tried to apply their ingenuity over this problem. In my view it can be produced in certain far fetched circumstances, but only in certain games and by use of a special expedient within the laws of croquet. For instance, it could never happen in the President's Cup. This is a clue, and if you want to read the ciue aright you should give considerable weight to the phrase "for instance". The most improved player was Roger Wood who was so nearly the Champion. Roger has been playing for less than three years, which lack of experience was obviously the cause of his bad judgement in the last game which lost him the title. He caused the first shock by beating David Cunningham (last year's Runner-Up) in the second round.

Mrs. Jean Jarden had an easy win in her first round singles, playing well with her easy flowing most attractive style. Her next two games were similar. Unfortunately when she had to play Clive Hambley, the holder, the altitude and heat had affected her and she was definitely not playing with her usual precision. Several players were similarly affected and many had gastric upsets.

In the first game of the final Clive Hambley took control right from the start, going to 4-back in a three-ball break. Both players gained and lost the advantage, then Hambley regained control going to 23 - 0. Roger Wood then hit in but failed his hoop, and Hambley went on to win +26. In the second game the fortunes of both players fluctuated, and Hambley gradually moved ahead to lead 12 - 5. Wood then rallied with an excellent seven point break, levelling at twelve all. He kept up the pressure and with the score at nineteen all he hit in and pegged out Hambley's blue ball. Hambley failed his roquet and Wood won +5. The third game started in terrific heat which was soon followed by heavy rain and hail. Despite this Hambley started well to lead 13 - 0. Wood returned to the attack and with a fine eight point break levelled at thirteen all. After much struggling by both players and with the score 24 - 19(Hambley's black ball had been pegged out by Wood) Wood made the decision which cost him the game; he tried his opponent's ball in the hoop, missed and gave his opponent a ball with which to play. Clive Hambley later went on to win the Doubles title with Gilbert Hobbs.

The Men's and Women's Championships ("Caskets") June 14-19

Heavy rain during the preceding days made what apparently had been "unplayable courts" into a reasonable possibility, though perhaps something was still to be desired when play began on Monday morning.

Pat Cotter was the first to finish against Guy Warwick in the Men's, and looked likely to produce some of his old form during the competition. Bill Moore achieved the first break to 4-Back against John Solomon in a game which he all but won. Solomon later peeled through the Rover but made the usually fatal mistake of failing to complete the peg-out. Moore in his turn, being a competent player, pegged out Solomon and looked likely to win until he got hoop-bound after the 5th. Solomon won the match with a triple in the second game.

The draw had not been favourable to the tigers, four of whom were in the top half, and the first match involving them was between William Ormerod and Bill Perry. In the first game Perry pegged out Ormerod, whose other ball was for penultimate, but Ormerod never hit, and Perry was able to struggle round from the 5th and win. The second game was very much a reversal of this with Ormerod pegging out Perry and himself finishing the game from 3-Back. Perry soon had a commanding lead in the final game: he was for peg and penultimate and crosswired his opponent at the peg—a leave of doubtful sagacity since Ormerod was for the 2nd and 3rd, but almost criminal as he left him a double as well. Ormerod hit and finished the game in three more turns, Perry's shooting failing him in his hour of need, though his break play had been most accurate.

Meanwhile Bill Gladstone had achieved an unexpected win against Cotter in the first game, and suddenly all attention was focussed on him as the second game progressed. Cotter's shooting just did not connect, and Gladstone continued a succession of what superior players call "holy rollers" — more accurately than usual in this case — until he came to peg out from 2 yards. He missed with Cotter together and the match was squared. The third game was one of mixed fortunes, but finally Cotter took off short to the peg, missed a split peg-out from 3 yards and missed also with the mallet ball. Gladstone, being for 4-Back and penultimate, kept his nerve and emerged the winner, his opponent having missed three long shots.

Richard Rothwell as Manager had determined that he would get through the advertised programme, and as a result a good many best of three matches were taken in

more than one bite. He was not afraid to put on matches at 5.30, and in order to get through the Doubles and the Du Pre as Draw and Process he had on a number of occasions to interrupt best of three matches after the first or second game in order to get ahead with the Doubles. Not an ideal situation perhaps, but all found it infinitely preferable to not finishing the tournament. As a result, some matches were spread over a longish period, a particular example being that between Hope Rotherham and Jocelyn Sundius-Smith which was played on three successive days. This was consequently a difficult match and one in which fortunes fluctuated a good deal. Jocelyn Sundius-Smith eventually emerged the winner.

In the other half of the Women's Championship a tough battle was fought between Kitty Sessions and Kay Longman. Miss Sessions won the first game, but Mrs. Longman, who has never been known to give up a fight, hit back and squared the match. The third game was very even until Miss Sessions, who hits the ball with such verve and with a mallet which seems to be nearly as big as she is, nosed ahead to emerge the winner.

Most noteworthy of the new entrants in the Women's Championship was Barbara Meachem. She first met Nora Elvey, who was playing rather better than she has been of late, and it is greatly to Mrs.Meachem's credit that she won the match by a close margin. She went on to play Miss Sessions in what must surely have been the match of her life to date. Striding across the court, hitting most things in sight, she was usually in the lead, and Miss Sessions, competent player though she is, must have wondered what else she could do to combat her opponent's activities. There could hardly have been three more closely fought games, and the final game was anybody's right up to the last stroke.

The other semi-final in the Women's was between Joan Warwick and Jocelyn Sundius-Smith. The former champion could not get going in the first game, but the second was much more even. Too many mistakes were made, however, and both players failed to take full advantage of the opportunities that were presented.

Meanwhile in the Men's two more tigers met in the form of Ormerod and Solomon. Ormerod was the first round to 4-Back, but Solomon followed almost immediately and soon finished the game with a triple. In the second game Solomon started another triple but came to grief at the 4th, and Ormerod profited by going to 4-Back. Solomon, however, hit the lift and concluded the match with a double peel.

In the meantime the Mixed Doubles had been progressing steadily. As always with this event, there were a number of couples who were always likely to upset the results that most people thought probable. The most notable of these were the Prichards, Lloyd-Pratt and Mrs.McMillan, and Guy Warwick and Miss Sessions.

As the scores show, there were some close-fought games. Perry and Miss Warwick had a close match with Whittington and Mrs.Rolfe. Perry pegged out Whittington when Miss Warwick was for Rover and Mrs.Rolfe for 4-Back. Each took position for her hoop, Mrs.Rolfe ran 4-Back but missed the shot, and the holders won by 3.

The Prichards met Solomon and Mrs.Sundius-Smith in both lives and gave them a good run for their money, particularly in the Process. Lloyd-Pratt and Mrs.McMillan had a great tussle with Perry and Miss Warwick in the final of the Process. Lloyd-Pratt peeled Miss Warwick but failed to peg her out, and since he had given contact it was relatively simple for Miss Warwick to turn the tables and peg him out. Perry was for 4-Back and Mrs.McMillan for the 3rd, so that the result was a foregone conclusion.

The week was now drawing to its closing stages with the finals being played. Miss Sessions had some difficulty at the beginning of the Women's final against Mrs.Sundius-Smith, but eventually had a great chance when starting with her second ball and arrived at a perfect situation for a triple peel. Alas, she stuck in the 3rd, and not long afterwards Mrs.Sundius-Smith was a game ahead. The second game provided some excitement when a somewhat similar situation developed, this time for a double peel which Miss Sessions was clearly going to attempt; this time the 6th hoop proved a stumbling block. Mrs. Sundius-Smith had reached Rover and peg when Miss Sessions got in with her forward ball and, after some deliberation, pegged her opponent out. Mrs.Sundius-Smith just failed to hit several shots until Miss Sessions' manoeuvrings at 1-Back to avoid giving a lift allowed her to hit in, and with a good roll-up to the Rover Mrs Sundius-Smith became the Women's Champion. Throughout the week she had shown her strength in shooting, hoop-running and long approaches, and these factors combined to make her a formidable opponent.

In the Men's Lloyd-Pratt met Solomon in the semi-final, but was unable to produce the form that we have seen so often in the past. The first game was quickly over with a triple by Solomon. In the second Lloyd-Pratt did a good break to 4-Back which encouraged Solomon to perform another triple and to peg his opponent out. A good deal of wiring followed until Solomon judged it opportune to peg out his forward ball when his other ball was for 1-Back, his opponent being for the 2nd. The two-ball game which followed could have been disastrous for Solomon when Lloyd-Pratt got a break going and got to 2-Back, his opponent being then for 3-Back. Lloyd-Pratt's luck did not hold, and Solomon soon finished the game 3 points ahead. The final of the Men's was between Solomon and

Gladstone, who had had a great tussle with Whittington in the previous round which could well have gone the other way. Gladstone got going first, but was unable to maintain control of the game. Solomon got round with his first ball, and was soon starting the triple he can rarely refuse. The triple proved troublesome, however, and he had to resort to finishing with a straight double, which also failed. He did a backward peel through penultimate, sending the ball just past the peg; a very accurate cannot sent it a yard in front of Royer, and the problem then was whether to attempt a third cannon for the rover-peel. He elected not to try it, made the hoop and did another backward peel, hoping to rush an opponent ball behind his partner for a combination peg-out. This was not to be, however, and the turn ended with another cannon scattering the balls to achieve a standard lift position. (From the point of view of the spectators these manoeuvres were easily the most exciting moments of the week, the final cannon being considered a particularly difficult shot. Solomon was even more impressive here than in the many triples he achieved. Although he generally gave his opponents some opportunities, his victory in the Men's was very well deserved.) To continue the account, Gladstone missed the shot and Solomon was a game up. The second game did not rise to such heights, neither player producing the form he had earlier exhibited. Gladstone started the week, no doubt, with little idea that he would be competing in the final, but he had some good wins and played consistently well throughout the week.

The Mixed Doubles final was a play-off between Perry and Miss Warwick, the winners of the Process, and Solomon and Mrs.Sundius-Smith, the winners of the Draw. Both the men were soon round to 4-Back, but the ladies found things more difficult. It looked for a time as though the new Men's and Women's champions might together pull off this title also as Mrs.Sundius-Smith gradually drew ahead. Miss Warwick, however, was not to be defeated and in a fine break reversed the fortunes of the game by going to the peg. The lift was missed, and Perry was going out with a 2-baller from 4-Back when he stuck in the Rover. The singles champions, however, made only one further point before Perry hit, and the holders deservedly retained their title.

The DuPre produced some interesting battles with the honours being shared in both lives between Moore, Borrett, Hallett, Mrs.Prichard and Guy Warwick. It ended with a play-off between Moore and Borrett in yet another peggedout finish which Moore won by 5 points.

Richard Rothwell is to be congratulated on his firm but friendly management which ensured the completion of the tournament and proved that this programme is a feasible one. He was ably assisted by Giles Borrett.

The Southwick Club rose to the occasion as they always do, sustaining the players with food and drink at all hours of the day and the early ones of the night. Despite the vagaries of the weather it was a tournament that was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

The Peels, Cheltenham, May 10-15

Oh to be at Cheltenham in May for the Peels 1971. Blue skies, green lawns, the Cotswold hills, lilac and laburnum and kindly hosts, not to mention Edgar Jackson managing his first major tournament. With thirty-four entries, the best for a number of years, there was a very full programme which, with the usual problem of the same people being involved in the later stages of several events, looked as if it could not possibly be completed. But, skilfully managed, play went on till well after tea on the Saturday, and "The Peels" and The Golf Croquet Championships were successfully concluded. The extra event, the Open Handicap, could have been finished as far as time was concerned, but the finalists agreed to share the honours and the prize.

On the Monday in the Open Handicap Vulliamy eliminated Bateson, which meant that only one of these fast-improving players could go on in this event. On another court Miss E.H.Arkell (affectionately known as "The Arkle" owing to her speed of play) was round to the peg like lightning against Guy Warwick, but alas was then pegged out and lost an exciting end game by two. This seemed to unnerve her, and although she might very well have been expected to win the Women's Bowl, she lost her form in the Draw and Process and the Doubles and only retained it

for the 'Y'.

Bourke, another fancied candidate for honours, started off with a good win over Mrs. Prichard, followed by a victory over J.A.Wheeler in the Men's Draw. Tyrwhitt-Drake began the Process with a good win over David Prichard, but it turned out to be the Draw in which he went ahead. Gladstone, winner in 1969, extracted 51/2 bisques from Bateson, and looked to be heading for a win when he played with the wrong ball; it was the end of him when he was beaten in the Process by Vulliamy, Meanwhile Meredith went on winning, one of his victories being revenge on Vulliamy, who had won a final against him the previous year. Until 4.30 on Friday afternoon Bourke was undefeated except in the Doubles.

In the Women's Bowl Daisy Lintern electrified everybody with convincing wins against Barbara Chittenden, Joan Warwick, Cecily Brumpton and Hazel Parker until, overcome by her efforts, she retired to Betty Prichard, who had a good lead, when the shades of evening were falling. In the Draw the Misses Brumpton were the finalists, and in the Process Barbara Meachem, the holder, thought not showing her best form reached the Final against Betty Prichard and won rather a dour struggle by three. However, in the play-off against Cecily Brumpton on a court slowed down by rain, which suited Barbara and displeased Cecily, the holder had two very fine breaks to win by 23.

In the Lady Murray Cups for the Doubles the Wheelers, Bateson and Bressey, Jackson and Allardyce established themselves as possible winners. Col.Wheeler in the first and second rounds used the bisques to triple-peel and peg out an opponent ball and win. But against Bateson and Bressey, although the peg-out was achieved, victory was denied. In the first three rounds Jackson and Allardyce played and won like a well-matched pair, but in the Final Bateson and Bressey were just too good for them.

Returning for the moment to the men, on the Thursday Bourke had an exciting game and beat Bateson by 3 to reach the Final of the Process; he also had a notable win over John Wheeler to become Finalist in the Draw. On Friday Bourke succumbed to Tyrwhitt-Drake, which was his first singles defeat of the week, but in the meantime he had reached the Final of the 'X' by beating Meredith, who had also had a good week.

Saturday morning alas produced a very prolonged game in the Final of the Process which took place between Bourke and Vulliamy; the Manager had to stop the game in the interests of the tournament when Vulliamy was well ahead. It will be a pleasure to watch the skilful execution of Vulliamy's shots when he speeds up his game by about 200%, and subjectively he will improve his play by maintaining rhythm. In the play-off it looked as though Vulliamy would defeat Tyrwhitt-Drake, who seemed to be mesmerised by his opponent's deliberation and the first hoop, but having overcome the latter Tyrwhitt-Drake played exceedingly well to win by 8. This was a fine performance for a -11/2 handicap man against three such improving players as Vulliamy, Bourke and Bateson, to each of whom he had to concede several bisques.

It was good to see Kitty Sessions in form, giving so many bisques to so many people, with notable victories over Barbara Meachem (twice), Vulliamy and Edgar Jackson who actually received half a bisque. She was a semi-finalist in the 'X' and in the Women's Draw.

While this was going on, hoarse cries came from various directions to indicate that the Golf Croquet Singles and Doubles were in progress, the eventual winner of the Singles being the redoubtable Vulliamy, and of the Doubles John Wheeler and Liz Neal.

The Manager would even have completed a 'Z' event, but the Finalists preferred to watch the other Finals rather than play in the rain on a distant court.

- 1. The Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting were taken as read.
- 2. The President, opening the meeting, spoke of a number of prominent Associates who had died during the year, including Sir Francis Barry (Claude Barry), Mrs.E.M.Bramwell, D.T.Figgis, Donald Himmens, Mrs. H.C.S.Perry, Mrs.R.Tingey, Miss Ivy Wainwright, Leslie Webb and R.V.N.Wiggins.

He also drew attention to the re-instatement in the Calendar of the Inter-Club Championship, and to the prospect of the visit of teams from Australia and New Zealand to play a series of Test Matches in 1973 or 1974.

3. REPORTS

(a) The Chairman of Council, enlarging upon his Report, which had been published in the Spring issue of the Croquet Gazette, mentioned the results already achieved by the Development Scheme, including demonstrations held at Maidenhead, Wellingborough and Birmingham, new clubs formed at Maidenhead, St. Albans and Wolverhampton, accession of new playing members to Leamington and Edgbaston Clubs, and coaching courses started at Southwick. He also announced that croquet equipment was being acquired for loan to newlyforming clubs.

(b) The Treasurer presented the Accounts (published in the Spring issue of the gazette) and explained the deficit on Income and Expenditure Account, which was mainly due to the failure to keep the publication costs of the Croquet Gazette within the sum budgeted.

These Reports were adopted by the Meeting.

4. ELECTION OF TREASURER

A.J.Oldham presented himself for re-election as Honorary Treasurer and was re-elected by acclamation.

5. ELECTIONS TO COUNCIL

- (a) Seven of the eight members of the Council who retured by rotation had presented themselves for re-election and two other Associates had been duly nominated. As there were nine candidates for eight places a postal ballot had been held. Miss Duthie and Mrs.Skempton had counted the votes. Mrs.Skempton reported the result.
- (b) Those elected were the seven retiring members (D.C.Caporn, Rev.W.E.Gladstone, Miss D.A.Lintern, Judge A.D.Karmel, Lt.-Col.D.M.C.Prichard, E.A.Roper, Dr.W.R.D.Wiggins) and Mrs.J.B.Meachem.
- (c) The two ladies who counted the votes were thanked for their services.
- (d) Mr.Gerald Williams asked whether it was really necessary to number the voting papers. The secretary explained that he numbered them because the Rules required him to do so, but, in order to ensure the secrecy of the poll, he did not record the number on the voting paper sent to each Associate. The general feeling was that numbering could well be dispensed with, but a decision to that effect could not be taken at the meeting because it involved an alteration in the Rules, and no notice had been given of a motion to do this. Mrs.McMillan gave notice to move such an amendment at the next General Meeting.
- (e) The Secretary had sent voting papers to Life Associates and to Associates resident in the United Kingdom and Ireland who had paid their subscriptions for the current year. To some forty Associates whose subscriptions had not been paid he had sent reminders, promising voting papers by return of post on receiving their subscriptions. The response covered the cost of the election two or three times over; though doubtless a fair proportion of these members would in any case have paid eventually.

6. ELECTION OF AUDITORS

On the proposal of Miss E.J.Warwick, seconded by Rev. W.E.Gladstone, Messrs.Nicholass, Reid, Corney & Co. were re-elected as Auditors.

7. MOTION TO AMEND RULE XIV (a) (ii)

Lt.-Col.Prichard moved the amendment to Rule XIV (a) (ii) of which he had given notice: to add, after the word "Laws" in line 2, the following: ". . . and Regulations for Tournaments". He explained that the purpose was to apply to Regulations for Tournaments the procedure already applying to the Laws of Croquet, for revision by a subcommittee appointed by Council. This procedure avoided the need (involved in the other amendment procedure) for publication in the Croquet Gazette after first adoption by Council, but before ratification by Council. The Laws and Regulations were now being revised by the Laws Committee (appointed by Council as a revising sub-committee) with a view to the publication of a new edition in March 1972, by which time supplies of the existing edition might well be exhausted. If the adoption - publication - ratification procedure had to be applied to that part of the revision

which affected the Regulations, it would probably be impossible to finalise the text in time for the new edition to be published in March, when it would be needed.

Mr.Baillieu seconded the proposal.

Mr.Lloyd-Pratt sought an assurance that any substantive alteration, whether to the Laws or the Regulations, would be reported to Associates by publication in the gazette before ratification by Council. The proposer of the motion said he could not undertake that it would be possible to do this without incurring unacceptable delay in issuing the new edition.

The proposal to amend Rule XIV (a) (ii) was carried by a large majority.

8. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

A. The Next Test Series

- (i) Mr.Solomon said that the next Series, in the United Kingdom would probably be played in 1974. It was not yet known how many members each team would contain, and therefore how many courts and how many days would be required for each Test Match; nor was it known over how many weeks the Series would be spread. These uncertainties made planning difficult. He was assuming, as a basis for planning, that the visiting teams' tour would last from six to nine weeks, and that each Test Match would be played between two teams of six players and would last three days.
- (ii) In view of the Development Scheme, the formation of new Croquet Clubs and the generally increasing interest in Croquet, coupled with the likelihood of a number of spectators coming from Australia, he thought it might well prove possible to attract good audiences for Test Matches, thus bringing financial benefit to the Clubs which hold these Matches. Meanwhile, the possibility is being explored of raising funds by sponsorship.
- (iii) The President remarked that he hoped some members of the two visiting teams would stay on and play in our Open Championships. Mrs.Carlisle suggested that if it was hoped to turn these into World Championships, we ought to approach other countries where croquet is played, such as South Africa. In this connection the Secretary reported that the President of the Rondebosch Club and her husband had already entered for this year's Opens.
- (iv) Mr.Solomon gave warning that the incidence of a number of Test Matches was bound seriously to disrupt the normal Calendar of C.A.Tournaments and Club Tournaments in that year.
- (v) With regard to hospitality, the obligations of the Host State applied only to the visiting teams and their reserves and Managers. Nevertheless, if large numbers of supporters came over by air charter, there might be practical problems when considerable parties attended Matches.

B. The Gazette under New Editorship

Major Rivington congratulated the new Editor on the excellence, in content and appearance, of the Spring issue.

Extract from Proceedings of Council Meeting held on 24 May 1971.

1. ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN AND VICE-CHAIRMAN

2. MOTION BY MR.CAPORN

A motion by Mr.Caporn that a committee should investigate urgently the possibility of providing in

Greater London a minimum of five lawns within an existing sports club, or by the establishment of a new club with such facilities, was withdrawn. It was felt that the development scheme was a means ready to hand for seeking out such facilities.

3. REDRAFT OF LAWS

The Laws Committee was authorized to include in its mandate for re-drafting the Laws the re-drafting of the Regulations for Tournaments.

4. THE FUTURE OF THE STOKER BOWL

The Tournament Committee would be examining this subject and would then report to Council in the autumn.
