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
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

#### 'Guidelines for Handicappers'

from Mr L.Riggall

Sir

It seems that Mr I. Howard Wright misunderstands the effect of raising all handicaps by 2. Taking his example of a 10-bisquer playing a scratch player last year, this year he would be a 12-bisquer playing a 2-bisquer, but under the present system of subtracting the lower handicap from the higher, in practice the higher bisquer will have 10 bisques and his opponent will have none. The change will not affect anybody except 15 and 16 bisquers, who should of course have been raised to 17 and 18.

I do not think the Handicaps Co-ordination Committee can help much, because handicapping is mainly a local problem best handled by the clubs. Although it is important to consider tournament results, after each tournament the tendency is to reduce the handicaps of some winners and to ignore the losers, and this is not enough. It is equally important to adjust the handicap of a tournament player who persistently fails in tournaments, and here the clubs will know best how their members and other local players have fared in tournaments through the season.

There is a perfect solution which has been successful in South Africa. A book is kept in the club-house, and after every game it is the responsibility of the winner to enter the result and the scores in the book. Thus there is a complete record of the progress or deterioration of every player.

Early in the summer, i.e. June in the Northern hemisphere, all handicaps are reviewed automatically and adjusted by the Committee, and they are revised again in the autumn. This does not preclude interim revisions for rapidly improving players where it is necessary. The great value of this system is the fact that every player is treated fairly, nobody is overlooked, and everyone knows that his current handicap is commensurate with his recent form.

#### **Rover Notes**

Fact or Fiction?

Arthur Lillie writes in his book 'Croquet' (1897) that "on Dr Prior's full sized lawn with 3% inch hoops, six hoop setting, Mr Spong one day playing the third stroke in the game got a break and made his ball a rover before the fourth ball had played at all". The skill of Mr Spong is not in dispute; he was thought to be the best ever by the pundits of his era, and it was his third successive win in the Championships (1884) which was said to have been the greased cartridge in the eclipse of croquet. But perhaps because of Lillie's statement a legendary game has arisen which has been attributed to almost every great player

of every era. The first ball goes to the 4th corner. The second

peg. The fourth ball goes out with a triple peel.

ball hits and goes to 4-back. The third ball hits and goes to the

Lord Tollemache attributed such a game to G.L.Reckitt and D.L.G.Joseph, but the latter states quite definitely that the game was merely a product of Tollemache's highly-coloured imagination and that he never took part in such a game. Many matches have ended in the 6th and 7th turns and some no doubt in the 5th, both before and after the introduction of lifts and a contact, but are there authenticated instances — or even one recorded instance — of a match ending with the 4th turn?

#### In a Nutshell

One sentence can paint a whole picture or even condense the story of a life. Winston Churchill wrote: "I married and lived happily ever after". On the court croquet players are models of brevity, even to the point of taciturnity. Towards the end of a game, our gregarious President played a wrong ball and his opponent called out "Wrong ball, Maurice". "That", Mr Reckitt lamented, "is the first remark he has made to me during the whole game." Yet, once a game is over, even the most silent of players can be transformed into an ancient mariner stopping the unwary.

A few years ago a competition was held to find the best word for a croquet raconteur, and among the apt suggestions were 'buttonhooper', 'waffleliar', 'brooking'; the winer was 'Katie' (no reflection intended by adding a feminine name to Aunt Emma) with boron a close second.

#### Golf Croquet in Tenerife

Visitors to Tenerife might like to know that the British Club, Puerto de la Cruz, has enthusiastic golf croquet players. They play with good mallets, Eclipse balls and Jaques hoops on a decent lawn which is more than full size, but divided into 3 long narrow courts. They play the correct rules, with a few minor exceptions, probably intentionally, to speed the game up, and it is run by an engaging Norwegian who has taught them very well.

Bernard and I played there once in the late afternoon, and were made extremely welcome. All three courts were in use, doubles were played, and there were more than enough people waiting to make up another four as soon as a court became free.

The correct formality to play there is to join the club as a temporary member. There is a bar, bridge, bowls and tennis. The cost, we were assured, was not too much to make it worthwhile for a week's stay, though what it was we never discovered, since we somehow blundered in through the back door!

Dr J.E.H.Creed

The death in January of Dr J.E.H.Creed in his 70th year, following a slight stroke from which he had seemed to be recovering, came as a great shock to us all.

John Creed first joined the Reigate Priory Club in 1928 only 3 years after it was founded, and so was by far our oldest member. He was a very sound 8 bisquer, who knew the game well but was unable to give the time to it that he would have liked.

He took his Doctorate of Music in the early thirties, and his life was spent as organist, teacher of music and composer. His marriage in 1960 united two very well known musical families in Reigate.

Modest and innately shy, his devotion to his Church and his pupils was clear for all to see, and he was held in the highest esteem. His other recreation was chess, and he was a leading figure in the local chess club.

We shall all miss very much the familiar figure arriving on his bicycle, and we feel the deepest sympathy for his widow.

#### From the New Zealand Croquet Gazette

A great many triple peels were recorded in the Dominion Championships held at Christchurch this year. A.Anderson and R.Murfitt notched up 6 triples apiece in the Open Championship. Two noteworthy triples were recorded. In one game A.Anderson "made a long angle peel of penultimate to enable him to negotiate the ball into position to peel rover and to peg out". D.Bulloch, playing against K.Woollett, "was obliged to roquet his peeled ball after making rover, making his peg out most hazardous. By sending his partner ball as near the peg as possible in the croquet stroke, he then roqueted an opponent ball, and, with accurate placing, cannoned it on to his ball near the peg to peg it out, an assured victory."

Prince, with perfect judgement, ran the first and second in one turn and played to perfect position at the third. Murfitt failed to make hoop 6. Prince hit in and with precision finished the game with a perfectly played two-ball break,"

The Club has lost two lawns since last year, and the entries were therefore reduced, but the 4 blocks of 7 and 1 block of 8 gave everyone at least 6 Singles games, apart from the knock-out Doubles.

Bill Perry was an obvious winner of Block A, but Block B was wide open until the Saturday morning, when R.S.Stevens clinched it by defeating Guy Warwick. G.B.Horridge won all his games in Block C, as did A.F.Coleman in Block D and C.E.Knight in Block E.

In the play-off for the Godfrey Turner Cup Ray Stevens' 4½ bisques were too many for Bill Perry, but the outcome might have been different if Bill hadn't stuck in the 5th hoop when getting his second ball round. A.F.Coleman, a very impressive new-comer, won the play-off for the J.K.Brown Memorial Cup quite easily against G.B.Horridge and earned himself a reduction in handicap from 11 to 7.

The Doubles went the way of most doubles, some of the games going against form, but with some exciting finishes by 1 on time. The final, between John Cooper & Brigadier Fernyhough and Mrs J.N.Rolfe & A.F.Coleman, was only won by the latter after John Cooper had been pegged out.

It was very sad that the Manager, Ed.Strickland, was taken ill during the week and had to go to hospital for a couple of days. His place was nobly taken by Mrs Prichard and Colonel Cave, who ensured that everything continued to go smoothly. We were pleased to see Mr Strickland back at the Club on Friday afternoon, although he was not able to manage, and we wish him a speedy and complete recovery to full health. At the prize-giving, at which Harold Clemons, a frequent visitor from Tasmania, was asked to do the presentations, he told us about the members of the Australian Test Team. All praise, as usual, to the coffee ladies and those responsible for the excellent lunches and teas in the Club House. The new groundsman, whom everyone calls "Tubby", is to be congratulated on his work on the lawns, which show a great improvement since last August.

#### The Peel Memorials: May 6-11

The Peels 1974 began with ten lovely lawns, ten adorable women (Draw and Process), ten gallant men (Draw and Process), and ten acceptable Doubles pairs, plus the usual Open Handicap. What could be more simple, despite the Process pattern producing two byes which had to await an opponent? The Tournament could end on Thursday, except for Extras, which, though very desirable, are dull after the real thing.

So, in accordance with the Regulations, the Manager chanced his arm and decreed Draw and Process for the Doubles, and the "fun and games" began. Lots of fun, and lots of games (almost too many) for lots of people, though there were still the two or three less fortunate ones with only six or seven games. There were many close and exciting games, the closeness at any rate being apparent from the results below; perhaps, however, the programme over-emphasized the importance of the Doubles, the Play-Off for which finished at 8.45 p.m. on the Saturday. The prize-giving for the Singles took place with decorum at 6 p.m. — with decorum in order not to disturb the Doubles players, all of whom were locals, fortunately.

One Doubles game stands out for mention. Col.Prichard was for Rover, his partner Blumer for Penultimate, Jackson and Miss Allardyce both for the second hoop. Jackson hit in, went round, single peeled and pegged out Col.Prichard, and with his partner's co-operation went on to win.

Finishing at 8.10 p.m. on Wednesday, Mrs Tyrwhitt Drake played splendidly to be lined up for the peg against Mrs Prichard, when the latter had a long hit in, made her last hoop and went out.

One fantastic incident: Tyrwhitt Drake had everything apparently sewn up in the Process Final against Prichard; he had pegged out one of his opponent's balls, and the other two balls were for 4-Back. Prichard's ball was on or near the First Corner spot. Prichard shot at Tyrwhitt Drake, who was lined up for 4-Back but more or less wired, and ran his hoop and went out!

Mrs Bagnall played consistently well to win the Women's Bowl. R.H.Lee was unlucky to meet Jackson at his best in the final of the 'X', and, having revenged himself on Jackson in the Draw Final, to find Col.Prichard at his most cunning in the Play-Off of the Men's.

Miss Sessions, starting to play at 9.45 a.m. on the Saturday, lost to Mrs Bagnall, beat Mrs Prichard, lost in the Play-Off to Mrs Bagnall conceding seven bisques, and — how she physically does it we shall never know — won the Play-Off of the Doubles with her splendid partner Mrs Handley at 8.45 p.m.; believe it or not, there was no means of getting one of those Singles played before the final day.

#### Inter-County Championship: May 21-24

Six teams again competed in the "Counties" this year, although their constitution differed from that of 1973. After appearing for many years at Hurlingham, often with marked success, Devon and Eastern Counties found themselves unable this year to muster teams of the necessary quality, but fortunately Bedfordshire and a Thames Valley combination of Berkshire and Oxfordshire filled the gap. The latter departed on the final afternoon in a joyous mood, having won all their five rounds and so becoming the holders of the handsome trophy. Considering that they suffered through the inability of John Soutter to play because of an injured wrist, coupled with the fact that the new C.A. Chairman was available for one game only, their success is the more praiseworthy. Both in his play and through his intelligent shuffling of his resources, Nigel Aspinall was their tower of strength. Bedfordshire can count themselves reasonably satisfied with 2 wins out of 5 rounds, 4 of their games being lost by very narrow margins. The three musketeers from Wrest Park, Rees, Wheeler and Green, provided them with a solid base. Sussex, after some years of frustration when they narrowly failed to win matches, had 3 wins this year and finished as runners-up, which will encourage them for the future. A surprising outcome of the week was the relatively poor showing of Middlesex and Surrey who for many years seemed to have a near monopoly of success. This year they won only 2 rounds apiece. Surrey suffered from the fact that Bernard Neal was only able to play in their final game, against Middlesex. In this he pegged out Colin Prichard when Cotter was for 3-Back, but after a further hour's play Cotter, who knows the tactics of the pegged-out game thoroughly, prevailed. Midland Counties had only 1 win, against Middlesex, but were unlucky in many of the 9 games they lost, 5 being by single figure margins.

Among the features of the week were the fast lawns. Rarely can Counties Week have produced such fast conditions, the result of a long spell of dry weather (and possibly the groundsman having in mind the Test Matches following in early July). Of the 45 games played during the week, 25 were won by single figures and 6 of them were decided on time. Finally, a rather unusual happening: all the 15 rounds resulted in a 2 to 1 victory, which makes it unnecessary to repeat the margins of victory in the Analysis which follows.

There are five courts, improving yearly, and we had hot, sunny weather. If next year this tournament is held, as hoped, later in June, one could bathe when not playing. What more could one ask? Why did only 19 enter this year? The Club has 24 croquet members: 16 live on the Island, and of these only 5 competed this year; 8 live on the mainland, and 5 of them competed. The remaining 9 were non-members from the mainland. Thus the future of the tournament, and indeed of this famous and ancient club are not as secure as one could

However, this year's small entry meant no time limits, which was much appreciated. The greatest feat of endurance was the Doubles Final of 61/2 hours bravely fought by Mesdames Bressey and Lowein, who were eventually overcome by Professor Weitz and Mrs Adlam, a glamorous addition to the tournament world.

It was really Mrs Weitz's tournament - with her elegant flamingo-like stance she won the 'B' Levels and was runner-up in the 'X' Final against Mr Pountney. #### Compton: June 3-8

It is only natural, I suppose, that I retain a particular affection for the Compton Club, since it was here — just fifty years ago — that I began to play croquet, following in my father's footsteps. The six courts stand today exactly as they stood then, but there was a large pavilion — very similar in size and design to the old pavilion at Roehampton — at right angles to the fourth corner of court one. Hugh Malcolm, a genial Scot with a ruddy and weather-beaten countenance, looked after the welfare of the courts in winter with the devotion and expertise of Duffield at Colchester or Colonel Wheeler at Cheltenham. And in the summer months there must have been some 30 or more playing members, for the courts were invariably filled and advance booking was a customary practice.

This year's tournament was blessed with fine weather, except for a brief interlude on Saturday morning when rain stopped play. In the Open Singles it became evident that there was a wide level of evenly-distributed talent, so that, at the season when the younger generation are competing for their 'A' levels, we may perhaps say that the four competitors who came through to the finals of the Draw and Process — Cox, Borrett, Gladstone and Tyrwhitt Drake — may be deemed to have passed with Honours. From these Cox and Gladstone emerged to face each other in the Play-Off. Gladstone, who had shown an admirable consistency of attack and accuracy throughout the week, was once again quickly off the mark and built up an imposing lead, before his opponent got into his stride, to win by 16 points.

Earlier in the week we witnessed a dramatic conclusion to the match between Dr Wiggins and Clemons. Clemons was left with one ball for the peg. Wiggins, in play, made 4-back and Penult and then, having no rush to the Rover, laid up in baulk, whereat all the Bells of St Clemons rang out in jubilation! Roger Wood played one flawless game, defeating Tyrwhitt Drake in a little over an hour, the loser making only one mistake. Mrs Simpson merited considerable praise for two consecutive games against stronger opponents, both of which she lost by only a very narrow margin.

Mr and Mrs Digby, paying a first visit from Colchester, had a rewarding week: Mrs Digby won the 'B' Opens after a close and exciting match against Everest, who is always a tough opponent; her husband only succumbed in the closing stages of the Handicap Semi-Finals to the redoubtable Poutney, who went on to win the final from Sloane. In the 'C' Handicap the issue between Yallop and Mrs E.J.Tucker was in doubt to the very end, victory going to the former by 3 points.

By winning the Handicap Doubles Roger Wood and R.C.Malin (a dark horse, if ever there was one!) became the first holders of the handsome new silver salvers presented by Mrs Kirk-Greene. In the final against Hamilton-Miller and Mrs Haworth the clips stood level at 2-back and 3-back. At this point there came two long shots in succession and the game was over, Malin making an excellent break to the peg and Roger Wood finishing in the next turn.

#### 1. MINUTES

The Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting, which had been published in the Croquet Gazette for July 1973, were approved.

#### 2. ELECTION OF A VICE-PRESIDENT

Mrs E.Rotherham was elected a Vice-President by acclamation. She thanked the members for the honour done to her.

#### 3. PRESIDENT'S REMARKS

The President recalled several Associates who had died during the year, including Miss Joan Warwick, Colonel Desmond Beamish, R.O.Hicks, Mrs A.S.C.Ross, I.Cheavin and D.E.Buckland. He announced his own intention to retire from the Presidency at the end of 1974. He also spoke warmly of the services of Professor Neal, who was retiring on the day of the A.G.M. from the Chairmanship of the Council.

#### 4. TREASURER'S REPORT AND ACCOUNTS

Mr A.J.Oldham, Treasurer, reported on the financial situation of the C.A., which was increasingly favourable, and moved the adoption of the accounts, which had been circulated.

Mr J.W.Solomon expressed the hope that much of the available money might be spent on assisting clubs. The Treasurer asked that clubs desiring such help would submit specific and clear-cut proposals.

Mr Caporn seconded the motion to adopt the Accounts; the motion was adopted by acclamation.

Mr Gerald Williams expressed appreciation of the valuable and onerous work done by the Treasurer.

#### 5. ELECTION OF TREASURER

A.J.Oldham was unanimously elected as Treasurer.

#### 6. ELECTION OF COUNCIL MEMBERS

- (a) The names of those elected to the Council by postal ballot (including members who retired by rotation and were re-elected) were read out. Those successful in the ballot were (in alphabetical order): D.C.Caporn, Mrs H.B.H.Carlisle, Revd W.E.Gladstone, Mrs Barbara Meachem, D.H.Moorcraft, Lt-Col D.M.C.Prichard, C.B.Sanford, E.Strickland, Professor B.G.Weitz, Dr W.R.D.Wiggins and Neil Williams.
- (b) Mr Caporn proposed that the Secretary be authorized to destroy the ballot papers. It was so agreed.

#### 7. AMENDMENT TO RULE XIX

Professor Neal explained the reason for the amendment. The Scottish Clubs desired a measure of autonomy because of their geographical isolation from England. The Council had agreed to the formation of a Scottish Croquet Association, and had approved its proposed constitution, the text of which had been circulated to Associates with the Agenda. A consequential change was required in the Rules of the Croquet Association so as to provide for the new Association. Professor Neal proposed and Mr Rothwell seconded that Rule XIX be amended as follows:—

Before the heading of this Rule, insert "A". After the Text of the Rule as it now stands, add: "B. The Scottish Croquet Association

The Croquet Association recognises the Scottish Croquet Association as having the powers and jurisdictions claimed for itself in the Constitution of 1974". It was so agreed.

#### 8. ELECTION OF AUDITORS

It was reported that the Association's Auditors, Messrs. Nicholass, Reid & Corney, had amalgamated with another firm, with consequent change of name to Messrs. Nicholass, Ames & Co.

On the proposal of the Treasurer, seconded by Mr Duffield, the Auditors were re-elected unanimously for a further year.

#### 9. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

- (a) Mr Caporn drew the attention of Associates to the Conference of Clubs, which it is proposed to hold this year on 7 December.
- (b) The President asked for information about catering arrangements at Hurlingham available to visitors attending the two Test Matches to be held there. Mrs Sundius-Smith informed the meeting that the Snack Bar would be open during the whole week and would be available to visitors.
- (c) Mr Duffield expressed appreciation of the admirable manner in which the Editor of the Croquet Gazette discharged his functions. The meeting expressed its agreement by acclamation.
- (d) The Secretary drew attention to:-
- (i) the availability in his office of literature on sale, of posters for clubs' publicity, and of sets of balls for collection by the representatives of clubs staging Test Matches. His new Assistant, Mrs L.Moodley, was ready in the office to discharge these objects.
- (ii) the delay in the appearance of the April gazette.
  (iii) the serious error of the printers, who had (contrary to instructions) sent out copies of the Test Tour Programme to all Associates in the envelopes which had been sent to them for distributing the April issue of the gazette. This was damaging in three ways: cost of envelopes and stamps for the erroneous distribution; loss of between 800 and 900 copies of the Programme, necessitating an extra printing to replace them; and loss of sales because clubs had ordered copies for sale to Associates, and the Associates had now received copies free. No doubt the printers would be co-operative about covering the loss; the Council would consider how to minimise it.
- (e) Mr Haworth spoke of a visit he had paid to Scotland and of the Worldmark Croquet Tour of South Africa.

#### 10. VOTE OF THANKS TO CHAIRMAN

On the proposal of Professor Neal, the meeting passed a warm vote of thanks to its Chairman, the President of the Association.

- 3. Of the eleven members elected to the Council, as announced at the Annual General Meeting on 20th May, C.B.Sandford will serve for one year, Mrs H.B.H.Carlisle and E.Strickland for two years and the remaining 8 for the full term of three years.
- 4. S.S.Townsend reported that the printers had, in error, despatched to every Associate a copy of the Test Tour Programme which should have been on sale to those who wanted it at a cost of 30p. An ad hoc Committee, consisting of D.C.Caporn, A.J.Oldham and S.S.Townsend, was appointed to devise and execute means of minimising any loss to the Association.
