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

Notes from the Clubs

Bristol

A fairly quiet season at Cedar Park, with the poor weather restricting the number of players seen on the courts.

Unfortunately our Club was without its President, Cecil Rich, owing to illness, but we look forward to his return next season.

A most encouraging feature was the acquisition of 9 new members, including two very promising ones, Bill Scarr and Bernard Casson, who travel from Weston-super-Mare and Clevedon respectively.

In the Club competitions Bill Scarr won the 'C' Class Handicap and was runner-up in the American Handicap, the winner of this event being Lawrence Latham. In the Open Singles Latham held off the challenge from Miss K. Ault to retain the Rose Bowl for the third year.

We had a large entry for the All-England Handicap, and Latham won the Area final at Cheltenham and competed in the finals at Roehampton.

Report on the Development Scheme 1974

Between February and March of this year I wrote to 27 individuals, Parks Officials, schools and other organisations that had been in touch during the previous summer. One third failed to reply, but the rest were interested, some more than others. In fact four have become new clubs. A further 40 or so potential clubs have made enquiries during the year. Fourteen of them are almost certain starters for clubs in 1975, others may flourish, some may never emerge, but the increase on last year is a very encouraging trend.

The extra publicity during the Test Matches certainly stirred up interest, and contacts made during the matches were valuable. For instance, a new club at Worksop was "discovered" when its members came to the Nottingham Test. They play Association Croquet with correct equipment — a bonus the Development Scheme knew nothing about! At the Bowls Club at Shepley, the wives had for years been playing golf croquet. A newspaper article two years ago, when croquet was about to be given up, aroused one man's interest. This summer he wrote to the C.A., and I was able to give him names and addresses of enquirers from his area. Together with his own contacts, a group of men who want to play Association Croquet have now joined Shepley, and it is hoped that this will give it a new lease of life.

A branch of the Agricola Club from the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, who have gained recognition for croquet from their Civil Service Sports Council, now have their own lawn at Eltham. A member of the Civil Service in Yorkshire asked for advice on what he should include about croquet in an article on sport for a Civil Service magazine, so perhaps croquet has now got a foot in the Civil Service door. Knighton, on the borders of Wales, is a new club with 29 members which has been considerably helped by the West Midlands Federation, mainly from Stourbridge. It hopes to play next year on two newly laid lawns, instead of the one on the cricket outfield they used this summer. Eaton Hall, a College of Further Education near Sheffield, has registered and has been in touch with Nottingham, while the Thomas Rotherham VI Form College at Moorgate has been lent some equipment.

On the debit side the Ealing Club has disbanded. This seemed at first to be a very promising club because a large number of the members, both men and women, were young. However, first their Secretary moved, then the young couple who took over from her, and who would certainly have held it together, got married and moved away too. How much a club depends on the initiative of one or two energetic people! The Bowls section of Crouch Hill Club has had to sell out, taking the Croquet section with it. This leaves Harrow Oak more than ever the stronghold of croquet in north London, and with its three lawns and the untiring efforts of its Chairman it deserves to have more members than in fact it does.

Demonstrations have been held at Sandwell, Knighton and Radbroke Hall, and many clubs give coaching to neighbouring clubs as well as their own. Courses for beginners were again held at Bisham Abbey and Hythe. Phyllis Court for the first time ran a course for middle bisquers, and a Referees' course was held at Wrest Park. The Home Counties Leagues continue to be played, and there are signs that where there are several clubs reasonably close together, other leagues may be started up, run on similar lines.

1974 in Retrospect

A season which includes a Series of Test Matches is not easy to compass in retrospect; we cannot see the wood for the trees—or should we say the Game for the Triples. A Test Series comes to our shores but once in a dozen years and when it comes it brings loud cheers—especially for the winning side. Our corresponding article last year issues some rather solemn warnings to all concerned not to take the country's task as a 'cert' for the home team, and our players assuredly did not. They had brought themselves in nearly every case to the top of their form and reached victory (at Budleigh Salterton) when the Series was but half way through. While our 'stars' shone brightly for the most part, it was perhaps even more valuable that we proved to be (as we had always hoped we might be) stronger 'in depth'.

Of course a Home Team has always certain advantages. First, they are on their own courts. Again, a 'bad' summer, such as we had for the most part this year, is more familiar to us than (we understand — and as this writer has experienced) is the case with antipodean players. A third point is that a Home Team has more performers to draw upon than visitors — ten as against six on this occasion — or five in the case of Australia with the withdrawal of their rising 'star', Mr Spooner. We ought to have won — and we did.

What, we wonder, is going to happen in New Zealand in 1978-9? There is young talent developing 'down-under', as players such as A.M. Anderson and Spencer Buck gave plenty of evidence here this year.

For my part I would say that *the* player of the Series was John Prince who, with our Solomon and Aspinall, would, I think, be at the top if a way of Earth challenging Mars were discovered. Perhaps places might be found for Bernard Neal, and for William Prichard, who played with admirable steadiness, confidence and consistency throughout the Series.

One fact was generally agreed upon here — that the Visiting Teams were definitely better long shots than our players were — and of course that is saying a good deal. Perhaps their tactics were, on the whole, less good than those on our side; they could get in at a critical point, but sometimes they did not know the best way out of a situation.

We wish that we could have given our visitors a better summer, but we trust that our hospitality mitigated this disappointment to some extent. Their hospitality to us was generous in the extreme. First, the New Zealand team took us up to the 17th floor of their country's magnificent head-quarters in the Haymarket, offering us some splendid glimpses of London from above. Australia at the end of the tour entertained us to a most lavish Dinner at the Roehampton Club, with nearly 200 present and followed by a chain of speeches unexcelled, one felt, by any delivered on the tour.

But at this point we must leave this fascinating subject to record some consideration of the game at humbler levels. Despite the discouraging conditions in which we seem to be now condemned to live, our game — and our Association — seem to be flourishing. New names keep appearing in our tournament reports, and often as winners of events. More and more small clubs are enrolling themselves on our registers. Two developments are to be noted: first, a readiness to experiment with 'Double Banking', a form of game never before seen in this country; and the initiation of regional 'Federations' to forestall any sense of isolation which some provincial clubs may sometimes feel if they are far from large centres. We are creeping steadily northwards, while the other side of the Border, Scotland, has achieved an independent status and shows a rising enthusiasm.

Meanwhile a great enterprise, unknown to most of us, is steadily taking shape. This is the compilation of a definitive History of Croquet upon which Colonel Prichard (aided by Betty) is unflaggingly engaged. This is still (and for our 'senior citizens' likely to remain) beneath the horizon; but it is

evident to any who have been granted a glance at what has so far been achieved that its publication should do much to add to the prestige of and the interest in our unique — and wholly amateur — game.

Finally, it is our sad duty to record the loss of two notable figures of our Association. First, Dr Laurence Ormerod, President of the Bristol Club which he did much to preserve and revive, and from 1954 to 1961 a member of the C.A. Council. Perhaps he will be best remembered for two things: the authorship of 'Croquet' in the 'Know the game' series - a little gem of compression which has helped to launch many a neophyte on a croquet career; secondly as the father of William, who has played with so much success in first class circles for many years. The other name we must sadly lament is that of Brian Gilbert, who was suddenly seized by a malevolent affliction after playing for his county (Surrey) in 1973. He came to croquet after a notable career in lawn tennis, with several successes at Wimbledon, including a victory in the Open Doubles Championship. He soon turned himself into a high class Croquet player and was a regular member of the Surrey team for many years and a pillar of the game at Rochampton.

Longman Cup Final

An attempt to re-arrange the match for 20th October failed, as many of the players were unavailable. The two participating clubs, Daten and Parsons Green, sought The Council's permission to postpone the match until early in the 1975 season, and this arrangement was accepted.

Automatic Handicapping 1974

Locock's system of Automatic Handicapping was fully explained in gazette no. 129 (December 1973). I have not taken into consideration Weekend or American tournaments, or 'Y' events, because the full results do not appear in the gazette. Amendments to Colonel Prichard's 'Commentary on the Laws of Association Croquet'

LAW 14 (b) (III).

If, after apparently running its hoop, but before it comes to rest, the striker's ball hits a ball that is 4 or 5 inches clear of the hoop on the non-playing side, and then rolls back, so that in its final position it has not completed the running, the hoop is not scored. Consequently, the roquet is not made —— unless, of course, it was a virgin ball (i.e. one which the striker was still entitled to roquet without running the hoop), in which case the roquet is made, and the hoop can be re-approached. (Compare Law 16A, which deals with the same principle.)

LAW 18 (a).

This loophole has now been closed by an amendment to the Law (see Croquet Gazette, April 1974) which states that the ball must be placed "on the ground".

LAW 19 (c).

When either ball goes off in a croquet stroke, the turn ends; but any point made during that stroke is scored. The striker's ball has an escape clause (i.e. by making a roquet or scoring a hoop) but the croqueted ball has none; if the croqueted ball is peeled and then goes off, the point is scored but the turn ends; if both balls are rovers, and the croqueted ball misses the peg and goes off and the striker's ball then hits the peg, the peg point is scored —— and of course the turn ends. If a ball other than the striker's or the croqueted ball is sent off, it is merely replaced on the yard line and the turn continues.

LAW 22.

The definition of a ball finally coming to rest has now been extended (Croquet Gazette, April 1974) to include "or if its position has been agreed or adjudicated upon" (i.e. by the players themselves or a Referee).

AW 28

Note, however, that the adversary is expressly forbidden from drawing attention to a misplaced ball if the striker is about to play with the wrong ball. (Law 28 (b))

AW 30.

Cross reference to Law 51 (a) which prohibits players in Tournaments from warning their opponents that they are about to play with a wrong ball. (Law 28 (b))

LAW 39.

This Law does not preclude a rover from pegging out an adversary's ball, whatever the position of his partner's ball.

Not only did Brian play tennis for England and become a Davis Cup Star, but he was also a croquet player with a minus handicap, and played for Surrey.

Parkstone: September 9 - 14

Unlike some tournaments whose entries seem to be declining, the Parkstone September tournament had a full entry, mainly as a result of a large contingent from Budleigh.

In the Opens Dr William Ormerod, the local expert, fresh from helping Great Britain to victory in the recent Test Matches against Australia and New Zealand, played majestic and flawless croquet early in the week, but then had a bad day, in which he only hit the last shot against Pat Newton, and gave the steadily improving Les Butler a brief moment of glory by losing to him. Ormerod follows his ball about the court, after huge but accurate split shots, with slow measured tread, resolute but serene; one is aware of a formidable croquet intelligence at work. In his play-off against John Soutter, returning to croquet after a persistent thumb injury, neither player was in form, and the result was a little disappointing to those who had hoped to see a sparkling exhibition of top class croquet.

Butler, who lost narrowly in the final of the Big Handicap to Allen Parker, another improving local player, has the interesting style of slowly bowing low over the ball before he strikes it, as if in homage, or perhaps supplication.

Other leading Parkstone players, such as Pat Newton, Dick Whittington and Margaret McMordie, in the interests of expedition in play, do what has to be done quickly, and then sit down and give the other chap a chance. This is admirable, but one misses the stylistic embellishments which can give pleasure to croquet watchers interested in such esoteric matters. Dr Hubert Pim and his wife Joan, from the Caversham and Phyllis Court Clubs, show an interesting contrast of styles. He performs a stately ritual before striking the ball, and from time to time stands motionless as if carved in stone while he ponders the next move. She, by contrast, when time presses, breaks into a run between strokes, and has the engaging habit of making quick glances over her shoulder in apparent apprehension to remind or reassure herself as to the state of the game in other parts of the court; she gives the appearance of fearing pursuit by The Furies, or that "some foul fiend doth close behind her tread". They both had a successful tournament, he winning the 'B' levels against Bob Carder and reaching the semi-final of the Big Handicap, and she reaching the semi-final of the 'B' levels.

The 'B' levels at Parkstone permit entries from the handicap range of 4½ to 8 bisques, a rather higher range than usual, but, as it gives the players concerned the added interest of playing with lifts, perhaps it is an example which other tournaments might follow.

Another couple who had a successful tournament were yet another medical man, Dr Marshall, and Mrs Marshall from

Budleigh. He defeated Mrs L.M. Bishop in the 'C' Handicap final, and she reached the semi-final of the 'X'. Their consequent handicap reductions will no doubt be the first of many.

The Handicap Doubles resulted in a local final between Messrs. Parker and Carder and Mesdames Wood and Newton, victory going to the latter.

Owing to the increasing rarity and unavailability of visiting official Managers, Parkstone have been virtually forced to produce their own, and Pat Newton and his assistants have shown that this has been a most successful solution to the problem.

Carrickmines (Championship of Ireland): September 9 – 14

Croquet at Carrickmines always reminds me of an incident from a previous visit, when I came off the court and, turning to an Irish player who had just finished a game, said "How did you get on?" He smiled happily; "Oh, quite well," he replied, "I came in second!" This story seems to me typical of the spirit in which the game has been played in Ireland ever since the days of C.L.O'Callaghan, Duff Matthews and the Corbally brothers, and this meeting, despite the continuous rain which fell on Wednesday and Thursday, was no exception. Optimism prevailed and proved correct in the end, when a successful conclusion was reached by Saturday tea-time.

The Championship was won by Terence Read, who did not concede a single game during the week, although each of his four opponents ran him close in one game of their respective encounters. His ability to set up a break from an unpromising situation was always the decisive factor which distinguished his play and revealed that extra touch of class.

Frances Joly had a splendid week, in which she played consistently good croquet. She reached the final of the Opens, and won the Handicap Singles to take the Founder's Cup (described in the Irish Times as the "Flounder's Cup"!). In this latter event, after pulling a game out of the fire against Dudley Hamilton-Miller by hitting the last shot and going round from hoop 4 to peg out her opponent, she won a well-contested final against Reggie Leonard. This player was seen at his best in several games, notably in a first round match of excellent croquet against Margaret Lightfoot, who was playing with accuracy and confidence. In partnership with Derek Robinson, who improved with every game after a long absence in Canada, she swept to an unchallenged victory in the Handicap Doubles. In the final of the Green Cup, The Reverend Rooke, a keen and improving newcomer, gained an early lead against Grace Hopkins, a lead which he held to the finish.

Lady FitzGerald, in the unenviable role of Manager, kept everyone happy and completed her programme most successfully by the appointed time. The continuous clouds and rain on Wednesday and Thursday she appeared to regard with no more than a shrug of the shoulders, silently echoing the words of Sir Gringamore in "Morte d'Arthur", "As for that threatening, be it as it may, we will go to our supper"! Our thanks to Lady FitzGerald and to Jim Murphy, whose stewardship at lunch time was of the very highest order.

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All-England Handicap 1974

The over-all entry for this important nationwide handicap competition was slightly down on 1973, a total of 298 entries whittled down through 29 Club competitions and then 8 Area finals to eight competitors for the Final held at Roehampton, September 28-29. In spite of nearly 2 inches of rain falling shortly before the Final was due to start, the ground staff managed to get the lawns mown and marked out to enable play to start on time, and the sun shone for most of the duration of the competition.

As last year, the eight players were drawn by lot into two blocks of four, and each block was played as an American to produce two finalists. In Block A Laurence Norton (2½) from the Incorrigibles in Scotland was playing below form, as he had dropped a lathe on his foot two days previously, but he gallantly limped his way through his three games. Gordon Drake (3) from Tunbridge Wells just could not find his form. Lawrence Latham (4) from Bristol played well, but not well enough to overcome John Coutts (9) from Jealotts Hill (near Bracknell in Berkshire) who won all his games with comparative ease, played above his handicap, and made good use of his many bisques.

Block B was much more evenly contested. Keith Ross $(-1\frac{1}{2})$ from Nottingham played well, but was just unable to give all those bisques. Tony Cooper (51/2) from B.E.A. Silver Wing beat Ross easily, and only lost a cliff-hanger to Mrs Higgins by 3, having already lost to Mrs Digby. Mrs Higgins (8) from Parsons Green lost to Ross by 9, and then narrowly beat Cooper by hitting the peg with her lone ball from near the south boundary in what would probably have been her last shot. Mrs Digby (3½) from Colchester had won her first two games against Cooper and Ross. The result of the block depended on the last game, Mrs Digby v. Mrs Higgins. Mrs Digby had to make at least 12 hoops to win the block. Although Mrs Higgins won the game, Mrs Digby made 14 points to win the block with 2 wins and 11 net points to Mrs Higgins' 2 wins and 6 net points. There was thus a close and exciting climax to Saturday's play.

The final, played on Sunday morning in brilliant sunshine, was between the two block winners, John Coutts and Mrs Digby. On the face of it the odds were against Mrs Digby being able to give 5½ bisques to Coutts, and so it proved. Mrs Digby had several near misses with her long shots, and she was unable to use what chances she had. John Coutts, on the other hand, played well and intelligently. He made a good 3-ball break of six without a bisque, took his bisques well, and deserved victory in his first venture into competition play. He will now have to play with two less bisques than hitherto.

Devonshire Park Tournament: September 23 — October 5

"We're all mad here," said the Cheshire Cat. "I'm mad, you're mad." "How do you know I'm mad?" said Alice. "You must be," said the cat, "or you wouldn't have come here."

Any casual visitor, looking in at Devonshire Park and seeing croquet being played under the weather conditions which we experienced for most of this fortnight, would surely have endorsed this verdict. It is difficult to decide who suffered most, the players physically or the Managers mentally. Still, we battled on and with the Compton Club courts proving a very present help in trouble, Giles Borrett and Ed Strickland are to be congratulated on completing the first week's programme in the face of such heavy odds.

There is always an unique, and abiding atmosphere of nostalgia in this fortnight. New faces, old faces — we meet, we play and we have time to talk unhurriedly. We recall games which we have seen or played here, and exciting or unusual incidents, even though it would be hard to find one of these comparable to a story of bygone days told by Maurice Reckitt. Being called to referee a stroke during a game being played between two elderly ladies, who made up in personal rivalry for what they lacked in skill, he arrived on the court to be greeted as follows: "Oh, no!" exclaimed the first lady, "I'm not going to have you! You're a friend of my opponent and you will give the verdict against me!"

The Prichard family — a veritable "Permutation of Prichards" — were in irresistible form throughout; and even if Colonel Prichard during the first week assumed the role of the Duke of Plaza-Toro and "led his regiment from behind", they finally collected six first and four second prizes. In the South of England Open Championship Dudley Hamilton-Miller, showing a marked revival of form, came through to win the Draw against Peter Elmes, whose chances were ruined at a vital stage by a patch of rough bare ground. Earlier, Tyrwhitt Drake, having upset the form-book by a fine display of accurate croquet to defeat William Prichard, who on this rare occasion made mistakes, had the subsequent mortification of seeing Peter Elmes snatch victory by one point in the semi-final by hitting in with the last shot.

William Prichard, now playing with a beautiful touch, won the Process unchallenged, and finished with a grand slam of triple peels to become the South of England Open Champion by defeating Tyrwhitt Drake in 50 minutes and Hamilton-Miller in the Play-Off in the sixth turn of a game which lasted 38 minutes. More will be heard, and seen, of H.G.T.Bolton from Henley, who recorded two notable successes at the expense of Colonel Prichard and Miss Sessions during the week.

Three promising and well-matched players were concerned in the final stages of the Devonshire Park Salver. After Haigh of Woking had won the Draw, Robert Prichard faced Dr C.A.Parker in the Process, not — one would suppose — with any undue excess of confidence, since Dr Parker had just come off the court, having played quite superbly to win the final of the Sussex Challenge Cup against Betty Prichard by 26, with a bisque and a half in hand! But, as sometimes happens, the Midas touch now failed him and Robert Prichard, quick to take any opportunity, forged ahead to win this game and, afterwards, the Play-Off on Sunday. Haigh, however, deserves special mention for being the only person, apart from William Prichard, to carry out a triple peel during the week, although the triple was not completed by the peg-out.

Mrs Benn looked in from South Africa and had just enough time, plus the appropriate skill, to win the Luard Cup from H.N.D.Meyer before catching her plane home. Colonel Brown achieved his first tournament success by winning the final of the Trevor Williams Cup against Mrs Tyrwhitt Drake. The well-tried partnership of Miss Sessions and Colonel Wheeler had appeared in the Handicap Doubles final on more than one previous occasion, though not on the winning side. This year

they took an early lead against the family combination of Mrs Prichard and Robert, and maintained their advantage to the end. In the Sussex Challenge Cup, Mrs Simpson and Peter Elmes fought their way through to the semi-finals, while a curious coincidence occurred in the 'Y'. Here Colonel Cave and his wife, who had "divided" last year's 'X' final, were once more the finalists, with Marjorie Cave the winner by a small margin.

Edgar Jackson and Gladstone now took over as Player-Managers and made excellent use of the opening two days of sunshine, which were followed by three days of rain. In the Men's Championship a similar pattern emerged to that of the previous week, William Prichard and Dudley Hamilton-Miller meeting in the finals of both Draw and Process. While the latter now managed to reduce the margin of points in each game, the quality of William's play may be illustrated by just one example — a cut rush from the 3rd corner across the court to within a yard of its target, the first hoop.! In earlier rounds Jackson and Denno Harris had each achieved one 4-ball break against William Prichard.

The Women's Championship was won by Betty Prichard, whose accuracy and concentration brought a second well-deserved victory over Kitty Sessions in a close finish of the Play-Off, where the latter had looked to be an assured winner but suddenly missed a 5-yard roquet at the Rover to enable her opponent to advance from 1-back to the peg in the next turn. The lift shot having failed, Mrs Prichard went out in fine style from Penult to win. Miss Sessions had previously had a great struggle in the final of the Draw against Frances Joly. Miss Joly, about to finish, attempted an angled peel at the Rover, missed it and found herself unable to make the hoop and stymied from an adjacent opponent ball. Such is croquet!

Another new and hitherto unknown handicap star, B. Redford from Henley, had a most successful and busy week. In addition to winning the Handicap Doubles with Mrs I.B. Tucker (such a good Doubles partner), he carried off the important Felix Cup with a narrow win over R.L. Everest, who was also much in the public eye. Everest, however, squared the account by defeating his rival, again by a narrow margin, in the semi-final of the Sussex Union Challenge Cup; fortified by this victory, he went on to win a hard-fought deciding match against Pountney, last year's winner. Pountney had reached the final by "challenging at the distance" - in Flat Racing parlance - to overtake Jackson, always a formidable opponent. Mr and Mrs H.J.Devitt, runners-up in the Handicap Doubles and winners last year, looked as though they would snatch the victory in a close finish, when Mrs Devitt, left in alone, hit a long shot at the eleventh hour and had only a reasonably straightforward Rover to make. Alas! this oft-fatal barrier (which in recent memory so unexpectedly baulked John Solomon from winning the President's Cup) now caused Mrs Devitt to become "struck in the reever", to quote an enchanting misprint in the Times of some years ago!

The Victor Vases were duly won by the favourites, Colonel Prichard and William, who defeated Giles Borrett and Mrs Prichard by a comfortable margin. They had, however, survived a most exciting semi-final against Jackson and Gladstone, who, with only Rover to make and in play, left Colonel Prichard's ball by the Rover and laid up. But, after deliberation, it was William who took the shot and it was William who hit! Colonel Prichard played well in this event, assured perhaps by the knowledge that he had merely to reach 4-back and that William would finish the job, which on occasion he did.

With the completion of an Extra Event, where the Block Winners were Mrs B.Meachem, E.J.Tucker, S.Malin, H.J.Devitt, R.Wallis and Mrs I.B.Tucker, Edgar Jackson brought the tournament to a successful conclusion, despite three days of rain. In this connection, a mental picture remains of Cyril Pountney, splendidly robed in royal blue mackintosh and hood, stepping out of the pavilion to start a game in the driving rain and vividly recalling the once-familiar curtain line

Extract from Proceedings of Council Meeting held on 16 November 1974

1. It was agreed, in line with the majority of Sporting Organisations, that any member of Council be permitted to claim in respect of attendance at any Council or Committee meeting in excess of £1.50 of his travelling expenses; these expenses were defined as second-class day return railway fare, plus fares on public transport between home and railway station and between the London terminus and Hurlingham. This arrangement is to be experimental for one year commencing 1st January 1975. The Secretary will be instructed to bring to each Council meeting a list of claims made which will be available for inspection at the meeting.

It was felt that Associates should not be discouraged from serving on the Council by virtue of the ever increasing travelling expenses involved in getting to London for meetings.

- The Selection Committee were empowered to reduce the number playing in the Ladies Field Cup competition to less than eight if they have difficulty in finding eight ladies of sufficient standard willing to take part when invited.
- 3. The date of the next Annual General Meeting has been fixed to take place at Hurlingham on Saturday 31st May 1975 at 11.30 a.m. It is hoped that holding the meeting on a Saturday rather than on the traditional Monday will permit more Associates to attend.
- 4. It was agreed that the final of the 1974 Longman Cup competition between Daten and Parsons Green will take place at Wrest Park during a weekend mutually acceptable to both clubs in the second half of April or the first half of May 1975.
- 5. The proposed budget for the production of the Croquet Gazette for 1975 of £1,450 (exclusive of packaging and

postage) was approved. The budget allows for five issues, one of 16 pages, and four of up to 24 pages, and for using the thinner paper as used in the September 1974 issue.

- 6. It was agreed that the Manager or Managers of the Devonshire Park Tournament be refunded their expenses incurred for lunch, morning coffee and afternoon tea, and in each week a Manager not resident in Eastbourne be allowed to claim £15 towards his other expenses. Regulation 10 to be amended to permit Managers receiving expenses to play in the tournament.
- 7. A letter from the President of the South African Croquet Association was discussed. It was agreed that it would be unwise to contemplate sending an official Test Team to South Africa or to receive an official South African team in England in 1975 or 1976 in view of the Government's declared policy at the risk of placing our Sports Council grant in jeopardy. It was agreed that there would be no objection to an individual taking a team to South Africa.
- As a result of a further letter from the S.A.C.A. it was agreed that the C.A. should co-operate in trying to find a suitable player to coach in South Africa in March 1975 as requested.
- The Scottish C.A. have invited the C.A. to send a team representing England to play against Scotland at Gleneagles in 1975. This invitation was welcomed subject to financial practicability.
- 10. It was decided that the 27 sets of balls presented by Messrs Jaques for the 1974 Test Series should be retained for use in official C.A. tournaments and the Development Scheme. Sets would be available for loan to Clubs in emergency, such as delays in delivery of new balls ordered from suppliers.
- 11. A tree (Robinia frisia) is being presented to the Hurlingham Club as a living token of the C.A.'s gratitude and friendship, for the great co-operation and help the Club has extended in so many ways over the years. It is intended that the tree will be planted below the embankment by the swimming pool overlooking Croquet Lawn No. 1 and a suitable plaque placed by it to commemorate the gift.
- 12. The following awards for 1974 have been made by the Council: —

The Steel Bowl to the lady player who has made the most progress in the year, to Mrs H.G.Handley of the Cheltenham Club.

The Apps Bowl to the male player who has made the most progress in the year, to Stephen Wright of The Whins Club, Scotland.

The Apps-Heley Award to the Club which has made the most progress or rendered most service to Croquet, to the Wolverhampton Club.

The Wolverhampton Club

In the two years since the Wolverhampton Club has been formed, its membership has risen to 29, the youngest member being only 11 years of age. During this year the members put on an exhibition in Wolverhampton Civic Hall on a carpeted area; the exhibition was followed later in the week with an Open Day. The members helped to arrange a demonstration at Sandwell Sports Festival, from which a club will be formed next summer which promises to take part in the Black Country Olympics. These are competitions between players of various sports in the area. The Wolverhampton Club took part this year, together with three other croquet teams. The members have also been largely instrumental in arranging the use of the large grass area at Himley Hall, Dudley, on a limited number of occasions. They marked out 6 lawns and managed an X/Y Doubles Tournament before the West Midlands Federation entertained the New Zealanders there. In time, as the lawns improve with use, it is hoped that Himley Hall may be the Devonshire Park of the Midlands.

Proposed Amendment to Regulations for Tournaments

At their meeting on 16 November the Council resolved to amend Regulations for Tournaments as follows:-

Regulation 10 (b) Omit the first paragraph, namely 'A person who receives payment in money, whether by way of a fee or as an allowance for expenses, for his services in connection with the organisation or conduct of a tournament shall not be eligible to compete in any event at that tournament'.

In accordance with Rule XIV (a) this proposed amendment will be reconsidered by Council on the first available occasion after publication in the Croquet Gazette, and if then passed by a majority of 6 to 4 will become law.
