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

# 'Sporting or Not?'

It is not the custom to print an account of weekend American Tournaments, but I wonder if, under the guise of a question "Sporting or Not?", mention could be made of one game in the Cheltenham Silver Jubilee Holiday American Tournament.

The Tournament lasted four days, and was divided into two tournaments 'A' and 'B' of two days each, each player in seven blocks of five getting four games in each series. The first series 'A' was played in the more or less standard blocks of mixed handicaps, and the results are to be found elsewhere in this issue. The second series 'B' was played in seeded blocks, Aspinall leading the top block and winning comfortably, as it was played under conditions of Advanced Play.

In the first series Hope had come into Aspinall's block in place of a +2½ player who had dropped out at the last moment, and the Aspinall/Hope game provided the spectators with what one of them described as an epic game. Giving 2½ bisques to Hope, with the conventional opening Aspinall hit his "tice" and went to 4-back. Hope, facing the most difficult leave that Aspinall could devise, used 1½ bisques to set up a break, triple peeled his opponent and pegged him out. Aspinall had already been beaten twice by 26 by two strong middle bisquers, and Hope eventually decided to make this an interesting and sporting game by not using his other bisque. By the usual tactics Hope got to Penult, and later

into the jaws of Rover, having pegged out his forward ball himself, while Aspinall had got in but broken down uncharacteristically at Hoop 6. Aspinall then had an amazing long shot at the fraction of Hope's ball available in Rover, and went on to win the game, to tremendous applause for victor and loser.

The last comparable game but even more "epic" (if one can use that expression) was in the Chairman's Salver in 1972 when Will Prichard pegged out Paul Hands and himself with a 7-hoop lead, but Hands won the game.

Purists might say that it made a travesty of the handicap game for Hope not to use his bisque, but it was a splendid Silver Jubilee gesture!

# 'Who gains from a bad lawn?'

Sir.

It is generally supposed that, in a competitive handicap game, long bisquers and scratch players alike would all, if given the choice, opt for the good lawn in preference to the poor lawn. In terms of tactics or judgement it cannot be best for both.

The long bisquer may well feel that the sensitive touch of the scratch player may be upset by the imperfections of the lawn, but there is another approach to the problem. A minus player once told me that he would always play a long bisquer on a bad lawn because it gave him an advantage!

I tried to reason this out. Suppose we have a scratch player giving a 16 bisquer 16 bisques in a game of about 70 turns, no doubt it is easier for the former than giving 16 bisques in a game of about 50 turns on a good lawn. But whose judgement is right—that of the novice or the expert?

# Demonstration of 1876 and 1976 Croquet at Glasgow

No one is quite sure how such a suggestion first germinated but most of the credit for pushing for implementation must go to Mrs Campbell-Smith. Tentatively put forward, I was amazed at the response and from this point on suggestions, offers and help came from all sides. The Art Galleries were delighted that a suitable venue would be the two lawns on the terrace on front of Pollock House, thus allowing us to give a separate demonstration on each lawn; one for the 1976 players in modern dress and the other for the 1876 players in period costume. The Parks Department offered all assistance, mowing both lawns every day for a week before the event. Meanwhile, the originators, now numbering eight members, got together to plan dress, equipment, and the number of members taking part. For the 1976 demonstrators there was no problem; the equipment was immediately to hand, dress of T-shirts and denim jeans readily available, and refreshments of coca-cola easily obtained. The 1876 part of the demonstration, however, required a much greater effort. Fortunately, it was remembered that the Auchinruive Club had part of an old set which included the "cage" that had been used in croquet at Eglinton Castle 100 years ago. This, plus a plundering of the Glasgow Club stores, produced eight wooden balls, light mallets, and several more hoops. Now the difficulty was to enlist eight victims. Four had already indicated interest, but could we raise four more? Here again it was the unexpected that solved our problem and at the same time presented us with another. Those asked to take part in the modern day show declared their preference for going back a century. Even more difficult was that, the news having percolated through the club, applications to join Queen Victoria came flooding in. By the practice night twelve members arrived declaring their intention of playing. Inevitably, the overspill had to be sacrificed to the 1976 lawn, and some were disbanded to play in the Glasgow versus Auchinruive inter-club match. The rest made up a very effective crowd scene in period costume.

To the delight of all, the day was wonderfully warm with a light breeze. Lastly, I am very grateful to Lady Katherine de Trevellyan for allowing me to copy these extracts from her diary.

1st August

Dear Diary,

No one was more delighted than I to receive such a kind invitation from dear Vere Lady Marchmount to her Croquet Garden Party on the 21st August. I hear she has obtained a new Croquet set with all sorts of exciting innovations.

21st August

Dear Diary,

What a wonderful afternoon. Dear Vere Lady Marchmount's Croquet Party was quite the most delightful afternoon I have spent this entire season. We were divided into two teams of four. How splendid it was to find that one of our foursome was to be my dear friend Mr James Shearer, the noted Glasgow merchant. We were partnered by Mr Gerald Wamer-Pickwick who, I have reason to believe, is a scholar of some note, and the Hon. Eleanor Hanlon whose family are well known traders and merchants in the city. She was most charming and wore the most exquisite dress of brown and green that I was almost turned to jealousy.

Against us Sir John McCaskill of Cardonald led a formidable team of Dr Thorpe from the University, the Hon. Mrs Campbell-Smith, and, always most welcome, Moira Countess Carstairs.

The game was to be refereed by the very good Reverend Dr Swearer of the Cathedral and he kept us up to the point in our play. Our team started so well that we never really looked back, partially due, I am sure, to an excellent fortification of the most exquisite Madeira Wine from Mr Shearer's cellars.

With some excellent play by Dr Thorpe, we were rather worried by our opponents' gains, and so a tea-break ordered by My Lady was most welcome. May Lady's companion, Mrs Hamilton, served our tea as Dr Swearer, truly a hard taskmaster in such heat, declared that he wished the play to continue without too much interruption. (Myself and the Hon. Miss Hanlon did fear for our skins so in such heat but said nothing to the party.)

When time was called I was relieved to see that our team had widened the gap in points thus allowing us to win the coveted Victory Trophy. Dr Swearer delivered a splendid speech in which he thanked our most kind hostess for allowing the use of her grounds for the Garden Party. How wonderful, he continued, that so many of Glasgow society were in attendance, and his only regret was that so few could take part in the game.

After the presentation I met the Hon. Miss Cooper, Lady McCaskill, and Dorothy Lady Robertson. Unfortuntely I could only call a greeting to Sir Ronald Forbes who arrived late in the afternoon, having been shooting on the estate.

It has been suggested that Lady Marchmount will be holding a similar Croquet Garden Party next season. Such an event I must not indeed miss.

In the Australian Croquet Gazette it is recorded that in the recent N.Z. Open Championship Paul Skinley, aged 18, achieved three triples and a sextuple, only the second time the latter has been achieved in N.Z. tournaments.

# Statistics of Shooting

Dr G.B.Grundy, who died in 1949 aged 88, was not only a distinguished Oxford don, but an ardent student of croquet theory. Nor was he merely a theorist, playing in the President's Cup in 1924. His shooting was said to be simply heart-breaking to his opponents, and he maintained this standard up till his death.

For two separate periods, 1922–23 and 1934–38 (seven years in all), he devoted most of his time at tournaments meticulously recording statistics of shooting. Practice and friendly games he disregarded, because, when the pressure is not on, results are misleading. He only recorded results of his own observation, ignoring reports from other people, because:

- (a) Few people apart from himself had imprinted on their minds the precise geometry of the court, and were therefore unreliable when estimating distances.
- (b) There is a tendency to notice sensational long hits and to forget misses.

His observations embraced all classes of players, although he admits that he had a natural tendency to watch the better players. This, however, often enabled him to record results from neighbouring courts. His detailed results may be seen in the appropriate Croquet Gazettes, with some useful tips about shooting, but he never completed the task of amalgamating all his annual results in one table. This I have now done, including summarising his conclusions, keeping my own comments to a minimum. There are inevitably a few apparent inconsistencies in his percentages. Grundy attributed these to some freak results in certain years, but they are within the permissible limits of statistical probability.

I have not tabulated the two years 1922–23 separately from the five years 1934–38, as they show no significant difference. This rather surprised Dr Grundy himself, as his impression was that in these later years the standard had improved, but he had a possible explanation. Apparently, beginning in 1934 and becoming widespread by 1935, there was a craze for shaving the grass. This, combined with hot summers, had a bad effect on shooting, 1935 showing the worst results on record. By 1936 many clubs rescinded this policy of close mowing, and shooting showed a great improvement.

Grundy says there are three hazards to good shooting. First, no court is mathematically level, and this factor is always present. The other hazards are, secondly, small dents or depressions and, thirdly, small pellets of earth (such as remnants of worm casts). The effects of these vary. A certain depth of grass is necessary for

the ball to hold its line, cushioning it over small irregularities; in wet weather the effect of earth pellets, softened by rain, is negligible. Thus, contrary to popular belief, fast dry courts are bad for shooting as they accentuate the irregularities, whilst slow wet courts minimise them. Some of Grundy's best shooting results were recorded at Devonshire Park on slow courts cut up by heel marks.

Dr Grundy points out another fallacy, that the superiority of minus players is largely due to their shooting. It is true that the most consistent good shots are all in the minus class, but the following table shows that in shooting pure and simple the ½ to 5 bisquers are as a class little, if at all, inferior to the minus players, whose superiority lies not in their shooting but in other departments of the game. In the class of 6 bisques and over there are naturally some beginners who have not learnt how to shoot, and hence their average is lower (but note results at 10–15 yards). Grundy did not keep consistent records differentiating between the various handicaps and unfortunately he does not give the total number of shots observed, but the following table illustrates his point:

Grundy attempted to find a simple formula by which a player could quickly work out in his head the percentage chance of a shot being hit. He suggested 400 divided by the distance of the shot in yards. This formula is remarkably accurate up to about 12 yards, but over this distance, although still a rough guide, it progressively underestimates the chance. I suggest that the following is more accurate:

6-12 yards 13-18 yards 19 and over 400 divided by distance in yards 500 divided by distance in yards

To put this to practical application, the approximate chances of the following common shots being hit are:—

Short lift shot Lift shot from baulk	13-14 yards	33% (1 hit in 3)
at ball near peg	(say) 18–22 yards	25% (1 hit in 4)
Medium length tice	(say) 10 yards	40% (2 hits in 5)

All these chances, however, can be affected by psychological factors. For instance, there is a rather worse chance of hitting when taking a suicide shot, when the player is tense, than in a relaxed free shot of equivalent distance when a miss takes the ball to the comparative safety of a distant boundary.

For the year 1934 Grundy quotes the following results for 6-10 yard shots:

HCP -4½ to 0: Shots 430 Hits 50%; HCP ½ to 5: Shots 345 Hits 51%.

He suggests that this result is influenced by the fact that, while all players are more anxious when taking a short shot than a long one, the good players are especially so, as they have, or think they have, more reputation at stake.

Finally, an anecdote illustrating the unreliability of the memory. At the Open Championships in 1938 Dr Grundy heard a player remark: "I cannot hit a ball today. In my last game yesterday I hit every shot". Grundy happened to have recorded all the shots in that game. In fact, the player had hit only 3 shots out of 7, but these were the last three shots which won him the game. Hence the hallucination.

We have no evidence to show whether the players of today are better or worse shots than their predecessors. One suspects that there is little difference, but until some dedicated person emulates Dr Grundy this cannot be proved.

# **Himley Tournaments 1977**

The Handicap Doubles Tournament at Himley Hall is now a well-established annual fixture in the West Midlands Federation Calendar. From the proceeds of an enjoyable Barn Dance, Des Willetts of Stourbridge has presented a handsome silver Rose Bowl to the Federation for annual Doubles Competition. For the first year, 1977–8, the Willetts Bowl stays in the West Midlands with Peter Barnes & David Arthur of Walsall, who convincingly quelled their Scottish opponents in the final, Frank Norton & Jim White, who had taken the Himley Championship title in the two previous years. Visitors were welcomed to this Doubles Tournament from Ellesmere, Maidenhead and Nottingham, as well as from Scotland, and, with a strong entry from local Clubs, made up a full capacity entry of 18 pairs playing on 6 lawns.

For the Handicap Singles in June, an extra lawn was provided to cater for a full entry of 28, including welcome visitors from Nottingham and Southport. (The Scots were, alas, doing battle with the English at Cheltenham this same weekend!) This event was arranged in two groups, with four games for each player, and provided two shield winners, Harry Hawkins of Wolverhampton and Roger Wheeler of Nottingham.

Acknowledgements are gratefully recorded to Dr F.V.X.Norton and to Mr G.Henshaw for the admirable discharge of their official duties as Tournament Referee/Handicapper at the Doubles and Singles respectively, and also to Ken Townsend and his helpers who spent many hours measuring out the lawns and setting out all equipment and accessories, including innumerable "bumper bars". Special thanks are due to the Park Warden at Himley, Mr Riches, and his staff, for starting a project of work to improve the lawns especially for Croquet Tournament play. This work was unfortunately delayed and hampered by very difficult weather conditions, but it is hoped that the longer-term benefits will be appreciated at future tournaments.

During the weekend of October 1–2 1977 a Match is to be held at Himley between Scotland and the West Midlands Federation, whilst other local players relax with a Golf Croquet Event.

Office, so that the Committee can include the players in their deliberations.

The conditions of the award require that a candidate should be an Associate, and that, in determining the award, account is taken both of Club play and play in tournaments.

# Budleigh Salterton May Tournament: May 9-14

For many years now, Croquet has been played throughout the winter at Budleigh, and this year it seems that Nature was determined to have her revenge for such cavalier treatment. Winter had continued for far longer than usual, with the result that many of the lawns were only brought into use a few days before the tournament opened. Hardly anyone had had much opportunity for practice, and felt very rusty, a situation that was evidenced by the amount of grumbling about missing short roquets. This complaint seemed to be contagious: one player would miss a roquet of a yard or so, and leave a dolly rush for his opponent — which he went and missed also.

The wintry conditions with much rain lasted for most of the first four days, but finals day, Saturday, was a glorious day, and there was quite a crowd enjoying the rare treat of sitting out in the sunshine. There were 17 visitors, some old friends, and some newcomers, several of whom made their mark in the longer handicap blocks.

Unfortunately, John Cooper had to withdraw through illness, and this made Bill Perry's task a bit easier in Block 'A'. He won all 5 of his games, the only close one being against Ray Stevens who, after a long struggle, managed to peg out one of Perry's balls. He then crept round with his second ball, until he reached the peg, with Perry's ball for Rover. Time was called during this turn. Ray missed the peg-out with his forward ball, but pegged out the second. This left Perry his final turn, his ball being to the side of Rover, and Stevens' near Hoop 2. Perry hit in, and with an incredible roll back, laid his ball dead in front of Rover, with the other ball just beyond it. Perry made no mistake in finishing off the game to win by 1, but never was victory snatched so late from the jaws of defeat.

In his other games Bill Perry played immaculately, and no one else came anywhere near to beating him. Other items worth recording from Block 'A' are Reg Simpson's glow of pride when he managed to beat Betty Prichard by 23, and the dour struggle that Betty and David Prichard had, when either could have won and Betty did.

Another notable performer was Bill Ovens, who only lost one game in Block 'C', and that by only 1 on time. But if only he could learn to reduce the time that elapses between his walking on to the court and his actual hitting of the ball!

Peter Devitt and she had some hard battles, notably that against David Prichard and Christine Bagnall in the 3rd Round, which they only won by 1. The Doubles Final, between two home pairs, was a close and tense affair, which reached the point where there were three clips on the Peg and one on Rover (the latter belonging to Charles Waller, a very miuch improved local player). Somewhat unwisely, their opponents tried to hit in, instead of joining on the boundary, but they missed. Charles Waller kept his head, rolled up to Rover quite calmly, and completed the course.

# The Peel Memorials: May 16-21

The lawns at Cheltenham had been closed for the winter for the first time for at least ten years; under Mr Whittington's care, after last year's drought, eight lawns had made a very good recovery, and the worst two played better than they looked. A good entry started on a cold May morning with the Draw of the Men's and Women's events, and the holder of the Women's Bowl, the Arkell, as she is affectionately called, had a typically swift win over Mrs Carlisle, to provide the first vacant lawn in one hour. In the Men's, Johnson, whose handicap of 8 was thought by some to be suspect, had two wins, but by no such margin as would justify any reduction "During Play". He beat Scarr by only one point in the first game, and in the second Col. Prichard should have beaten him, for he was lined up for a single peel when he stuck in the fifth hoop, which cost him the game. On Tuesday, however, Johnson won 3 games in the Big Handicap, so he was reduced to  $6\frac{1}{2}$  for the Doubles and the Process.

The Doubles took place on Wednesday, and after two rounds, when Col. Wheeler and Mrs Handley had soundly beaten the redoubtable Johnson and Gladstone, it looked as if the winners of that game might meet Mulliner and Lady Bazley in the Final, which proved to be so.

By Thursday the weather was a little warmer, but a nasty northeast wind started, which reached almost gale force on the Saturday, and took a good deal of pleasure away from the Finals.

Johnson met Mulliner in the Men's Process off his new handicap, and the latter administered a beating by 7; in the Big Handicap Mrs Asa-Thomas beat Johnson by the same amount, so there was nothing very wrong with his starting handicap!

The Tournament was notable, as a glance at the results will show, for the number of close games, and only a few were timed. Gooch did well, and was unlucky in one of his games, when on Rover and Peg he wired himself in one turn, and then in the next turn on a take-off hit the hoop and was hampered and unable to hit his opponent; he lost by 3, having in that game made two very good 3-ball breaks.

By this time Miss Arkell, Mrs Asa-Thomas, Mrs Carlisle, Miss Lodge, Mrs Povey and Mrs Prichard were all running neck and neck for the Women's Bowl. Mrs Povey pegged out one ball, but not the other, with a big lead over Miss Lodge, and the latter got to Penult with both balls; she tried a hoop that was too difficult when, shooting well as she was, it might have been better to shoot at her opponent, who had trickled to a position between the peg and Penult.

Perhaps the most notable game was in the semi-final of the Men's Draw. Mulliner got to the Peg with both balls, missed with one and pegged out the other, with Gladstone's two clips on Hoop 6. Gladstone hit in, and went round on 2-ball breaks in four or five turns to win. In the Process Gladstone, not having learnt the lesson, pegged out one ball against Scarr, who went on to win by one!

Blumer (who should quicken up his game) seemed to play better when his bisques were gone; he beat Jackson and Whittington, and lost only narrowly to Gladstone.

On Friday Mrs Asa-Thomas beat Mrs Elvey at 7 p.m. to put herself in the Final of the Women's Process, and was then rightly called upon by the Manager to play her fourth game of the day, against Mulliner in the semi-final of the Big Handicap. She gave him a splendid game, but lost by 5.

The scheduled Event 5 (instead of the 'Y') was played as a 6-to-a-Block American, the eight most successful competitors taking part in a 3-round knock-out. This provided play for those less successful in the other events right up to Saturday, and Edgar Jackson is to be congratulated on this idea and on his management. The Prize Giving was at 5.45 p.m., with all events finished except for the play-off of the Men's event between Johnson and Blumer; this was a great struggle, not helped by the fiendish wind, and ended a happy tournament at 6.45 p.m.

# Inter-County Championship: May 31-June 3

Just a week before the start of the Inter-County Championship, the Hurlingham Club announced that the three lawns on the Cricket Field would not be available, as they had been forced to take them out of use to carry out remedial work necessary after last summer's drought.

With eight counties having entered (the same as in 1976) there were two possible ways of dealing with the problem. The programme already circulated could be followed with all the cricket field matches being transferred to lawns 4, 5 and 6, where there would be double-banking; or, alternatively, the contest could be extended into Friday afternoon and adjusted so that each county only played six of the others.

Bearing in mind the problems of travelling out of London late on the Friday afternoon before the long Jubilee weekend and the unsatisfactory possibility that the best two counties might not have met, the Chairman of the Council and the Tournament Committee decided that the first alternative would be implemented, that double-banking would be introduced. Although there were some players dead against double-banking, the vast majority agreed with the decision taken. The Manager's ruling that the 3½ hour time limit would not be extended to the double-banked games was not quite so readily accepted.

By Wednesday evening, after four rounds, Berkshire & Oxfordshire were leading with 4 wins, followed by Bedfordshire, Surrey and Midlands in hot pursuit with 3 wins apiece. Middlesex had recorded 2 wins, Devon 1, and Sussex and Eastern Counties were each without a victory.

By Thursday evening there had been a change about. Berkshire & Oxfordshire had lost to both Bedfordshire and Surrey, and Midlands had also lost to both these counties. With one round to go on the Friday morning, Bedfordshire and Surrey each had 5 wins (out of 6), followed by Berkshire & Oxfordshire with 4 wins, Middlesex also with 4, Midlands with 3, Sussex with 1, and Eastern Counties still trailing without a win.

There could not now be a tie as last year, when Midlands and Bedfordshire divided as joint winners, because the two leading counties, Bedfordshire and Surrey, had to play each other at Roehampton, and none of the others could catch them. The writer was playing at Hurlingham on the Friday morning, and so did not see the deciding match, but from all accounts it was a nail-biter which was won by Bedfordshire with the minimum time to spare. Congratulations to Bedfordshire for winning 6 matches out of the 7 they played.

During the week the cameras of the Columbia Broadcasting System had been quietly filming the play in some of the games, and also the presentation of the cup at Roehampton. They intend using this material in a film on Association Croquet to be shown in America later in the year. It appears that croquet players in America feel, when they have played it, that our version of the game is superior to the two other variations played in America, and maybe the film will do something to convert American players to Association Croquet. The Americans for the MacRobertson Trophy in a decade or two maybe?

# Parkstone: June 6-11

This state of affairs was, however, short-lived, and on Thursday the tournament was perforce re-styled The Pools, resulting in a number of games being "anchored" down.

In spite of all this, the week produced some splendid and exciting croquet. The 'A' Opens and the Big Handicap proved to be something of a Mulliner benefit. He achieved the only triple of the week — against your author to ensure its being reported — but had a close call against Pat Newton after having one ball pegged out. However, he survived and was a worthy winner of the Dorset Salver. Against Allen Parker in the final of the Open Handicap he brought fitting excitement with a one-ball game which, but for one vital miss, Allen Parker, who played so competitively, might have won.

In the 'B' Opens Bob Carder was in command and saved the Manager one game by winning both the Draw and the Process. The 'C' Handicap Singles produced some encouraging progress on the part of the finalists, Lionel Wharrad and John McMordie, The former ran out the winner, but will not be able to compete in this event again after suitable adjustment to his handicap.

Humphrey Griffiths and Alec Coleman produced some nailbiting games in their progress through the Handicap Doubles, and eventually met Bob Carder and Alec Rushbrooke in the final, where they beat them for once — without competing additionally with "Father Time". Added interest was given to Finals Day with an exhibition friendly between Dr William Ormerod and the 'A' Opens winner Stephen Mulliner. Suffice it to say that the latter was dealt with as befits the medical profession — clinically!

All in all a memorable and happy tournament, the reporting of which would not be complete without renewed thanks to everyone who helped to make it so, and kindest remembrances of our favourite spectator — Joan Knowles.

# The Men's and Women's Championships: June 20–25

The Fixture List said that the Du Pre Cup and the Mixed Doubles would be single games, and the Manager took it to mean what it said and had planned his week accordingly; he proposed to give the customers their fun by making a big thing of the Golf Croquet. However, there was such an outcry of protest from the customers on arrival, and with a number of C.A. officials at Cheltenham for the England v. Scotland match who could be consulted, the Manager was persuaded to play the Du Pre as Draw and Process, but it was impossible for him so to alter his programme as to play the Doubles also as Draw and Process, as players had already been called for the first two days.

Monday saw the beginning of the Men's and the Women's matches, best of three. Openshaw was the first to win a game, in an hour and a quarter, quickly to be followed by an immaculate triple peel from the holder, Murray. Both of them went on to win their matches, the former clearly showing the improved form which was forecast by the writer last year.

Soutter should have won his first game against Haigh, but in attempting to peg out his opponent, he missed and inadvertently pegged himself out, with a consequent deficit of 5 hoops at that stage; this proved too much for him to overcome, and Haigh confidently won the second game and the match.

Miss Arkell had one of her speedy victories in two games over Mrs Longman. A match which was likely to affect the Final, between Mrs Prichard and Mrs Sundius-Smith, went to the latter after a long hard struggle.

On Tuesday the Women's holder, Mrs Meachem, had her first match, against Mrs Wheeler, and won convincingly in two games. But undoubtedly the highlight of Tuesday's play was the game in the Men's between Murray and Mulliner. It would be boring to report the match in minute detail, but every minute of it was enthralling to watch. Murray won the first game with a perfect triple, and in the second went to 4-back with his first ball. Nothing daunted, Mulliner hit his lift shot, picked up his break, and triple peeled and pegged out his opponent. When he had a lead of seven hoops with his second ball he pegged out his first ball, and so it was one game all. Murray was well on the way to winning the third and vital game when he stuck with his first ball in Penult, circumstances having made him run 4-back with it. Mulliner then started his break, peeled Murray's ball through Penult and subsequently Rover, and pegged him out, thus giving contact. Murray failed to get a 3-ball break going, and although he had one more chance, when Mulliner — unwisely — unnecessarily shot for him on the boundary and missed from about 6 or 7 yards, that essential break eluded Murray, and Mulliner went on to win one of the best matches seen at the 'Caskets' since they have been held at Cheltenham from 1973.

In the meantime the Golf Croquet Singles had been held each

day more or less after tea, with a splendid entry divided into three American blocks of 6, 6 and 7, and this was continued after the Mixed Doubles and some of the Du Pre Draw on Wednesday.

On Thursday the big events were the semi-finals of the Men's and Women's. Miss Joly accounted for Mrs Elvey in two games before lunch, to become a finalist for the second year running. In one of her games, on the fifth turn she went to 4-back, with a first hoop peel for her other ball, having had to get her opponent out of the second corner, and making the first hoop off a long tice. This augured well for her final success. In the other Women's semi-final, played on the "centre court" as it were, there was a terrific in-and-out struggle between the holder, Mrs Meachem, and Mrs Sundius-Smith, the latter winning the third and vital game.

Jackson was in one of his flowing moods and beat Haigh in two games. The other Men's semi-final, between Mulliner and Openshaw, was another 3-game match. Mulliner won the first by 26, but then play somehow became tense and not so good, and Openshaw won the next two, although Mulliner was first to 4-back in both

By this time the Block winners of the Golf Croquet Singles had emerged as Mrs Wheeler, Mrs Sundius-Smith, and McLaren, the play-off to be an American block of three! — and the Golf Croquet Doubles event was started as a conventional knock-out. One or two Du Pre matches were interrupted for the participants to play in the Golf Croquet; not for some time can such a big thing have been made of the Golf Croquet.

The winners and losers of various events worked out very well for the Manager, and it became desirable to play the Men's and Women's Finals on Friday, and the semi-finals and finals of the Mixed Doubles on Saturday. On Friday Openshaw started with a good win against Jackson, and in his second game had completed the first two peels of a quadruple with everything set, when he failed a simple 2-back hoop. Jackson was in and won, and won again to become the 1977 Champion. How he does it and manages as well, so well, none of us really knows, we can only appreciate it.

The Women's Final finished only a few minutes before the Men's, with a 2-game victory for Miss Joly over Mrs Sundius-Smith, which I'm sure was a great compensation for Miss Joly, who had had to retire at 1-all in the 1976 Final owing to the heat. The Golf Croquet Doubles Final was also completed on Friday evening.

In the meantime Murray had progressed to the Final in both sides of the Du Pre. As Mrs Meachem was in the Mixed Doubles, with possibly two games on Saturday, they played the Process Final, with Murray the winner with a triple peel, at approximately 9 o'clock.

On Saturday the Doubles semi-final between Godby & Mrs Meachem and Jackson & Mrs Povey proved to be a game of wonderful spectator value. Mrs Povey got to 4-back in a couple of good turns, and then the innings changed hands for a couple of hours until the final situation emerged as follows: Godby and Jackson pegged out, with Mrs Povey say 14 yards from the peg in

the direction of Penult, and Mrs Meachem for Rover with a 2-yard approach, a hoop she would have run easily in a relaxed situation. She put her ball one foot from Rover, and Mrs Povey trickled to within a foot of the peg. In running Rover, Mrs Meachem failed to get the diversion necessary to get a sight of the peg and her opponent, so she tried to hit the peg back through Rover and just failed. So, with a win for Whittington & Miss Arkell on the other court—not quite so breathtaking—it became an All-Cheltenham Doubles Final.

In the Final Mrs Povey got to 3-back, with Whittington and Miss Arkell both on 1-back, when Jackson got in and just flowed from Hoop 1 to Rover, peeling his partner through 3-back. Disaster overtook the opponents at 1-back, and Jackson & Mrs Povey ran out the winners. Very good efforts on the ladies' parts, with Mrs Povey's handicap 3½ and Miss Arkell's 2½.

In the Golf Croquet Singles Mrs Wheeler and then McLaren both beat Mrs Sundius-Smith, so it all depended on the remaining match, which went to Mrs Wheeler, who becomes the new holder.

The Draw Final of the Du Pre went to Murray, with yet another triple peel against Mrs Prichard, which meant that he had won both sides, and incidentally had done at least one triple peel each day of the tournament.

Chairman (repeat ChairMAN) George Blumer provided excellent lunches, and Miss Allardyce her usual efficient administration.

P.S. An apology from the writer for a mistake in last year's report, which said that Godby had pegged out with his other ball on 2-back. This should have read that his other ball was on Rover.

# **Proposed Alteration to Regulation 10**

At the meeting of the Council on 30th May a resolution was passed that the following New Regulation 10 be introduced. It is therefore published below in accordance with normal practice.

## Regulation 10

- (a) A person who receives payment in money or in kind as a fee or as an allowance for his services or activities as a player shall not be eligible to compete in Tournaments or C.A. Competitions until authorised by the Council.
- (b) Nothing in this Regulation shall prohibit a player receiving an allowance for expenses for:-
  - (i) Coaching
  - (ii) Being a member of a team or participating in an exhibition either of which are authorised by the C.A. Council.
  - (iii)Proceeding overseas at the official invitation of a recognised Croquet Association.

Other alterations in Laws and Regulations

The following alterations, proposed by the Council at their meeting on 12 March 1977 and published in the issue of the Gazette for Spring 1977, were ratified at the Council meeting on 30 May 1977 and became law forthwith:

Law 54 (b) (iv) to read as follows: "This variation is only for singles. The game is started with all clips on the first hoop, but as soon as a player's first ball scores that hoop his other clip is removed to "3-back"

Regulation 22 (b). Delete the sentence "This book is revised up to the week before a tournament is held and is sent to the Manager in time for the draw."

# Croquet Association v. Scotland: June 18-19

Writing as I am during the Wimbledon fortnight about this event, I am inclined to record 'Game and Set to Scotland 6–3'. This is the third year this event has been played, and after visiting Scotland for the two previous matches we were delighted to welcome our opponents on home territory. # Budleigh Salterton II: July 4-9

Glorious summer weather, with blue skies and hot sunshine, favoured this Tournament, which had attracted a capacity entry of 55, including 25 visitors. It had been hoped that 10 lawns would be available this year, but the sudden departure of the groundsman only a few days before the previous week's tournament made it impossible to convert the tennis courts into the tenth croquet lawn. Great credit must be given to those Club members who kept the lawns in such good condition during the Tournament. Although the surfaces became very fast and, in some places, a little uneven, with the dry, hot weather, croquet of the highest standard was produced, with five triples and five singles games finished within an hour.

How fortunate we were in having Betty Prichard as Manager. Under her firm, wise and ever tactful guidance, the programme was completed with a minimum use of time-limits. She also managed to run her ever-popular Extra, which attracted a dozen entries, and which was played "double-banked". The awards were presented by Mrs George Horridge, whose husband has been attending Budleigh tournaments regularly for 27 years. It was pleasing to see the present C.A. Secretary and the previous one playing in the Doubles together, and to have Maurice Reckitt as a visitor once again.

So many matches are worthy of record, but space is limited. We especially remember the game on Tuesday between the two young men, Stephen Mulliner and Mark Ormerod, now both minus players. Mark went to 4-back after hitting the tice with Red. Stephen took his lift shot at Mark's two balls near the 4th corner and missed, Mark then started on his triple, of which the highlight occurred when he only just managed to peel his Red through Rover, and played a superbly executed hoop shot off the wire, so as just to miss what appeared to be an inevitable roquet on Red. He then hit the Blue, took off right behind Red and rushed it straight back through Rover and pegged out. It was a superb exhibition of ball control.

These two met again in an even more enthralling encounter. Mark Ormerod took his first ball to 4-back. Mulliner missed the lift shot, and Mark was off again with his other ball, but broke down at Hoop 3. It was then that Mulliner provided the highlight of the Tournament by hitting in, going right round to the peg, triple-peeling and pegging out his opponent's forward ball in the process. Then there was a lot of cagey positional play by both players, until Mulliner failed to wire his balls completely. Mark hit in and executed a fine 3-ball break to win the game. It was thrilling, exciting master play.

Mulliner's game against Robin Godby, who played so well all the week, was also one to remember. Stephen had reached the peg, and pegged out his forward ball, but returned to the side-line with his other ball. Robin, for Rover and Hoop 3, hit in the length of the lawn, and in his next three turns progressed gradually forwards. But, after two near-misses, Mulliner pegged out with a wonderful long shot from Corner 3.

John Cooper, after a somewhat shaky start to the week, played some first-class croquet, and had some quick, decisive wins. His game against Pat Newton in the Process semi-final was very exciting. The early part of the game was all Newton, who had reached Peg and 4-back before Cooper had really started. Then, with Red on Hoop 2, John played an immaculate break with Yellow, and took it right round to peg out Blue, which he did so vigorously that the Peg was knocked clean out of the ground. Pat Newton, with contact off Red near the 1st corner, took off to Yellow on the East Boundary, and rolled both balls up to 4-back. Although he was very short with Black, he ran the hoop magnificently but only just got through and couldn't hit Yellow. He played off to the West boundary near Hoop 2, and John played his Yellow down to the 1st corner. Pat shot at this and hit, got a perfect rush on Red to Penult, whilst Yellow was croqueted to Rover, and won a very exciting game by 13.

In the final of the Process Godby was winning easily against Pat Newton, but owing to pressure of time had to retire on the peg, leaving Pat to play again against John Cooper, who had beaten Mark Ormerod in the final of the Draw. It was in this game that John found his finest form, winning by 24 and doing a triple peel on the way.

Also to be remembered was the "three hour plus" game between Guy Warwick and George Horridge, who between them totalled 167 years; this game in Event 2 produced splendid tactical croquet with a final margin of only 2. Guy and David Prichard showed what experience can count for when they won the Doubles against tough opposition.

It was a truly memorable week, thoroughly enjoyed by all, with some very high class croquet; indeed, it was Budleigh at its best.

# Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held at the Hurlingham Club on Monday 30 May 1977

The President, Mr E.P.Duffield, took the Chair. There were present Mr J.W.Solomon, Vice-President, and 24 Associates.

1. The Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting, as published in the August 1976 issue of The Croquet Gazette, were approved.

2. The President in his address referred to the death of Miss Daisy Lintern, Vice-President and former Chairman of the Council. He also thanked Mrs Neal for her work as Development Administrator for over six years, and Mr Vandeleur Robinson for his work as Secretary. He then presented Mr Vandeleur Robinson with a record player and a cheque for £210 which had been subscribed for by many Associates.

The report of the Chairman, Mr D.C.Caporn, as printed in the Spring 1977 issue of The Croquet Gazette, was approved.

4. The report of the Treasurer, Mr A.J.Oldham, as printed in the Spring 1977 issue of The Croquet Gazette, was approved. He was thanked for all his work.

5. On a motion proposed by Mrs B.L.Sundius-Smith and seconded by Mr I.C.Baillieu, it was unanimously approved that Mr A.J.Oldham be re-appointed as Treasurer.

- 6. The Secretary reported that as there were only nine candidates for nine vacancies, the following were deemed to have been elected to the Council: D.C.Caporn, D.J.V.Hamilton-Miller, G.B.Martin, Mrs B.Meachem, D.H.Moorcraft, Lt-Col D.M.C.Prichard, Dr G.K.Taylor, Mrs N.Tyldesley, and Dr W.R.D. Wiggins.
- 7. Messrs Nicholass, Ames & Co, were unanimously re-elected as Auditors.
- 8. The President presented D.J.Croker (Phyllis Court Club) with the Apps Memorial Bowl for being the most improved man Associate of 1976, and the Secretary reported that the Steel Bowl for the most improved woman Associate had been awarded to Mrs P.A. Tunmer (Budleigh Salterton), and the Apps/Heley Award for 1976 to the Bath Club.
- 9. The Chairman of the Council proposed a vote of thanks to the President for his taking the Chair at the meeting.

# **Extracts from Proceedings at Council** Meetings

MARCH 16, 1977

- 1. Council Vacancy. D.J.V.Hamilton-Miller was co-opted to fill the vacancy caused by Mr R.F.Rothwell becoming the Secretary.
- 2. Alterations to Law 2c and 4c and Regulation 15 (a) and (b) were approved unanimously. Regulation 10 was referred back to the Laws Committee. On Regulatuion 22 (b) it was resolved unanimously after discussion to retain the first sentence and delete only the second sentence.
- 3. Reports of Committees
  - (a) Laws Committee. It was agreed not to recommend at this stage any changes in the Law in regard to specifications for croquet balls, and that Professor Neal be asked to negotiate with the A.C.C. in general terms to get their reaction to our proposals for ball specification.
  - (b) Publicity & Development Committee. A big recruiting drive at Woking had been very successful. The Bath Club was approved for the Apps/Heley Award (£10). It was stressed that one of the Sports Council's conditions for Grant is the participation of women, also the advantage of Clubs contacting their local Regional Council who were there to assist. It seemed unlikely that Harper & Queen Golf Croquet Competition would take place in 1977. The Council considered a suggestion of running such a competition at Woburn but decided against this. Training Schemes for Middle Bisquers, Referees and Coaching Courses were approved. The pilot film

intended for B.B.C. Television was not suitable, in the B.B.C.'s opinion, for public showing. Mrs Carlisle reported that 6 matches were played in 1976 by C.A. teams against local Clubs and expressed the hope that there would be more in 1977. Any Club who would like a match next year should contact her. The Committee are interested in promoting Croquet in schools if there is a staff member interested. Publicity can be gained from playing games in places open to the public, and all Clubs should try to arrange these wherever possible.

- (c) Finance & General Purposes Committee. It was resolved to retain both the Inter-Counties and Cripps Cups in view of the low price that they would be likely to realise if sold at auction. The Middlesex Union Cake Basket had recently been found in the vaults of the Hurlingham Club. It was proposed that this be retained, and this was carried by 13 votes to 6. The Council agreed that it be used as a replacement for the two stolen Ladies Field Candlesticks by 13 votes to 3. It was agreed that a reasonable sized plinth for the Basket be purchased on which would be inscribed the names of the winners, and that the original names on the face of the Basket be removed but the inscription round the rim (indicating that it was the gift of Mrs Henry Franc) be retained. The proposed £20 payment to the Cheltenham Club to stage the match v. Scotland on June 18-19 was approved without creating a precedent. Mr Godby was appointed to make arrangements and pick a suitable England team. The list of C.A. Winners had been updated from 1970 to 1976, and a copy would soon be available to any Associate who wanted it. The Council agreed to insure all trophies at sale and not replacement value. Mr Robinson would act as Membership Secretary until May 30th. The negotiations with the Hurlingham Club regarding our office (only the rear room) had been completed with the offer of a new Lease for 4 years at £750 per annum inclusive.
- 4. Secretary's Report The Secretary reported with regret the death of 11 members. Of the returns from Registered Clubs received to date (42 out of 72) the number of Associates was 404 compared with 828 Non-Associates. It was reported that The Palace, Wells Club had been registered and that the following new Clubs were likely to register in the near future: Charing Cross Hospital Medical School; Ingatestone (Essex); Mamorbey Park, Sidcup (Bexley Borough Adult Centre).
- The Club Conference was agreed for Saturday 6th December at Hurlingham. (It was subsequently discovered that accommodation was not available, and so the date was changed to November 26th.)
- 6. Alteration in Handicaps. After discussion it was agreed in principle that some form of sliding scale should be adopted for general increase in handicap in 1978. This was referred back to the Handicap Co-ordination Committee to consider and
- Any Other Business. A possible visit of croquet players from Egypt was reported. The winners of the 1976 C.A. Medals in New Zealand were Mrs F.W.Peters of Dunedin (Silver) and J.W.McNab of Christchurch (Bronze). It was agreed that there would be no objection to the name of Rothmans being added to the Programmes of Tests in New Zealand. On the subject of 'Sport for All' to be held in Hyde Park on July 23-24 it was agreed that the C.A. should participate in some form (possibly a stand with Literature etc.). It was reported that in the coming reprint of "Know the Game" it was necessary to cut out the green backgrounds to the illustrations in the text to keep down costs. Mr Birch had in the past supplied plaques for the All-England Handicap at cost and would continue to do so. The Council were very grateful to him for this.

The Test Tour Fund for the 1979 Series would be launched shortly.

A Loyal Address was being sent to our Patron.

The Secretary reported the gift of two silver sweet dishes presented by Mrs A. Milns in October 1975 for the Handicap

Doubles event in the second week of the Devonshire Park Tournament. Mrs Millns had been thanked in a letter from Mr Robinson, but the gift had regrettably not been mentioned in the report of the tournament in the gazette, nor had it been reported previously to the Council.

The intended resignation of Peter Hallett as Editor of the Croquet Gazette after nearly seven years was received by the whole Council with very much regret. Several members spoke in high praise of the excellent work and long hours he had put in and the excellent results that he had achieved. It was agreed that as we have only four issues of the gazette each year we should revert to a former practice and title them "Spring", "Summer", "Autumn" and "Winter".

#### MAY 30 1977

1. The Middlesex Union Cake Stand, which replaces one of the pair of Ladies Field Candlesticks which were stolen, is insured for £275, the amounted offered for it by Aspreys. It is not practicable to erase the inscription.

2. Golf Croquet Competition. Harper & Queen had to cancel this owing to the lack of a sponsor.

3. Croquet Gazette. The Chairman reported that Mrs D.M.C. Prichard had offered to take over from Revd P.D.Hallett as Editor of the Croquet Gazette at the end of 1977. This offer was accepted with acclaim. The Chairman referred to the excellent work put in by Peter Hallett over a period of seven years as Editor, and the Council unanimously voted to make him an Honorary Life Associate.

4. The Council. It was resolved that Mrs Tyldesley would serve for a two year term as member. She was welcomed to the meeting by the Chairman.

5. Chairmen. D.C.Caporn was elected as Chairman for the ensuing year, and likewise Dr R.W.Bray as Vice-Chairman. 6. Standing Committees. The list was tabled by the Chairman.

- 7. Selection Committee. It was unanimously resolved that the following be elected for the ensuing year: G.N.Aspinall, I.C.Baillieu, D.J.V.Hamilton-Miller, Lt-Col D.M.C. Prichard and S.S.Townsend. The Chairman thanked Professor B.G.Neal and R.F.Rothwell for their past services.
- 8. Notice of Motion by I.C.Baillieu: "No Club be permitted to enter the Inter-Club Competition unless it can provide bonafide lawns for playing croquet".
- 9. Alteration to Law 54 (b) (iv) and Regulation 22 (b), as previously published in the gazette, were passed unanimously and so become Law.

10. Reports of Committees

(a) MacRobertson Shield Committee

The following proposals were all approved: the itinerary from January 4th to February 16th 1979, that each visiting Nation must pay for its own international travel and accommodation, that teams will be of 6 players plus a non-playing Manager, subject to availability of players and adequate funds being available.

(b) Handicap Co-Ordination Committee on Handicap Revisions I.C.Baillieu considered that the proposal to introduce an alteration in the structure of handicap alterations on a differential scale was not constitutional. After discussion it was resolved that the Handicap Co-ordination Committee should consider necessary amendments to Regulations 22, 23 and 24 and report back to the Council. The Chairman, in the meantime, ruled that the Council had power to alter the structure of handicaps.

(c) Handicap Co-Ordination Committee on Procedure for Raising Handicaps

(i) After discussion it was passed by 18 votes to 2 that handicaps be raised: Scratch or under - an increase of 11/2 bisques; 1/2 to 4 — an increase of 1; 41/2 to 71/2 bisques an increase of ½, these to be effective for the 1978 season.

(ii) The recommendation that the lower handicap limit be altered from -5 to -4 was lost by 10 votes to 7.

(d) Laws Committee

Regulation 10 was amended. This appears elsewhere in this issue of the gazette, and will be reconsidered by the Council at a subsequent meeting.

11. Secretary's Report. The Secretary reported the number of paidup Associates as on 30th May 1977 was as follows:

Resulting from the proformas sent to all Registered Clubs. of which 61 had replied, there are 532 Associates and 1199 non-Associates.

The deaths of the following Associates were reported with deep regret: Christopher Haworth, David Owen, Miss M.S. Tyrrell.

- 12. Devonshire Park. It is now hoped that 7 or 8 lawns will be available for the 1977 Tournament. The Tournament Committee were asked to sound the Southwick Club as a possible venue for the South of England Championships for 1978, and to consider the possibility of holding them at Devonshire Park in May before the Eastbourne Corporation's Lawn Tennis season gets under way. This possibility had been suggested by the Corporation's ground staff.
- 13. Silver Jubilee Fund. The Chairman proposed that the contribution to the Silver Jubilee Fund by the C.A. should be made up to £100, if necessary, out of C.A. Funds. This was agreed unanimously.

14. Club Conference. The date for this was changed to Saturday 26th November 1977.

CROKEY is an indoor game for 2 or 4 players based on Croquet, played on a checkerboard fitted with hoops and centre-peg. Counters, representing balls, are moved in a

CROKEY has three variants: Sequence Crokey, a game of pure skill modelled on Golf Croquet; Crokey, a game of pure skill based on Association Croquet; and Error Crokey which is Crokey with an element of luck, requiring the use of two packs of playing cards (not provided with CROKEY). Sequence Crokey is suitable for younger children; Crokey and Error Crokey for older children and

The essential feature of CROKEY is the 'break', i.e. a turn of one move extended to several moves, achieved by skilful positioning of the counters. In this respect the simulation of Croquet is so close that aspiring Croquet players will find Crokey of great value in visualising and practising the ingenious tactics of the outdoor game.

ERROR CROKEY introduces moves to represent poor shots in Croquet. Situations which can now be simulated include: a misjudged approach to a hoop, a ball rebounding from or sticking in a hoop, and a missed roquet. These misfortunes, coming unawares and at random, are fun, but they also play an essential role in balancing a game between experts. Moreover, players can allot any desired degree of chance to a game to bias it towards skill or luck.
