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

An Ounce of Practice . . .

'You are not permitted to practise, either by yourself or in a knock-up game with someone else, on any court, at any time, before, during or after play without permission of the manager. This regulation for tournament play is customary for all match play.' (Croquet To-day by M.B.Reckitt.)

Maybe there are some croquet players who can recall the purpose of this regulation and why it still remains unchanged, but a limited time allowed to knock up as with other games does not seem unreasonable. Apart from enabling those who are not familiar with the court to get the feel of it, all should benefit from a little loosening up, and it could lead to a faster game. At present, in the average game a lot of time is taken up getting through the first two hoops. If the knock-up were limited to five minutes, the effect on the duration of a game of two to three hours would, anyway, be almost negligible. I have the support of many players in asking the Council to consider a knock-up for all games.

Oh to be in Wellington . . .

Extracts from a letter received from Dorothy Devitt which will interest their many friends in England and which paints an enticing portrait of New Zealand.

'We have been here nearly a year and have enjoyed every moment. It was the most beautiful summer I ever remember. Within three weeks of our arrival we had joined a croquet club and bought a delightful tiled house (many have tin roofs). It is divided into two flats — my daughter and her family have the upstairs one. The garden is enormous: forty pine trees (complete with fifty-odd opossums), an orchard with lemon and grapefruit trees, raspberries, pears, plums and a stream. Food is very cheap and there is a wonderful selection of fruit and vegetables . . .

'The New Zealanders are great do-it-yourself people. Most of the women spin and others make beautiful pots in raw clay. Half the croquet people are painters and are able to sell their pictures. I have started macramé which has nearly driven me mad. Jim spends hours carving bone . . .

'Jim and I plan to take our caravan to the South Island for the big welcome. We both think the standard of croquet is high — at the Dominion Tournament, Jackson, Skinley and Heenan were in tremendous form, but John Prince was not playing as well as we had seen him in England. Many more people play croquet here more women than men — and many women are $-2\frac{1}{2}$ and -3 and you see them doing triple peels in tournaments. There are few referees; Jim has been accepted readily, and his slightly different techniques have gone down well. He has been giving lectures on a laws course for umpires (used a lot out here). The coaching in Clubs is good. All white is pretty well insisted on for tournaments - there was a tremendous stir when I walked out in my straw boater — the ladies love their uniform and pork-pie hats. We have joined a second club this year where the lawns are the best in the country and as true as those three good ones at Hurlingham. The game is not so gentle - due mainly to there being no boundary boards or wires - at one tournament I was blooded all over from scratches after retrieving my balls from a prickly hedge. Our handicaps have both been reduced to 41/2. Your season must be nearly over - ours started in September.'

Roving Eye

Readers will be glad to know that **William Ormerod**, who was taken ill during the President's Cup, is now out of hospital and making good progress. Much sympathy was felt for his new wife **Marian** whom he married only a few weeks earlier and even more for both of them in that this illness put paid to William's chances of being selected for the imminent tour in New Zealand.

Steve Mulliner has announced his engagement to **Sarah Speirs**. She has started to play croquet and when he suggested next August for the wedding she asked: 'Has the date of the President's Cup got anything to do with it?' She is obviously a fast learner.

The following caught my eye, written more than **one hundred years** ago: 'Most men will look almost graceful when dressed in white flannel knickerbockers, with jacket, waistcoat, shirt and cap to match'.

The tragedy of the year must be **Wrest Park**'s disqualification from the Inter Club Championship. They had won, against all the odds, against Roehampton (with Vic Rees and John Wheeler beating Nigel Aspinall and Steve Mulliner respectively) only to discover that they had included in their side one player who had played for another Club in an earlier round. The rules for eligibility for both the Club Championship and the Inter Counties are by no means unduly narrow so they must be adhered to.

John and Sue Prince have a three-year-old son who is already keen on croquet but 'Nicholas', writes John, 'will be kept well away from the Clubs during the test series as he would have little respect for what was involved!' The Princes have a new address: 109 Park Road South, Hastings, New Zealand. John is the New Zealand Captain and it will be the third series in which he has met Bernard Neal and Nigel Aspinall, our Captain and Vice-Captain.

The Australian team was to be chosen after the A.C.C. Carnival in Brisbane at the end of September. The only all-male State team (South Australia) look strong: J.Magor (capt), M.Prater, W.Smith, N.Spooner, C.Pickering. The last named was runner-up to Bill Smith in the S.A. Champion of Champions event: he is a player who is improving fast and has mastered the triple with ease. Most S.A. players are masters at this fine finish.

Brian Sykes and Sue Foden, both members of the victorious Oxford team this year, were married in September and celebrated by winning the handicap Doubles at the South of England Championships at Southwick a fortnight later. They will both be associated with Wolfson College again next year. Brian is Handicap 2½ now (from 10 this year) and Sue came down 5½ bisques in the last six weeks to 7½. Which is all good news for Oxford. Should Oxford not now form a Club comparable to the Heley Club for past members of the University?

William Prichard was interviewed on the British Forces Broadcasting Service about Croquet and did his best to dispel some of the myths about the game. He was asked to do another interview on his return from New Zealand.

Stop Press. **John Solomon** announced after the final of the Club Championships that he had played his last game of competitive croquet. One can well understand that he could not be satisfied by anything less than perfection, after his legendary successes over the past thirty years, but players all over the world will regret his decision. He is only 47 so we hope that like that other legend, Pavlova, he will come back again — and again.


Shooting at the Peg

When a player has one ball pegged out and the other a rover, he is faced with the alternative of shooting at a ball or at the peg. One often hears the maxim 'the ball is a bigger target than the peg'. Even such a pundit as Lord Tollemache goes so far as to say on the last page of his pamphlet *Hints on Practice*, *Tactics and Stroke Play* (1923) that 'a half-lawn shot at the peg is the same as a full-lawn shot at a ball'. This presumably is based upon the assumption that the equivalent targets for ball and peg are in the ratio of

 $\frac{3.625 \text{ in. (diam. of ball)}}{1.5 \text{ in. (diam. of peg)}} = 2.4 \text{ to } 1.$

Thus he contends that a ball at 34 yards presents the equivalent target to the peg at 13 yards. But this is a fallacy, as it would only be true if the ball were of pin-point size instead of 35/8 in. diameter.

Consider the diagram below



A,B and D are in a straight line and the balls are in such a position that FH is a tangent to both peg and object ball. ACE is drawn parallel to FH. If the centre of the striker's ball (A) follows the line ACE, the ball will make grazing contact with both peg and object ball, i.e. both offer the same angular width of target.

Their respective distances are AB and AD and $\frac{AB}{AD} = \frac{BC}{DE}$

BC = $\frac{1}{2}$ diam. of peg + $\frac{1}{2}$ diam. of ball = 2.5625 in. DE = $\frac{1}{2}$ diam. of ball × 2 = 3.625 in.

If we take AB as 10 yards, then $\frac{10}{AD} = \frac{2.5625}{3.625}$

Therefore AD = 14.15 yards and thus at any distances ball and peg present targets in the ratio of 1.4 to 1 instead of 2.4 to 1. A rough rule of thumb is that it is better to shoot at the peg if it is less than two-thirds the range of the ball.

Another matter of interest arises. What is the probability of hitting the peg when shooting from the side boundary (13 yards) within a given number of shots? Thirteen yards at the peg is the equivalent of $13 \times 1.4 = 18$ yards at a ball. Now we know from Dr Grundy's statistics that the chance of an average shot hitting a ball

at 18 yards is 25 per cent. Whilst the chance of each individual shot is always 25 per cent, the initial probabilities within a given number of shots (cutting out the mathematics) are:

The Modified Grading System

N - - C D - L - L'II'---

The grading system described in the Spring 1978 Gazette has been extended to include all Advanced games played. As a result, the performances of some 150 players have been reviewed. The extension of the system has demanded certain modifications which are explained below.

(1) If every Advanced game is to be used for grading, every player must have a grade. Where a player fails to qualify for a 'full' grade, i.e. not playing twelve relevant games in a twelve-month period, he can still qualify for a 'provisional' grade. These are distinguished from full grades by a *, i.e. 85 and 85*. They permit an opponent to score points towards grading but do not qualify the provisional grader to appear on a ranking-list because he will have played too few games for the result to be statistically reliable. Provisional grades will usually be awarded on a handicap-related basis, i.e. currently h'cap $3 = \operatorname{grade} 90, 2 = 100, 1 = 110$, etc. They can also be changed if a player plays at least eight games per twelve-month period.

(2) The prototype system operated on a seasonal basis only. In order to fit in with the Eights selectors' year (app. 1 Aug. to 31 July) and to make the system more sensitive to changes in form during a season there are now two grading points and two grading periods in each season. The former are 31 July and 31 Oct., i.e. immediately before Hurlingham and the end of the annual season respectively. The latter are the two halves of a season on each side of 31 July and would be referred to as '1978(1)' and '1978(2)' in 1978.

However, the gradings are still calculated on a twelve-month period basis to maintain statistical reliability.

(3) When opponents of grades 50 or more apart meet and the better player duly wins, the game is ignored in calculating the gradings of both. This replaces the modification given in the prototype system whereby the better player was assured of a score not less than his own grade. Where the better player loses, the game is obviously relevant to both gradings and so will be used. As more games are used in this version the best players' grades are rather higher than in the prototype. The majority of current A-class players seem to fall into the 95 to 125 range.



The Croquet Handyman

1. A Referee's Gauge

This essentially is a feeler gauge to measure the distance between the ball and the wires and so establish the exact position of the ball relative to the hoop. The gauge consists of a ½-inch-thick wooden wedge, tapering from 1 in. to a point and is marked off in arbitrary units along its length. It can also be used in place of a square mallet to determine whether a ball has run a hoop. A thinner plastic version of the gauge could be carried in the cover of the 'laws'.

2. Manager's Sash


Most Managers appoint a deputy to act for them while they are playing. It is easier for players, for the real Manager and for his deputy if the duty Manager wears a mark of authority. We have used a sash of red braid. You need two yards of red wool braid (not less than 1 in. wide) on which the word MANAGER is embroidered in thick white cotton in chain stitch. To get the correct spacing mark out the letters with a running stitch first.

The end of July saw the birth, in Sussex, of a lively infant — Compton's new, open, genuine (two-day) weekend tournament, tailored to suit the schedule of the working man. There were some anxious moments: five lawns, flooded after torrential rain, drained miraculously in time for play at 9.30; and on Sunday afternoon Borrett needed to win by at least +21 against Harris to win his block but everyone had to wait for one and a half nail-biting hours before Harris scored the vital sixth point. So it was Phillips who played — and narrowly beat — Rose in a match made even more exciting by both players missing their peg-out twice, to become the first winner of the Compton Open Weekend HORN (an unusual trophy of a copper post horn). Everyone had six games in two days (a few had to play four games in a day), surely unbeatable value at £1.50. This will become a regular feature at Compton, and hopes were voiced that other Clubs would follow suit.

Tempted by the prospect of playing on the famous fast lawns, a large number of visitors descended on Colchester this year. Nine came from Phyllis Court and three from Edinburgh. Even though the rain this year has slowed the courts down the Scots, at least, found it a welcome change to be able to rush balls the length of the lawn easily. Not without internal misgivings, the Club had decided to run the big handicap as an American Event with a play-off between block winners. There were two blocks of six and two blocks of five, giving everyone at least four games in this event; the general opinion was that the experiment had proved a success. The manager's lot was not a happy one since many more games had to be played, but Edward Duffield with his calm manner made it all seem effortlessly simple, ars est celare artem. Having only four lawns of their own, the Club is fortunate in being able to use Dr Dean's lawn at Wivenhoe. It is a very fast, true lawn where one plays peacefully undisturbed; the only spectators are statues staring stonily from the shrubbery.

Stephen Wright played consistently well all week, winning the big handicap. Every time he was in play he seemed to be peeling away happily doing doubles or triples. His only defeats were in the Opens against Michael Heap, the eventual winner of both Draw and Process. Michael, although suffering from lack of sleep caused by a seven-month-old daughter, managed to win both games from behind by narrow margins. Stephen also won the doubles with Humphrey Hicks. Their styles are in complete contrast; Stephen gets right down to it, squatting on his haunches and holding his mallet near the head; Humphrey hardly stoops at all, even for full rolls.

Mrs Abderhalden played so well in her first game that her handicap was reduced immediately. Her husband was more canny and saved himself for finals day when he won his event.

Other things besides croquet are important at a tournament. The lunches and teas were excellent and the well-stocked help-yourself bar just in the pavilion was much appreciated. More importantly, a tournament is where one meets old friends and makes new ones. In this respect the intimate atmosphere and friendliness of Colchester make a lasting impression.

It was late in the day before Tyrwhitt Drake drew attention to Law 39, and one had to agree with Omar Khayyam that, like the spent arrow, the wrongly dismissed croquet ball could not then be recalled. It is astonishing how often Law 39 is forgotten even by experienced players.

The Open Championships, 17-22 July, held at Hurlingham and Roehampton

Hopes can soar or plummet on the chances of the draw, but scrutiny showed that there were eight Test Tour possibles in each half, with the top half seeming the more star-studded and the fourth quarter the softest. The first clash of champions was between William Ormerod and Keith Wylie and within forty-five minutes Wylie had completed a three-ball triple peel — a feat held by some to be more skilful than a sextuple. The fourth ball remained throughout on the centre of the South boundary. This was followed by a normal triple with Wylie playing so perfectly that he almost satisfied himself. Interest then shifted to John Solomon and Murray. Solomon belied his shaky return to championship croquet in June and displayed his old artistry in a triple peel. Murray refused to be dazzled and retaliated with a fine triple himself. The deciding game started with a series of boundary mishaps before Murray embarked on another triple; disaster struck, as it so often does, at the Rover hoop, giving Solomon an easy rush to his first hoop. With his blue ball on 4 back Solomon's black would not run, and, after a hammer stroke rescued it at Hoop 3, it failed altogether at Hoop 4 and that was the end. It was Bernard Neal who drew the late house: he was fighting for his life against two opponents: Vincent Camroux and Apollyon in the shape of Court 9 on the cricket field. The crowd drew nearer as it grew darker (there were more spectators even then than waited for the finals late on Saturday afternoon), and at 9.30 Camroux was lined up for the peg — but the front ball missed! Neal hit the remaining ball from twenty yards and within ten minutes had scored his last three points to win by 1.

Roger Bray warns that he may not be able to manage this event next year so his system must be recorded. Faced with two difficulties (Mulliner could not play on Monday and Prichard not until after 4 pm), Bray put the only first-round doubles match on on Monday morning; he guessed - rightly - that it would be hard fought and long. All possible singles were put on (33 games) and three whole matches were completed on Lawns 1 and 2 - an aggregate of twelve games on two lawns. One third-round match was played which gave Godby a convincing win over Wright, but no-one was asked to start a third match. Tuesday too was devoted to singles, an important ploy. The most urgent was a first-round match between Prichard and Roberts. This went to three games with Roberts, at his first appearance at these Championships, impressing with his shooting, while he was let down by uncontrolled hoop-running and variable splits. Prichard went straight on against Haigh and sparked at once to take the first game with a triple. Haigh then showed the spirit which made him a table tennis international thirty years ago, and hit in and approached hoops from all distances to win the second game by 20. He started well in the third, but Prichard treated the late-evening 'vultures' to a masterly triple. Another second-round victory of note was that of Neal over Hope, after the latter had run away with the first game (Hope missed his tice but hit it on the return journey after Neal missed his wide join). Neal then went on to the critical match against Heap, but when each had a win-cum-triple under his belt they called it a day. Murray snatched his first game from Hemsted, but dominated the second — a fine win over a player who has been in such good form. Wylie again produced two copybook triples before lunch. So by dusk all but two candidates for the Plate were known and Bray decided to reinstate Draw and Process and to start them on Wednesday afternoon - a decision welcomed by the twenty-three entries and not regretted by Bray who only had to scratch one blocking player from one side — Openshaw.

Wednesday was devoted to reducing the sixteen remaining doubles pairs to four. The outstanding match was the defeat of the

champions by Hands and Hicks on the cricket field. Wright was round to 4 back by 11 o'clock but Heap approached Hoop 1 five times before he ran it one hour later at the sixth attempt when Hands broke down on him at 2 back, but Heap only got to Hoop 6. Hicks seized the opportunity to go smoothly from 1 back to the peg and Hands soon made his last six points - the opponents had four shots between hoops, but all missed. The second game was all Heap and Wright, but the third was a replica of the first except that this time Hicks hit a long shot and started his break from Hoop 3 to the peg with an adventurous split. Hicks and Hands were unable to maintain their impetus in the third round, losing the first game to Openshaw and Cousins that evening. Murray and Hope had crushed Camroux and Haigh with Murray in triple-peeling form only to meet a faultless Wylie and Prichard with Wylie again completing two triples. Aspinall did a triple which included two cannons when playing with William Ormerod against Mulliner and Mark Ormerod (the former did not take croquet and the latter made a fatal error at Hoop 5). In the second game the Ormerods jockeyed neck and neck for position until they both joined Mulliner on 4 back. Aspinall was hitting in well and when Mulliner jumped Hoop I only to stick by Hoop 5 the game was soon over. Neal and Hemsted lost the first game to Colin Prichard and Godby, but after they had won the second the decider was put off until Friday.

Two matches on Thursday brought the singles to the quarterfinals. William Prichard met Mulliner, and, after a blunder each, the latter went round to 4 back (161/2 minutes) and 17 minutes later Prichard joined him there. Mulliner from A baulk hit Hoop 4 and stayed there, enabling Prichard to do a promotion cannon to Hoop l and to go out with a triple. Mulliner was again round first in the next game, but his second ball had problems at Hoop 4 and missed a return roquet, from which moment Prichard took control and went out with another fluent triple peel. In the deciding game between Heap and Neal, the latter was on 4 back and peg when Heap embarked on a sextuple peel, but when he broke down it looked all over for him. However, in a close approach to penultimate, Neal's ball lurched sideways and Heap pulled the game out of the fire. Meanwhile, Eric Solomon met Godby in the bottom quarter and had soon won a game with a triple peel. Godby played cleverly and accurately to take the second, but all in vain because Solomon played a tight game, giving very little away in the decider. In the top half Aspinall was playing Hands and asking himself how it was possible to beat a man who hit in every time and Hands might well have been asking the same question. In the first game Aspinall won by four after eight long shots running had been hit; yet Hands made only one mistake when he missed a short cut rush. The second game progressed rapidly - neither dared lay up - until with Hands on peg and 4 back Aspinall pegged out the front ball. Hands did not get position from the contact but hit in again and took position for 4 back. After running it Hands missed two 25-yard shots running, mirabile dictu, and Aspinall went out with enviable assurance from Hoop 2. William Prichard's blue ball was first round against Wylie but his black went off in Corner IV when trying for a rush to Hoop 4. Wylie went to 4 back (peeling black through Hoops 4 and 5 to deter a triple, to facilitate his favourite Hoop 4 leave and with the intention of peeling it through Hoop 6 as well to put Prichard to the tactical disadvantage of being for 1 back and 4 back). Black hit the lift and with two promotion cannons set up a perfect break only to stick in 2 back. Wylie got both balls to the peg when he sent black off in the last croquet stroke. Prichard again hit the lift and in two turns, with a tight leave, scored his last ten points. Wylie hit his tice, but the balls were recalcitrant and he missed a hampered shot after 1 back and left Prichard an easy break of which he took full advantage, going out in two turns with a pretty triple.

The singles semi-finals were played on Friday morning (the idea of starting them on Thursday was abandoned). Heap played meticulously against Eric Solomon and built up a slow standard triple without giving a chance. Solomon was in first in the next game but made several mistakes — the fatal one being an almost impossible Hoop 5. With Heap on 4 back they broke for lunch. Afterwards Heap, with a delicate touch especially in his split shots, executed an interesting delayed triple. William Prichard too was placing his balls on a blade of grass; his leaves throughout were testing to his opponents. He took the first game against Aspinall with a triple peel, and although Aspinall was first round in the second, William Prichard hit the lift and joined him on 4 back. Aspinall had to take a shot, so he lifted the ball against Hoop 4 and just nicked the edge of the ball which he could see behind Hoop 2 and went out in that turn. Sometimes Aspinall has an air of déja vu, but come the third game and all that disappears, and, like the great player he is, reserves of determination and skill sweep him to victory. After lunch Aspinall allowed Prichard four long shots, all fated to miss (one even went through the perfect double) to win by

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The ends of doubles were cleared up — the most notable feat being a lightning Hands break to peg out Cousins (who had played well), which was nullified by the intelligent way Openshaw used the contact to score his last five points. The semi-finals were not outstanding: too many mistakes inducing too much consultation, some gesticulatingly animated, some obstinate and some with brains apparently ticking over in neutral. It was a bitterly cold evening and the spectators filtered home.

The Doubles final was played first on Saturday and the first game was dominated by Aspinall and Ormerod. After hitting a lift Cousins made a couple of hoops, but Openshaw had only one slim chance, right at the end when Ormerod, inadvertently, split him to position for his first hoop - uncharacteristically botched. Openshaw is thought by some to be the best striker of the ball and safest hoop-runner in the game. The second game started with Aspinall in Corner II, and Ormerod missing the opponents wide on the East boundary. 211/2 minutes later Openshaw was on 4 back. Cousins made only one hoop after Ormerod missed the lift, but after a few tactical ripostes between these two Aspinall took charge and within 121/2 minutes was also on 4 back. Cousins again hit the lift but could not dig the enemy balls out to make much progress and lunch was taken with Ormerod laid up for a break. After duly reaching the peg it was Openshaw who hit in and a spell of tense and exciting play ended with Openshaw on the peg and Cousins running the Rover hoop. Determined to get the rush back to the peg, he ran too far and missed the return roquet an undeserved end to stalwart play from the only unranked player among three of the top four in the 1977 President's Cup. This was Aspinall and Ormerod's fifth win in eight years.

It was the best singles final seen for some years. Heap went to 4 back in the fourth turn; after hitting the lift Aspinall made only one hoop and Heap went out with a standard triple. Aspinall started well in the second game, getting his blue to 4 back, but his black stuck at Hoop 2; Heap's ball had so much forward spin that although he hit the wire it spun on to black. Thanks to a brave takeoff to behind a ball on a tricky North boundary Heap got a difficult break going but only as far as Hoop 4 and he never got in again: how easy Aspinall made it all look. Wide joins on the East boundary were in vogue throughout the week but none was wider than Aspinall's in the decider; Heap had laid a nineteen-yard tice. Heap could only laugh and wonder if he dared risk the shot from B. baulk which would leave his balls together. Caution prevailed, so he shot from Corner 1, missed, and although Aspinall missed his seventeen-yard shot he kept the innings and in under thirty minutes he had swept to victory with a sparkling triple peel.

It must have given Roberts and Mulliner added pleasure to be in the Play-off of a Plate which contained half last year's President's Cup plus John Solomon: 'He that wrestles with us strengthens our nerves and sharpens our skills'. Mulliner joins Colin Prichard in winning the Plate when it had the added prestige of being Draw and Process.

Perhaps a few were kept away by the fear of a cut-off by handicap, and of those who did play seven did not win a match, but without them the entry would indeed have been meagre. There may well be a case for limiting the Doubles to sixteen pairs, but more singles could have been accommodated even with Lawn 5 out of commission. The three cricket field lawns were a bit unpredictable, and one mistake was never fatal. The four main lawns were easy paced and provided the majority of the three dozen triple peels; the big four Aspinall, Heap, Prichard and Wylie had six each. Murray came next and most notable of the others was that of Mark Ormerod who tripled Hemsted out at Roehampton. Much use was made of Roehampton (except for doubles) and several Plate matches there on Friday eased the pressure on courts. There may have been a modicum of luck: there was only one really long doubles match; Aspinall was the two-final player this year, playing twenty-one games with ease (Prichard played nineteen in four days and Openshaw and Mulliner eighteen). All the Test tour hopefuls were given an equal opportunity to display their various talents, and credit must be given to management: it showed forethought, fairness, firmness and — not least — flexibility.

Cheltenham, 24-29 July

The Cheltenham Club made further innovations for its Annual Tournament by deciding that not only would the Class Events be started with American blocks of four to be followed by a play-off, but that the length of the games should be determined by what now seems to be known as the Bray system (it has nothing to do with the vicar, or the donkey), which legislates that the combined handicaps of the contestants should determine whether they will play a 26-point, a 22-point or an 18-point game. All would have been well had not the entries closed with a full house, before the holder of the Opens and the holders of the Doubles had applied, so the Manager stored up for himself credit marks on reaching the Pearly Gates by letting in the aforementioned, though it meant adding at least twenty-one games to the two hundred and thirtyfive that were already envisaged. So it was a good thing that among the competitors there were no less than five who were Doctors of Science, or Philosophy (Mathematics, etc.), in case their help had been required. Fortunately it was not, as the Manager, unable to start the morning play before 10 o'clock on the Monday, conceived the idea of starting at 9.45 am on the other days, which seemed to please many people, for on the Tuesday four-fifths of the games had been started by a minor official before the Manager had arrived at 9.35 am, which made him very happy, and was a good thing, as he had nobly agreed to stop play at 7.30 pm and actually pegged down seven games in order that the Club could hold an Auction Sale. This was very successful and would enable them to send about £250 to the Croquet Association Test Tour Fund, and surely must mean more credits to the Manager for his patience, when it comes to the Great Day of Reckoning.

Monday saw three rounds of the Open Handicap nearly completed, with the most notable feature being Mrs Soutter beating Tucker in under an hour, and then proceeding to demolish Dr C.A.Parker, and was well on the way to defeating E.E.Rees when the game had to be pegged down.

Johnson and Bond had three good wins on the first day, and it was rather a pity that they were in the same half of the draw. As it was, Rees won his pegged-down game against Mrs Soutter and went on to meet and beat Bond in the Final.

The aforementioned early start on the Tuesday, which began the Class Events, enabled Jackson to walk on the court at 9.45 and play the luckless Latham who hit the two balls into the court and had three lift shots which narrowly missed. However, he made up for this later by a splendid win over Read who in turn, improving with every game, had a classic game with Moorcraft. Moorcraft hit his tice and went to four back. Read hit the lift shot and went to four back; Moorcraft missed the lift; Read did a standard Triple, the only one completed during the week.

Wednesday was Doubles Day when there were no less than twelve husbands and wives playing together, two parents and sons, and one mother and son-in-law. In the second round in the afternoon, the Wheelers v. Tucker and Mrs Asa-Thomas produced a very exciting ending. Tucker and Mrs Wheeler were on the peg, and Mrs Asa-Thomas and Dr Wheeler both on penultimate, when time was called (one of only two games in the Tournament to go to time), with the Wheelers having a half bisque in hand, and in play. It took a further half-hour of cat-and-mouse play before the Wheelers could finally and safely take the half bisque to get their backward ball into the jaws of penult; Mrs Asa-Thomas shooting the length of the court missed by a whisker, and the winning point was made.

However, in the end it was the Digbys and the Crokers who fought out the Doubles Final on Saturday, and that produced another breath-holding finish. Digby was on four-back, Croker on penult, Mrs Croker on the peg, when Mrs Digby made rover and pegged out Mrs Croker. Digby made four back and penult, when Croker hit in, and made penult but left himself a rather long and slightly angled rover hoop on, of course, Digby's ball and perhaps unwisely went for it and failed; though even then, after Digby had made rover, a couple of missed roquets kept the game alive until the Digbys finally pegged out.

To return to the Class Events, Foulser (+3) was beaten by Digby in B Block, but came through to the Play-off, and met and beat Norman in the Final

In the 'C' Class (3½-6) Bond and Johnson both won their blocks with three wins but Johnson was beaten in the Play-off by Dr C.A.Parker, and it was Bond who went on to beat Wharrad in the Final. A glance at the results below will show the reader what a high-powered 'C' Class it was.

The 'D' Class started at 6½ handicap and in the Blocks Asa-Thomas and Mrs Croker won all three games and had a splendid fight in the Final of the Play-off, Asa-Thomas coming out the victor

Prizes were given, à la Wimbledon, i.e. as each event ended, to save the time spent on a formal prize-giving, but Terence Read was allowed to make a charming speech of appreciation from the visitors, which one really feels was not all Irish 'blarney'.

Hurlingham, 3-12 August

The most obvious reason to praise Sarah Hampson and Michael Pearson as co-managers was the absence of time limits. The second reason was their continual good humour accompanied by efficiency despite the late-comers, the chatterers in the managers' tent and those who never accept the written word without verbal confirmation.

The better players dominated the later stages of the Silver Jubilee Cup. Although it was John Phillips who played exceedingly well to defeat David Croker in one semi-final and Dab Wheeler in the final, he would surely agree that the best game in the event was the other semi-final. Eric Solomon pegged out opposing Rovers to create a two-ball finish in order to minimise the utility of Mrs

Wheeler's remaining 3½ bisques. However, such was the approaching and shooting that he shortly had to concede that he was being beaten at his own speciality.

The Baillieu Plate was won by George Doughty who was perhaps most noted for the energy of his shooting. It was sufficiently energetic to knock lumps off the ends of his favourite mallet. Audrey Croker and Lady Bazley met twice in the Longworth Cup, but the latter won the second vital game in an excellent play-off. Carmen played a perfect all-round break, only to see Audrey reach the peg with both balls. The last hour saw Carmen hit in and bring her backward ball round in careful stages to win the trophy for the second time in three years. Although Chris Hudson reached both finals of the Younger Cup, his opponents contested the play-off. Roger Wheeler was proceeding smoothly to victory until he accidentally pegged himself out. Thus encouraged Bevis Sanford subsequently won. In the Turner Cup, Peter Alvey and Graham Martin had a nerve-racking struggle to decide who would meet David Croker in the play-off. Eventually, Martin converted a rapidly diminishing lead into victory. However, against Croker it was Martin who had to chase. He successfully pegged out Croker's forward ball and eventually laid up for peg and rover a few yards south of that hoop, leaving Croker's remaining ball, which was also for rover, on the middle of the North boundary. Incredibly both players forgot the lift then due. Even more incredibly Croker ran the rover from twenty-four yards and went out. There is nothing like doing it in style!

In the Hurlingham Cup, Cyril Pountney had the distinction of defeating both Eric Solomon and Christopher Cousins who in turn had been responsible for the elimination of John Solomon. Although his consistency had deserted him it was still obvious why John's games are watched by so many with such admiration. In the end John Haigh and Stephen Mulliner contested the play-off; the progress of each had been marked by wonderful shooting in the case of Haigh and a straight triple against Weitz and a close call against Cousins in the case of Mulliner. The latter laid up for a sextuple in the play-off, but Haigh hit the twenty-four-yard shot. However, an unkind roll at 2 back gave Mulliner the innings and eventual

The Ladies' Field Candlesticks produced some prolonged games. In one marathon, Michael Pearson found that after four hours two clips were on rover. He suggested a further four-hour time limit. Giggles all round; they finished three and a half hours later! The final was a more forthright affair and Sarah Hampson and Dab Wheeler were popular winners. In the Men's handicap doubles final Cousins and Phillips met Mulliner and Alvey; the latter pair enjoyed an early advantage when Alvey went rapidly to penultimate. The straight triple was considered but rejected. The leave left Veronica's ball in penultimate and Nigel's near rover. 'A man's gotta do what a man's gotta do!' So Nigel shot at the balls on the East boundary, hit and tripled out. It was a marvellous finish to a superb tournament.

Nottingham, 14-19 August

There are, of course, no unfriendly Croquet Tournaments, but Nottingham has made its name as one of the most friendly on the circuit. This year, however, some of the regular visitors studied the changes in the programme with a certain measure of trepidation. The B and C class singles were to be Draw and Process and the Big Handicap X and Y, with Z at Manager's discretion. How could the extra games be fitted in to what always had been a fairly tight schedule? Then they saw the ominous note 'with some double banking if necessary'.

Another major change was a new Manager, Ian Wright being in charge of this tournament for the first time. He indicated from the start that he was going to introduce all the extra games and that this would certainly involve some double banking. The traditional three-hour time limit was extended to 'or 31/4 hours if double banked'. Further changes were the playing of the first round of the Robin Hood in addition to the Big Handicap X on Monday and the start of the Doubles in addition to the Draw of the Class events on Tuesday. If some players at first felt this was 'change for the sake of change' it was soon realised that the early start to all events enabled potential blockers to be identified early in the week. The double banking proved less irritating than had been feared, as seven lawns are available at Nottingham and the Manager had calculated that to complete the programme he required nine. This meant that two lawns, or occasionally three, had to be double-banked. Unlike the slightly objectionable practice at some tournaments of doublebanking all games in some rounds of certain events, Ian Wright adopted a system of mixed random and selective double-banking, irrespective of the events involved. For the first games of the day he selected two lawns, say No.2 and No.4, and the players unlucky enough to draw these had to double-bank. Later in the day when he had opponents ready to play but no empty lawn available, he selected a suitable lawn in such a way that when a game was double-banked, this would be for only about half its duration. Everyone readily accepted these minor irritations and were pleasantly surprised to find they did not, in fact, have many double-banked games.

The Manager further impressed his personality on the tournament on Tuesday afternoon when a torrential thunderstorm sent all players running for their waterproofs. The storm did not last long, but throughout its worst intensity Ian Wright was observed to be the only player on the lawns. His presence shamed others into restarting considerably earlier than they otherwise would have done. When congratulated afterwards on the fine example he had set, he commented wryly 'I hadn't thought of it that way. I was in the middle of a break and didn't want to stop.'

By Wednesday evening the pattern was emerging. Prominent among the players who looked like still being in all their events were John Rose, Roger Wheeler and George Noble, but George was eliminated from the Y in a late game which eased some of the Manager's problems.

Failed triple peels were soon being observed. Among the successful attempts, the most notable were George Noble's, which eliminated the favourites from the doubles; Philip Cozens was another early successful peeler — although he had completed one or two previously in club games this was his first tournament success; John Rose's truly text-book version, eliminating Mrs Dab Wheeler from the open singles, must also be mentioned.

By Friday night the Manager's problems were over. A missed hard rush with Ian's second ball signalled the end, as shortly afterwards George finished in style with a perfect rush from corner 2 to Rover and through to the peg-out. George Noble was then back in play for the Open play-off against John Rose, to secure his second trophy.

After two very tight finishes in the B level Draw and Process, Philip Cozens won the play-off against Don Lenfestey quite comfortably, while John Macdonald made sure of the C handicap by winning both Draw and Process, in his first full-week tournament.

Ladies' Field Cup, played at Hurlingham 21–24 August

When the eight chosen ladies arrived at Hurlingham they looked remarkably hale and healthy, but by Monday morning before play one had fallen by the wayside - then there were seven. By Tuesday afternoon another had retired - so then there were six, and they too had started to show signs of wear and tear. On Wednesday morning Barbara Meachem announced in a plaintive voice that she had been unable to eat her toast for breakfast. I, not knowing that Richard Rothwell had redrawn the remaining games, retired to the children's playground for what I considered a well-deserved rest on a deck-chair after lunch, as according to the original programme I was due to have played one of those who had scratched. An hour later Richard entered the playground and said my opponent had been waiting on court for nearly an hour and in any case I had no right to be in the playground as I had no child! That I could do nothing about, but I was restored to favour by finishing our game in one hour before either of the other games was completed. My third game ended at 8.15 and as I tottered back to my Club I just had the strength to press the lift button up to my room where I lay on the floor, supperless, for an hour to recover.

By Thursday evening it was all over, though as I left Hurlingham at 8.15 Kitty and Barbara were still playing. So far I have made no mention of the croquet. We started off shakily, no-one playing well, but as the matches proceeded so did the croquet improve. Kitty began her triple peels; the Tall Lady in the Hat was drawing her usual admiring spectators; Mrs Digby was hitting everything in sight and playing so fast that as I watched I wondered how many

minutes a game between her and Miss Arkell would take; little Mrs Cox was doing giant split shots from one end of the court to the other and Sarah Hampson, who led the field most of the way, announced that as she was such a rotten player none of the 'topnotchers' could understand her tactics and so were beaten. My finest shot was played in twilight from corner one to corner four where I seemed to remember my partner ball was - and I was told by Richard I had hit it smack in the middle. My most puzzling moment was, when asked by a spectator - who said he thoroughly understood croquet - why we played with four balls. I found this an absorbing problem and having failed to think of a reason, suggested he ask the manager. Richard remained cool, calm and collected throughout and had a soothing effect on the players. Robin Godby acted as Referee for the first two days and ran from one waving mallet to another, as almost every hoop on every court contained a ball which had stuck. Then it was Liz Neal's turn and although there were not so many balls in hoops there were even more agitating happenings and the grass sometimes looked as though festooned with sequins (halfpence marking spots) with Liz's head bent to the ground to ensure that all was done correctly. (I asked her to raise it once or twice for fear that I would hit her!) Their patience and good humour were an example to everyone and they must have run many miles. On looking back, what fun it all

Footnote

Miss Hampson lost only to Miss Joly in the first series and was in the lead, but the latter won all her remaining five games. She was the most consistent hitter-in and hoop-maker and well deserved her victory — her first in this event. Miss Sessions and Mrs Meachem met in the last round with six wins apiece. It was 8.51 pm, with white handkerchiefs having to be held behind balls, when Mrs Meachem's second ball was heard to hit the peg with a resounding crunch to give her victory by two points and earn her second place. It must be recorded that, with the present standard of play, three games per day is too much and all the players found the programme exhausting. On no occasion was the last game over by 8 pm. The Hurlingham lawns were in excellent condition and easy-paced. The weather was fine with a lot of sunshine.

The Chairman's Salver, played at Colchester 4–8 September

The eight competitors in this year's event were in strong contrast to those of 1977 in respect of age. Three players only from last year were again in action and with the notable exception of the New Zealander, Graeme Roberts, the newcomers were of the seasoned variety. Credit is particularly due to Ted Tucker who, in spite of being unfit, completed the course and attained 5 wins. The courts were easy-paced throughout and apart from a little rain early on Wednesday conditions were near perfect. The genial and efficient management of George Digby coped easily with every situation. Two games, one each in the tenth and eleventh rounds, had to be pegged down and were completed after the fourteenth round had been played.

By Monday evening three players, Eric Solomon, Edgar Jackson and John Soutter, each had a maximum whilst John Haigh, Graeme Roberts and Ted Tucker were on nil. Robin Godby had taken two games and Vic Rees one. Solomon went through his first two games in great style. He beat Tucker +26 with the aid of a perfect triple in less than an hour and next Haigh +25 in little more than an hour.

Solomon on Tuesday continued winning but by less convincing margins. Against Godby he pegged one ball out when Godby was for 4-back and three and joined up. Godby by a 3-ball break took his backward ball to peg and scored 4-back and penult with the other and then failed the return roquet. Thereupon Solomon hit the peg. The sixth round brought a break in the equality of Solomon and Jackson for whilst the former was beating Roberts albeit by the narrow margin of +4, the latter succumbed to Rees by a mere three points. Jackson was for 4-back and peg when Rees hit his lift shot, went round to peg and disposed of Jackson's rover. Rees's other ball was for four but by careful play he got round as daylight was fading.

The seventh round brought the two leaders together, providing Jackson with the opportunity to regain equality but this was not to be. Jackson dominated the early play and was for 4-back and penult when he missed a short roquet to let Solomon in. The position was reached where each had one clip on peg and one on 4-back and it appeared to be Jackson who was going out until he ran 4-back only to send the return roquet into the 4-back hoop in such manner as to frustrate further progress. Solomon hit his lift shot to go out. Jackson lost in the eighth round to Haigh and Wednesday ended with Solomon on maximum with a lead of three.

By 3.30 on Thursday the destination of the Salver was determined as Solomon completed his eleventh consecutive win. However, the twelfth round was to bring his first (and only) defeat; this at the hands (or by the mallet) of Roberts who had earlier run him to a close finish in the sixth round. Roberts, who had lost his first four games on the trot, was by now playing well. His opponent appeared, in this game, to be much frustrated by the fourth hoop and also, coincidentally, by 3-back.

The final round brought the two leaders together and again Solomon emerged as winner, this time by a comfortable margin. He had throughout the event shown a consistent superiority, ending with a lead of 4 games. The Salver was presented, somewhat inappropriately, by the C.A. President in the presence of the Chairman of the C.A.! Eric Solomon, on behalf of the players, presented to the Manager a token of their appreciation of his helpfulness both before and during the event. He thanked the Colchester Club for the use of their excellent courts and accommodation and, in particular, the ladies and one or two gentlemen responsible for the splendid catering.

Finally, a few reflections. Surprisingly, only one triple peel, that of Monday morning, was accomplished. Others were essayed but nothing more than doubles achieved. It was noticeable that games tended to last longer as the event proceeded; could it be staleness perhaps or fatigue? Spare a thought for John Soutter who, having won his first three games, could manage one more only, that in the eighth round. Six of his losses were by single-figure margins.

Spencer Ell Cup, 4-8 September

This tournament, held at Budleigh Salterton for the first time, opened in splendid sunshine. On the first day two players made the news; Simon Tapp, coming in as reserve and making his début, made rhythmic all-round breaks to score three wins. David Croker, after winning a game he should have lost, proceeded to lose two he could have won; in one game, with his other ball pegged out he shot from three yards for Rover (and missed) instead of going into more precise position; that would have raised the question of whether his opponent, behind on points and with his front ball (for peg) eleven yards away could have risked shooting thereby leaving his balls 30 yards apart.

The second day brought welcome rain — and then more rain; this freshened not only the lawns, but also, to the delight of Ken Schofield the manager, the rate of play as there was a threat of imposing time limits. John Phillips, recovering from a chill, won his first game, but Roger Wood, despite leading in practically every game, still awaited his first win. In the fading light Vincent Camroux seemed to be coasting towards a win against Chris Cousins and was 'both on the peg' for ¾ hour. After a chapter of disasters to both players, with Cousins creeping nearer, Camroux completed his three wins in a day to chase Tapp with a maximum of six.

The third day produced unsettled weather; the only peggeddown game was finished early and then Norman Davren showed splendid form to beat the leader. Tapp, however, recovered to win a nail-biter against Cousins, then his nearest rival, to establish a valuable three-game lead.

Sunshine after rain on the fourth day made the lawns lovely; six players within a point of each other were fighting for second place. Suddenly, after nine rounds of conventional play, three people, almost simultaneously, attempted triples. All succeeded hoopwise but all failed to make the peg with both balls, one player losing the game. Everyone was pleased when Wood scored his first win, which was against the leader and included the nearly successful straight triple. In the evening Tapp was again playing against his nearest rival, Tristram Owen. Although well behind, Simon hit a critical twenty-yard shot and in that turn won the game and the Cup, being three up with two to play.

On the fifth day the interest was in the race for second place, four players being level after round 13; the deciding game was a marathon between Owen and Cousins which the latter won. The

final round was elevated by John Phillips who elegantly achieved the only standard triple of the week.

The Cup was presented to Simon, a worthy winner, and tributes paid to all those many people who had helped to make this a successful and happy week.

All in all the hitting of long shots and the judgment of distances was very good; the sustaining of breaks, because of silly misses and hoop sticking, was not so good. Perhaps this represents the small difference between scratch players and minus players?

A few statistics: the winner of the toss won 33 and lost 23. The Red and Yellow balls won 29 and lost 27. The average time per game was nearly three hours for the first four rounds, suddenly reducing to under two hours until round 12. The quickest was +26 in 50 minutes in eight turns by the new champion who will hold his own in higher company.

The President's Cup, 5-9 September

The Hurlingham courts were in excellent condition though they were not fast enough to test the players to the full. The in-player therefore had a distinct advantage and a premium was placed on the ability of his opponent to hit the long shots. While the narrow hoops were, generally speaking, successfully negotiated, one important detail was highlighted by the play of Aspinall. This showed clearly the difference, when making a break, between having the pilot ball within a yard of the next hoop and conversely at a distance of three or four yards, and although these approach shots were often accurately executed, it will not be the same story in New Zealand where the faster lawns will require a very delicate touch.

Keith Wylie, the holder, and William Prichard were unable to take part this year. The fear that bad weather would delay the harvest forced Andrew Hope to withdraw; in fact the weather improved and Paul Hands who was not available for inclusion in the Test Team generously offered to give up his place to Hope, which offer was accepted. The competition was sadly interrupted on Thursday evening by the sudden illness of William Ormerod, who was taken to hospital with a virus infection, which had undoubtedly begun to affect his play from the start. This misfortune coming as it did at such a vital time was a matter of deep regret to all of us.

Aspinall set a hot pace from the outset. Playing with confidence and assurity he won each of his first two games in forty minutes or less and was never seriously challenged, although Openshaw chased him valiantly. He was defeated only once by Heap, missing the second lift-shot in a copy-book exhibition of croquet, and was stretched to the full by Hope in their second meeting. In his remaining eleven games he brushed aside the opposition without argument, though Murray launched a strong attack which finally ended in disaster. This display of all-round skill and the ability to fight back stamped Aspinall as unquestionably the outstanding player of the year. It is interesting to note that the name 'Nigel' is the English form of the Celtic word 'Neil' meaning 'champion'. Openshaw, having escaped virtually certain defeat in the first round, settled down to play with admirable consistency, shooting well and making few mistakes. He is now a strongly equipped player with a temperament to match. Heap began slowly but when in full flow gave good measure in his calm unhurried style. He was the only contestant to defeat the two leaders and deserved to finish in third place. Neal's marked ability for concentration and care taken over every stroke paid rich dividends and it was noticeable that he made fewer vital errors than the three colleagues who finished level with him. Murray played three faultless games at the gallop. At his best he is very good but those occasional lapses continue to mar the quality of his overall performance. Hope was engaged in four desperate end-games last year. This year it was five! Although he was sometimes out of touch with his hoop-approaches, his shooting stood him in good stead and this was especially dangerous to his opponents in the final stages. How well he played against Aspinall in Round 13! Mulliner's hitting-in (until the last few rounds) was an outstanding feature. He will prove an even more formidable adversary in the coming years, when greater self-control is added to his natural skill. A very promising first appearance.

Results

Round 1. Aspinall beat Heap +26. Aspinall won in two turns with a triple peel, Heap never taking croquet. Neal beat Hope +9. After each player had made a break, defensive tactics prevailed until Neal went ahead and won with a double peel and an accurate long peg-out. Openshaw beat Murray +1. By over-hitting a simple straight rush to rover and giving himself a long peg-out, Murray lost a game which he should have won. Openshaw hit the last shot and went out in two turns from 3-back. Mulliner beat Ormerod +17. Mulliner hit the first lift-shot and then played with great accuracy to win with a triple peel.

Round 2. Aspinall beat Hope +26. Hope suffered the same treatment from Aspinall as Heap had experienced, the game finishing in just over thirty minutes. Neal beat Heap +9. Both players showed good form, Neal having the advantages in the final stages. Openshaw beat Mulliner +17. Excellent croquet by both players. By virtue of obtaining the first break, Openshaw was the winner. Murray beat Ormerod +8. After Murray was round to 4-back, play deteriorated and mistakes were frequent in a long game.

Round 3. Aspinall beat Ormerod +16. Two mistakes by Ormerod proved fatal. A missed short roquet in the early stages and later, when he was in play with a four-ball break, a failure at hoop 5 set Aspinall on the path to victory. Mulliner beat Heap +14. Heap had two good chances after Mulliner had taken the lead, but missed a short roquet on each occasion. Murray beat Hope +26. Murray at his best, winning unchallenged in two turns with a triple-peel. Openshaw beat Neal +10. A long game in which neither player could make progress with his second ball. After Neal was halted at 2-back, Openshaw broke away with a decisive turn from hoop 4 to the peg.

Round 4. Aspinall beat Mulliner +26. Mulliner hit the first lift-shot but failed to progress. Aspinall then obtained the innings and finished with a triple-peel. Openshaw beat Hope +17. Hope led to 4-back but remained stationary with his second ball. Openshaw then hit and advanced to 4-back and peg in two turns with no reply from his opponent. Murray beat Neal +26. Murray gave another fine display, winning with a triple-peel in forty minutes. Heap beat Ormerod +26. Heap now found his best form and made no semblance of a mistake to score a convincing victory.

Round 5. Aspinall beat Murray +7. When each player had a clip on 4-back, Murray took a bold shot, hit and established a break. But in attempting a straight peel from very close range at 4-back he was unable to jump his partner ball. Aspinall successfully negotiated a difficult first hoop and went on to win. Neal beat Mulliner +24. A failure at hoop 3 by Mulliner gave Neal the initiative, which he maintained to the finish. Hope beat Ormerod +16. After each player had an all-round break, mistakes occurred on both sides. Hope presently gained the lead and final victory. Openshaw beat Heap +20. Heap broke down at hoop 5 in his first break and was not in contention after this, Openshaw finishing

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Round 6. Aspinall beat Openshaw +14. A clever leave by Aspinall when he was for peg and penultimate, requiring a roquet cannon off the second hoop wire to approach penultimate. Openshaw failed to hit this double target from A baulk and Aspinall went out. Ormerod beat Neal +14. Ormerod, here at his best, went round in two turns but missed a long peg-out with his forward ball. Neal retaliated with a fine 3-ball break from hoop 1 to the peg, but to no avail, as Ormerod hit the peg with his next shot. Hope beat Mulliner +2. An exciting one-ball finish with Hope for the peg and Mulliner, in play, for rover. A long and difficult hoop shot turned off the wire and Hope scored the winning point. Heap beat Murray +17. After Murray led to 4-back Heap hit the lift-shot and was thereafter in command.

Round 7. Aspinall beat Neal +26. Aspinall led all the way, until he stuck in rover with his second ball. Neal had two more turns but was unable to progress. Openshaw beat Ormerod +16. Both players were making some mistakes, but when Ormerod broke down at hoop 2 with his second ball, Openshaw hit and went ahead to win. Mulliner beat Murray +14. A lively encounter. Murray's failure at hoop when he had begun a triple enabled Mulliner to go out from 4-back. Heap beat Hope +2. A level game with a close finish after Hope was left with one ball at 4-back. His final long shot narrowly missed.

Round 8. Mulliner beat Ormerod +23. Mulliner was in command throughout, after Ormerod missed a roquet at hoop 3. Heap beat Aspinall +16. A fine display by Heap who achieved a clear-cut victory over his hitherto undefeated opponent. When each player had a clip on 4-back Heap hit in with his backward ball and went round to the peg. Aspinall missed the lift-shot and Heap finished. Openshaw beat Murray +17. At the end of his first break Murray missed a short roquet, which gave Openshaw the innings. After this, Murray was never again in the hunt. Hope beat Neal +2. This game produced a thrilling climax with each player left with one ball. Although Neal was for rover and Hope for 1-back, Hope played with remarkable accuracy to score a victory which had seemed very much against the odds.

Round 9. Aspinall beat Murray +26. Aspinall won unchallenged. Mulliner beat Heap +13. Heap went round to 4-back but then Mulliner hit and went out in the next turn with a three-ball break from the first hoop. Openshaw beat Neal +19. Openshaw led with the first break but Neal hit the lift shot and went to 2-back. Openshaw then retained control for the rest of the game. Hope beat Ormerod +13. An in-and-out affair with slow progress.

Round 10. Neal beat Mulliner +14. Mulliner once again triple-peeled his opponent, but this time the tables were turned. Neal hit in with a long shot and established an accurately played three-ball break from hoop 4 to win. Heap beat Openshaw +25. After Openshaw missed a cut-rush to hoop 2, Heap played a fine game to win with a triple peel. Hope beat Murray +8. A level game which either player might have won. A failure at 3-back by Murray in his second break proved the decisive point.

Round 11. Aspinall beat Mulliner +24. Mulliner gained the first break but a missed cut-rush to hoop 3 was his undoing. Aspinall took control and won in two turns with a triple-peel. Heap beat Murray +17. Murray took the lead but a missed roquet at the start of his second break gave Heap the innings. Playing with great

accuracy, he won with a triple-peel. Openshaw beat Hope +20. After two all-round breaks by Openshaw, Hope hit in and fought back, but an error after the sixth hoop settled the issue in Openshaw's favour.

Round 12. Aspinall beat Openshaw +17. Each player had a clip on 4-back. Although Aspinall made two mistakes during his second break, Openshaw's backward ball never passed the first hoop. Mulliner beat Hope +17. After Hope led, the game became slow, Mulliner having the better of the exchanges and finally winning comfortably. Murray beat Neal +3. A remarkable end-win by Murray. Neal having overcome a series of difficult hazards from 3-back with his second ball missed a simple rover hoop. Murray advanced from penultimate to peg and then played a splendid three-ball break from hoop 6 to the finish.

Round 13. Aspinall beat Hope +2. An exciting climax to this game, each player being left with one ball, Aspinall for peg and Hope for penultimate. Hope hit the last shot and after making one hoop positioned himself a yard away from the peg. Aspinall then hit with a long shot to win. Neal beat Heap +3. An open game. When Heap was for peg and penultimate, Neal hit with his backward ball and pegged out his opponent. In his next turn a three-ball break from 3-back gave him the victory. Openshaw beat Mulliner +6. A game which lasted four and a half hours! Mulliner very slowly closed the gap but when he looked like forcing a narrow win, a catastrophe at penultimate handed the game to Openshaw.

Round 14. Aspinall beat Neal +24. Aspinall brushed aside some early opposition and went out in two turns. Murray beat Mulliner +26. An Answer to Question of Tactics: 3

This little problem is one of surprising complexity, the solution of which depends on the calibre of Red.

One cannot lightly dismiss the idea of simply sitting in the fourth corner and hoping that Red will either miss or fail to go out if he hits. However, that is a risk that few people would care to take, so what should Blue do with Black before pegging himself out? He can roll up to the peg, and probably should do so* if Red has a handicap higher than about scratch, but this is inadvisable against a stronger player because if Red then hits Black from A baulk he would be very well placed.

He can try a straightforward peg-out from where Black lies, sending it nearly off if it misses, but then Red will probably take position for penult, leaving Black with no good alternative to shooting at the peg.

The best idea is probably to rush Black to about eight yards short of the South boundary and try the peg-out from there. If it misses and Red takes position, Black will be able to shoot at Red from about eleven yards and end up, if he misses, in a good position.

* Note. He did and Red missed.

CROKEY

CROKEY is an indoor game for 2 or 4 players based on Croquet, played on a checkerboard fitted with hoops and centre-peg. Counters, representing balls, are moved in a chess-like manner.

CROKEY has three variants: Sequence Crokey, a game of pure skill modelled on Golf Croquet; Crokey, a game of pure skill based on Association Croquet; and Error Crokey which is Crokey with an element of luck, requiring the use of two packs of playing-cards (not provided with CROKEY). Sequence Crokey is suitable for younger children; Crokey and Error Crokey for older children and adults.

The essential feature of CROKEY is the 'break', i.e. a turn of one move extended to several moves, achieved by skilful positioning of the counters. In this respect the simulation of Croquet is so close that aspiring Croquet players will find *Crokey* of great value in visualising and practising the ingenious tactics of the outdoor game.

ERROR CROKEY introduces moves to represent poor shots in Croquet. Situations which can now be simulated include: a misjudged approach to a hoop, a ball rebounding from or sticking in a hoop, and a missed roquet. These misfortunes, coming unawares and at random, are fun, but they also play an essential role in balancing a game between experts. Moreover, players can allot any desired degree of chance to a game to bias it towards skill or luck.

CROKEY is played on a veneered board base, with plated steel hoops and other quality components. An illustrated leaflet giving examples of Crokey play may be obtained upon receipt of a S.A.E.
