The Mens' and Womens' Championships. 15th - 20th June.

Stimulated by this incentive, Eric Knight (4) played with great determination on Wednesday to narrowly defeat Malcolm Smith in the Handicap Semi-final. The tension of the end game proved too much for Malcolm, who stuck in one hoop too many. In the other semi-final a Scot defeated a Scot; Phillip Simpson showing good tactical use of his bisques and never giving Rod Williams a chance to get going.

By the end of the week Rod and Roger Wood were in both the Open Draw and Process finals. They played two exciting games watched by a large number of spectators. Both players were playing well as befits Open Finals, but Rod in particular, after the week of playing on the fine Compton Lawns was playing as well as he ever has. Roger perhaps made a couple of risky tactical decisions which contributed to his two close defeats. The Doubles final between the Rod Williams and Dennis Brown partnership and Giles Borrett and Alan Hutcheson was very closely contested. Dennis Brown however was playing well by this stage of the week and this "edge" was enough for his partnership to gain a narrow victory. Rod's third final, which he won by beating Ralph Chappell was in the Swiss event. This was an interesting and successful way of playing the "Y" event with players gaining entry to the appropriate round of the Swiss if they were defeated in the "Big Handicap" before the final.

To the author, one of the pleasures of a very enjoyable tournament was to see such "Croquet Characters" as (Tiny) Tyrwhitt Drake and Giles Borrett so enjoying their croquet.

ROEHAMPTON EVENING TOURNAMENT

30 May - 6 June 1981

The evening tournament this year differed in two important ways from last year's: it was played three weeks earlier than usual, and started and finished on the Saturdays rather than as previously - on the Sundays of the weekends at beginning and end. The importance of the first change was not what one might immediately think: the three weeks in fact made little difference to the time available for play in the evenings; rather, the problem was that both weekends clashed with the prequalifying (or are they simply 'qualifying'?) tournaments for the Opens, necessitating all sorts of last minute rearrangement. The second change somehow interfered with the tournament's continuity, the first weekend almost being a tournament by itself. The rest of the week, with so much of the first two classes already played, lacked the usual atmosphere; and with only three lawns throughout the week (four had been expected) it was not possible to 'paper over the cracks' with a Y to maintain everyone's interest. A careful rethink will surely be needed before next year, now that the novelty of the tournament has worn off and the organisational problems are more fully

Enough of managerial apologia — the play's the thing! And what play we saw; a quality field in the A produced triples by the handful (9 in 29 games) and some newcomers in the Cs showed genuine initiative which bodes well for the future. The lawns were kind; very green, and particularly slow — even by Roehampton standards — at the start of the week, though they had recovered their normal pace by the end.

To start with C: this provided the debut of two promising new players, Palmer and Mrs. Mulliner. Both showed commendable enterprise; though attempting some shots beyond their present capabilities, this is a tendency to be welcomed. However, neither showed sufficient consistency to reach the playoff, which was between Mrs. Glover and Mrs. Townsend. Both had played well to reach this stage; Mrs. Glover emerged the victor.

The B (played level advanced) sprung no great surprises; Goulding was the overall winner after a close game against MacDonald in the playoff, which provided much excitement for — and comment from — the spectators (how much easier it is to play from the comfort of a chair in the pavilion.) It was their second meeting of the day, having previously done battle in a semi-final of the X with precisely the same result.

Roberts was in fine form winning the A, and had a sequence of four triples in five games in the Draw and playoff; wins over Murfitt and Mulliner were particularly noteworthy. Cordingley also played some enterprising croquet, amongst which was an excellent win +3 TP against your correspondent, who had rashly been anticipating +26 TP to himself until the peelee stuck irretrievably in rover. If he can achieve greater consistency, his prospects look bright. Though it might seem churlish to say so, more testing conditions would probably have benefitted the event: fewer triples, no doubt, but the excellent play would have shone that more brightly.

The X again found Goulding collecting the first prize: he gave Battison no chances in the final, and did not even need all his bisques. The doubles, played — as last year — to the 'alternate stroke' format, produced a little interesting play, but too much of it was excessively defensive. Robert Prichard partnered Palmer to success, the MacDonalds contesting the final.

An extra handicap event was organised on the final day. It was played as a Swiss, with a 1½ hour time limit for a 1 and 4-back variation. This ensured plenty of play, and gave the better players the carrot of going out in one turn — which two achieved, one in the fourth turn. It also produced one of the most unlucky losses of the week: Mrs. MacDonald, with scores level after time had expired, peeling an opponent ball through its hoop. Roberts won the deciding game against Prichard, to complete the tournament on schedule.

However, his fluent style of the rest of the week largely eluded him and having to play three finals in one day meant that he succeeded in winning only the doubles with Barnes (playing Mrs. Barnes and Shepard). Wood managed to make one more hoop before falling to Ormerod making the score an exciting +3.

Much credit for a highly enjoyable week is due to the very able management team and the skill of the local catering corps (especially the pudding makers!).

It is not quite true to say that England always looked likely to win this match, but very nearly so. 3rd Pimms International - 1981. Compton 13th June.

The final round in this years Pimm's International was the first, in this writer's opinion. (and he has seen all the matches since the start except, regrettably, that at Southport) to justify the implication that "International" gives to any event - namely that the standard of play is of a consistently high standard, and that some at least is of exceptional

In three of the matches at least this was the case and it made this reporter realise what had seemed to be lacking in the other matches which have taken place in the two years this event has been held that the standard of play until now from the players who are representative of their country has really not been good enough

All was now redeemed and for what reason who can tell? Was it that indefinable metabolism which somehow came right at the moment juste: the very pleasant surface of the Compton Club lawns (this is no reflection on other clubs); the beautifully warm and sunny day; the considerable number of spectators who came as a result of the local publicity; or perhaps the knowledge that the final outcome of the competition would be decided by this match?

Hardly the latter, perhaps, for there is no doubt that in the earlier rounds all were playing to win every game, and yet something had been lacking. All this was now redeemed and those who understood something of the niceties of the game really had a treat. It was only a pity that few of them perhaps had the ability to absorb the details of four matches at once for much must have been missed. Indeed this reporter would normally have been in the same situation himself had he not, on account of his reporting obligations, be required to observe the eventualities of each match, a task he found more enjoyable and easier to record than usual mainly because there was so much going on.

Before the match began the state of play was that Scotland had drawn with Wales and each therefore had a half; England had soundly trounced Wales and therefore had a win; England needed only to draw against Scotland to have 1½ against a maximum 1 by Scotland and ½ by Wales,

The reader, if he does not already know the result, must now be let out

of his misery by being informed that England did indeed win the match convincingly to wrest the Bowl from the holders, Scotland.

This eulogy must now be justified by some description of the feats achieved and this will for the most part seem tame by the cold narration of triple peels and such like feats. But it was the manner of their execution which commanded respect and this is extremely hard to convey in print but nevertheless we will do our best.

The second match between Steven Mulliner for England and Andrew Hope for Scotland attracted immediate attention because it reached its conclusion first. The first game went to Steven +26 with only a tiny chance for Andrew. Steven's rapid vitality in play (is he perhaps too intense, too keen to get it over?) seemed to indicate that this was to be a very likely win for England. But Andrew was undeterred and finding himself in the position of attempting a straight triple did just that with such effect that his peel at the penultimate was so perfect that his partner ball ended up two feet in front of rover making the finish look simple. The third game did not start auspiciously but finally Andrew achieved a fine triple completing the rover peel going to 3 back (so nice to get it over by then, but what a fool one feels if the simple break from then on comes to grief). Andrew's style is not the most convincing one has seen but on this occasion he certainly produced some fine croquet and the first straight triple he has done in a match.

The third match between Eric Solomon and the Scottish Captain Stephen Wright never produced quite the sparkle that was an almost regular feature of the other matches. Good breaks were made by both players throughout the three games and Stephen deserved to win the first game. Eric fought back in the second but both players made mistakes and the score could have been very different if Stephen had made more of his chances. In the final game Eric recovered extremely well from a hesitation in his first break at 2-back (approaching eventually from the west boundary) and eventually completed a fine delayed triple, doing the 4-back peel going to the 6th, penultimate going to 1-back and the final peel at the rover itself.

In the fourth match David Openshaw confounded his low placing (though admittedly he had not sparkled in the previous round) by producing some very fine play against Ian Wright. He started his triple going to the 6th and achieved a very fine cut into the 3rd corner after making the hoop. His attempt to peel penultimate going to 1-back failed and he eventually finished with a straight double, the Irish peel at penultimate going well, and after the rover did an extremely accurate cannon to send his partner from well behind the rover to within a couple of feet of the peg.

In the second game Ian Wright had more opportunity and got both balls to 4-back where he unfortunately came to grief on his second break. David siezed his opportunity and played extremely well to win with a straight triple which almost looked easy.

In the top match there was consternation amongst spectators when Nigel Aspinall lost by 26 to Martin Murray in the first game. Martin played well but had problems when attempting to get his partner, which had only just been peeled through 4-back, over to the 6th, One wonders why he didn't attempt to rush it back through the 3rd, as the pioneer at the 6th was well in front of the hoop. However he achieved the penultimate peel going to 1-back and considering he got his partner in the middle of the rover going to 3-back had a rather complicated finish which happily came right in the end.

In the second game Martin had only one chance and Nigel took advantage of his missed return roquet after the first hoop to finish with a double peel.

The third game produced some excellent play but also a few errors which gave opportunities. Martin's attempt at a straight triple failed. leaving his partner for penultimate. His leave was an attempt to put Nigel's forward ball on the wire of the 6th which did not come off and he himself ended up wired from his partner and had to retire. Had he been content to leave the ball anywhere between the peg and penultimate it would have still forced that ball to play without running the risk of the complications which actually happened.

Nigel took advantage of this to play one of the finest breaks he has made in terms of accuracy and touch. A marvellous take-off to get a rush behind Martin's ball in the first corner; very accurate rushing to make his hoops and back to boundary balls, only getting them in a foot or so; and eventually establishing a break. Unable to achieve a peel at 4-back he pegged out Martins ball (the other being for penultimate), and Martin having missed two long shots, played a finely controlled

In the eleven games played there were six triple peels, of which two were straight triples. There were perhaps too many errors (it used to be thought one did not deserve to win if one made more than two mistakes), but these certainly opened up opportunities which were usually

The encouraging turn out of spectators was due entirely to the hard work done by Ed Strickland in a very wide distribution of leaflets and his concern for the comfort of the players and officials in the catering arrangements he made ensured the days success. Our thanks are due to him and his colleagues for their hard work.
