The Open Championships

Hurlingham 13 - 18 July

A new film recently produced in the West End, entitled 'Clash of the Titans" might have served as an apt title for the 1981 Croquet Championships. For no fewer than seven President Cup players were among the first eight names to be drawn in the Singles, while all the eight humbler 'qualifiers' were grouped in the lower half - an arrangement which was no doubt highly gratifying to Mulliner and Murfitt. The names of Humphrey Hicks, Open Champion for the first time in 1932, and Dudley Hamilton-Miller, Silver Medallist at the age of 18, sadly disappeared from the singles entry at long last, being replaced by two promising young newcomers, Cordingley of Harrow and Ken Jones of Edgbaston. Both these players won their first round matches by a single point in the third game against more experience opponents, while Jones later scored a fine victory in the Plate against Eric Solomon. The eccentric pattern of the draw, (recalling a first round clash between Cotter and John Solomon in the 1950s), resulted in the early elimination of many eminent players - notably Neal, Foulser, Hemsted, Roberts, Colin Prichard and Phillips. Martin Murray and Paul Hands, those two "Cheltenham Fliers" (as a Great Western Express train was once named) began the week in devastating form but ran out of steam later against the admirably-controlled and accurate play of Openshaw and William Ormerod, Paul Hands came from behind with a fine burst in the second game against the latter, until he met with disaster in his rover peel with the game seemingly won. In the previous round Openshaw had defeated Aspinall, +5, +4. This was a match of fine croquet, in both games of which the clips of Aspinall were on peg and 4-back and those of Openshaw on 4-back and first hoop. At this point on each occasion Openshaw hit the lift-shot with his backward ball and went

The semi-finals produced two matches of a very different nature. In the first, Openshaw had a quiet and uneventful victory against William Ormerod, though the latter fought back tenaciously in the opening game and forced his opponent for some time to take cover. But in the second, Openshaw played with the precision of a metronome, against which there was no answer. Contrastingly, the Mulliner v Murfitt match had everything - play of high quality, occasional mistakes, excitement and dramal It was a match which Mulliner, (christened "Hurricane Higgins" in the "Daily Mail", though I prefer my own emendation "Storm-Wind Steve!), looked assured to win when he was one game up and fixing his sights carefully on a five or six yard peg-out to win the second game and the match. But the pilot ball, struck hard, narrowly missed and went off the boundary, adjacent to Murfitt's backward ball, then for the second hoop! Murfitt now needed to play three strokes

demanding great accuracy in order to establish a four-ball break. This he did and went round and out with a triple peel. In the third game, Murfitt was on 4-back in the fourth turn. Mulliner hit the lift-shot but missed a roquet after making the third hoop. A quiet period followed, neither player making much progress though Mulliner looked the more dangerous and presently reached 4-back. A little later after hitting in. he began a good break from second hoop which should have clinched the match; but in a momentary lapse of carelessness after making 2-back he missed a very short roquet, an error which gave Murfitt the opportunity to take game and match without any further argument.

The final of the Open Singles again hinged on the result of the third

With two opposing clips on 4-back. Openshaw missed the short liftshot and Murfitt took his second ball round to the peg, in the course of which he did one peel only, a point of vital importance in the eventual issue. Openshaw now hit the lift-shot with his backward ball and went round. But he too ran into difficulties with his peels, so that he ended his turn by pegging out Murfitt's forward ball with his own two balls at peg and rover. One single shot now remained to decide the championship, with Murfitt to play. He took aim but missed - and Openshaw a few moments later had won his second Open Championship and also his second major title of the current year.

This was a match of fine croquet by both the winner and the loser.

A surprise in the first round of the Doubles came with the defeat of Aspinall and William Ormerod by Phillips and Wright. In the later stages of the third and deciding game, the clips of the latter pair were on peg and 4-back, with Aspinall on peg and Ormerod, now in play, on the first hoop, after Wright had taken the short lift shot and missed. Ormerod, with a few well-executed strokes, set up a straightforward 4-ball break but unexpectedly broke down at the fourth hoop, a mistake which enabled Wright - in spite of a few anxious moments - to score the remaining points for victory in his next turn. The success of this partnership, however, was short-lived, for in the second round against Murfitt and Murray the sole contribution which was allowed to them was one lift-shot by each player! Vincent, in partnership with Noble, tried an interesting variation against Eric Solomon and Foulser by going round and pegging himself out, leaving Noble at the third hoop. Although this experiment met with no success, they won the next two games by narrow margins and then achieved a notable victory against Murfitt and Murray, who were very out of touch on the fast surface of

The other semi-final concerned Mulliner and Mark Ormerod in opposition to Roberts and Bond, a match which ran into some difficulties with time, fading daylight and a heavy downpour of rain on Friday evening with the third game unfinished. The next morning, under different conditions. Mark Ormerod played with determination and accuracy to come from behind and eventually snatch a hard-fought

The final began with a smooth break by Noble to 4-back and a triplepeel by Vincent. In the second game Mulliner took the initiative and, after some indeterminate play by the other three, levelled the score. The deciding game built up to an exciting climax. Mulliner pegged out Noble's ball and then, later, his own, leaving his partner at 4-back and Vincent at the fifth hoop. Vincent ran a difficult hoop, hit Ormerod's ball and made a fine two-ball break to take position for 3-back, A most intriguing finish saw Vincent running the rover with Ormerod in front of penultimate. Vincent now played a roquet to a point between hoops 1 and 2, but well inside the boundary. Ormerod ran penultimate, hit his opponent's ball and played a lengthy approach to rover, where he was faced with a straight but long hoop. And now, with no other alternative open, he aimed, ran the hoop, hit the final roquet and won the match and the Championship for Mulliner and himself by 1 point!

No less than five President Cup players were included in the Plate this year. Some incidents in the Process were a stymie at the peg which robbed Foulser of victory against Aspinall, a splendid game between the latter and Neal, P.M. Johnson's win against Vincent and a remarkable 'bag' by Mark Ormerod, who shot down Croker, Roger Wood and Eric Solomon en route to his final against Neal. This final was a long drawnout and undistinguished affair, for which nerves perhaps may have been responsible and which Neal, unexpectedly, lost and Ormerod, deservedly, won. Games in the 'Draw' generally followed the form-book, Aspinall coming through to the final to meet Croker. In this game a missed hoop by Croker gave Aspinall a valuable innings and set him on a clear road to subsequent victory.

The play-off for the Association Plate was brief in its course and brief to record. Aspinall, winner in the sixth turn of the game, will now have his name engraved on this Cup for the first time. Nevertheless, Mark Ormerod will have every reason to remember this week when he found, with eye and mallet, such a magic Midas touch.

The award of the new John Solomon Trophy for the maximum number of peels, reckoned on a points system, was won by Roger Murfitt most fittingingly and deservedly; fittingly, since he will soon be returning to New Zealand; deservedly, since he has made so many friends during his residence here and has shown us a consistent pattern of croquet of such high excellence.

Steve Mulliner's planned time-table was well designed and with Veronica Carlisle at hand to take over when required, everything went smoothly until Friday evening, when circumstances beyond his control caused a certain delay in Saturday's schedule for the final of the Doubles. With the finish of this exciting 3-game match about 8 p.m., another Open Championship week was over.

The Northern Championships 22 - 27 June Bowdon

Everything augured well for this year's Northern Championships. A stronger field than ever for the main event, last year's winner, David Openshaw, back to defend his title, and the entries up in numbers by nearly 50 per cent. On top of all that, all the lawns at Bowdon had been taken up over the winter and relevelled, and the turf was already knitting together well, and the builder was well into completing Phase 1 of the Club House extension — more room for changing and eating, and a well stocked bar available.

The first day was one of blazing sunshine, and although the sun went in for most of the rest of the week, it never actually rained. Eddie Bell, acting as Ground Manager and Tournament Referee, was seen in the early hours of each morning adjusting the hoop widths, and in the evenings running behind the Club's new mower (at last Bowdon has an Auto Certes!). Barry Keen as Manager and the only other Referee readily available was also much in evidence, playing in all possible events as well.

The Northern Championships itself did not start until Thursday, an innovation designed to enable players to spend only 2 days off work if they wanted to enter only this one event. The major surprise was the play of Steven Lewis (of Bowdon) who came closest to beating David Openshaw and only just lost by 6, having beaten Eddie Bell in the previous round of the Draw. However David eventually triumphed as expected, winning both the Draw and the Process, with Roger Murfitt beating John Rose in the play-off for second place. Roger, and Nelson Leech (from South Africa), between them gave the Championship an international flavour, and this was duly reported in the Daily Telegraph, which gave the tournament some good coverage as a result of the hard work put in by Bowdon's Press Officer, Sue Bennett.

In the 'B' Class event, Colin Irwin (Bowdon) beat George Collin of Chester in the final having knocked him out in the Draw. Ted Scott of Hull beat Colin in the Process, and another player to make his mark (and have his handicap reduced) was Danny Kelly of Bowdon, who had a very close game with Colin in the final of the Draw. Vera MacPherson remarked in an awed voice when she first arrived that 'everywhere she looked, people were hitting 25 yard roquets', but went on to impress with some determined play, lining her balls up for the peg-out by lying full-length on the ground. The 'C' Class event was won by David Peterson (Bowdon), a pupil at Manchester Grammar School, who beat Alan Sutcliffe of Ellesmere, another improving player who also had his handicap reduced at the end of the tournament.

The handicap doubles had no time limit and produced some extremely long games, which at one time threatened to disrupt the progress of the tournament. However, the Manager's nerve held, and Barry Keen was eventually rewarded by winning the event himself, with his partner lan Maugham. They overcame the 'South African' challenge of Nelson Leech and George Collin in the final by some exhausting defensive play which, although tactically sound, was not the sort of stuff to catch the imagination of TV audiences!

In the Bowdon Handicap, Paul Stoker emerged the winner, beating Chris Hudson in the final (by the simple tactic of leaving him with shots of 6 to 8 feet to hit in!), and Colin Irwin pulled off a second win by beating Ted Scott in the final of the 'Y'. Phil Cordingley won the extra event which Barry Keen managed to fit in on top of everything else.

'Kate's Kitchen' did the catering, and treated us to some excellent meals throughout the week at a reasonable price with several players becoming addicted to Mars Bars during the week. All in all, it was a most enjoyable tournament — to those who were knocked out early in the week, better luck next year.

This was the tournament that had everything — except enough entrants. The weather was superb until Saturday, the players were excellently fed and watered by the indefatigable Mrs Wells and her helpers, there were lots of lawns to go round (double-banking is not a term in common use at Southwick) the tournament was efficiently but unobtrusively managed by the ever cheerful Sylvia Turner, yet the 'big' handicap weighed in at only twenty four entrants, of whom two had to retire from the tournament after the draw. As one of those who was a first-time visitor this year let me urge more Associates to put this tournament on their list for 1982: the welcome accorded to visitors well repays the visit.

In the Sussex Gold Cup Peter Death, whose progress round the lawns was marked by a trail of cough sweets and glasses of water, managed to win both halves, beating 'Tiny' Tyrwhitt-Drake in the Draw and Tristram Owen in the Process, the latter game being particularly close. Death reached 4-back and peg. Owen being for 6 and 4-back, when an untidy leave enabled Owen to regain the innings until he stuck in rover with his second ball. Death laid up, Owen's last shot came within a whisker of hitting and then Death went out from 4-back to win by two. In the play-off for second place there was no such drama, Owen beating Tyrwhitt-Drake by 18.

The B and C classes each found an Asa-Thomas appearing in the final of both halves, but with differing fortunes. In the Ron Whetstone Cup Pat Asa-Thomas was given a bye into the final when Draw and Process were married, and lost there to Vera Tyrwhitt-Drake.
