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

## A VIEW ON CROQUET TACTICS

While watching some tournament games it seemed to me that most players would benefit from a serious study of tactics.

One of the most common but erroneous ideas is the belief that a player has only to peg out one of the opponent's balls to ensure victory. And when, as so often happens, the result goes the other way and the single ball wins, the first player feels that the result was unfair.

the odds were in favour of the single ball. The following is a very common example. Blue goes to four-back, red or yellow misses the lift and black goes round to the peg. Red hits in or takes a bisque and goes to the peg and pegs out black. This is very dangerous, because blue has only a very easy sequence of three hoops to make. Yellow has much greater need of the black ball than blue, because he has to make twelve hoops. In fact I have often seen players peg out an opponent's ball when the other opponent ball has only one hoop to make (one for rover and one for peg is a common situation). A player who pegs out his opponent in such a situation simply deserves to

When I first propounded this theory in England many years ago it was received with scepticism. So I arranged a series of test part-games with Maurice Reckitt, a "grand-master" of croquet. The results surprised him and proved that in the four-back example given above, the odds were heavily in favour of the single ball. Other tests indicated that the odds favoured the single ball if it was for three-back, and that pegging-out the opponent was generally not worthwhile unless the backward ball was only half way round or less.

The corollary of this urge to peg out an opponent ball, is a commonlyobserved reluctance to peg out one's own ball. There was an extraordinary example of this in one of the games referred to in the lirst paragraph, between two top players.

The player of black and blue was in deep trouble, his black had made only two hoops, and blue had a few more to make. Red and yellow were pegging out but the rush did not take the balls to within a safe distance from the peg. Red missed the peg and travelled to between the boundary and the second hoop, while yellow came to rest about three feet from the peg. If yellow had been pegged out the opponent's chance of completing the course would have been remote. But yellow was sent to red, black near the first hoop hit in on blue which was near the fourth, and it was easy to make the third hoop off red and yellow, with a four-ball break to follow. Thus red and yellow snatched defeat from the jaws of victory, by not taking the opportunity to eliminate all possibility of a four-ball break.

If a player is pegging out an opponent ball it is often important for him to peg out his own ball at the same time. If your backward ball has about a four-hoop lead over the opponent's ball it is essential to peg out your own forward ball as well. Because virtually the only hope your opponent has of catching up is a three-ball break, and he cannot make this with only two balls. A more precise assessment of the lead required might be as follows.

If the opponent has eleven or twelve hoops to make, a safe lead to anable you to peg out your own ball would be five hoops. If nine or ten hoops remain, a safe lead for you would be four hoops. Less than nine hoops means that three hoops is a safe lead. The score should be watched carefully. Suppose that you start with only a four-hoop lead and your opponent has twelve hoops to make. If you make two hoops and your opponent is still four hoops behind, leave your backward ball at its hoop and peg out your forward ball immediately, and thus alliminate the possibility of a three-ball break.

It is generally accepted that one should join up on or near boundaries, and avoid joining up in the court if possible. But there are many yames in which the opposite tactic is correct. These are games in which one player is conceding bisques. If he joins on a boundary the apponent can shoot at his balls with impunity, knowing that if he

misses he can take a bisque with a certainty of getting an innings from it. But if the balls are five or six yards off the boundary the high-bisquer has problems. If he shoots firmly and misses, the ball will reach the boundary, and make the taking of a bisque too risky. If he tries to stop at the two balls, his ball is almost sure to waver off course as it slows to a stop, and he is unlikely to hit the target.

This brings us to the most important aspect of bisque-taking, the use of bisques without spending them. In one game I had only a half-bisque. Most players keep a half-bisque in hand until they find themselves in trouble, and use it then to extricate themselves, with no possibility of scoring. But I used my half-bisque with the intention of scoring points with it. With my first shot, while still live on all balls, I shot at boundary balls which, I would not have tried without the half-bisque, on the first two occasions hitting in with a good chance of making a break. I lost a close match through fumbling at hoops, etc., but got wonderful value from the half-bisque.

Another important factor when using bisques in this way is the fact that a player is more likely to make the roquet if he intends to take a bisque or half-bisque in the event of missing. The bisque gives confidence and relaxes the tension.

Players who have several bisques rarely use them to full advantage. Here is an example from the same tournament. Blue was trying to make the fourth hoop off yellow, but failed the approach shot. Black was close at hand, on the east boundary level with the peg, while red was a few feet south-east of the peg.

Blue then played the shot which one sees repeated over and over again. With her last shot she took position to roquet yellow in front of the hoop, took a bisque and made one more hoop only.

With her last shot she should have shot at the boundary ball (black), and then taken the bisque in complete safety. A simple little split would have sent black to the sixth hoop, blue going to red in the middle. Another simple split would have sent red to the fifth, blue going to yellow at the fourth hoop. The result would have been a laid-out four-ball break which must surely have scored four hoops, because those hoops are all close together.

After a faulty approach one must realise that the ball at the hoop will not go away, therefore one should try to improve the position of the other balls, before finally returning to the ball waiting at the hoop.

Incidentally one should not take a bisque unless there IS a ball at the next hoop. Thousands of bisques are wasted every year through players not knowing, or not following, this simple rule. I could think of exceptions to this rule, (in croquet there are exceptions to every tactical rule), but they are so rare that it is better not to risk becoming confused by speculating about them.

You cannot possibly have a better opportunity of using your last bisque, and probably will never again get such a good opportunity, so take it without hesitation. Concentrate, remember to keep your eye on the ball with every shot, especially the easy ones, and probably you will make up for the wasted bisques.

## Devonshire Park 2 (Eastbourne) April 11-16

As if to dispel any lingering doubts that it was really time for croquet again after the long hard winter months, we arrived at Devonshire Park on Monday morning to be greeted by grey skies and the first specks of rain. The only bright spots of that day were provided by the variety of gaily coloured waterproofs on display, belying the mood of the forlorn figures huddling beneath them. Happily the weather

improved throughout the week, culminating in a glorious day for the finals on Saturday, by which time the lawns were beginning to dry out and we were able to concentrate (though not too hard) on the croquet.

The large contingent of Cambridge players soon decided to concentrate their efforts on winning the Z in which the stiff opposition expected from the Wheelers was not forthcoming. Meanwhile in the X the storming progress of Matthew Tapp, which had included two triples against opponents with bisques unused was brought to a sudden halt by the steadiness of Susan Wiggins setting up an intriguing final with Jerry Guest. Mrs Wiggins soon took a ball round to rover, which Jerry then proceeded to peg out using three of his four bisques. However, after missing and leaving Susan with a three ball break Jerry, much to the crowd's dismay failed to take the remaining bisque. Unfortunately Mrs Wiggins was forced to leave a ball behind at fourth and progressed only to two back. The reprieve however was only temporary and Mrs Wiggins soon completed a well deserved victory, whilst in the Y, Denis Shaw confirmed his progress throughout the fortnight with a most popular

There being no Z doubles, the Oxbridge players devoted their efforts to the X where the final produced 'The Battle of the Aitches' Unfortunately an off-form Yne and Olford could make little of the few chances allowed them by Ilditch and Arrison who throughout the week had done all and more than his more experienced partner had asked of him.

In the class events, a large entry in the Open produced many close games but only one triple, by Martin Coward. Martin won the Process after surviving a dour struggle with Hilditch and snatching an improbable victory against Brian Sykes. In this game Brian appeared to be pegging out with Martin still on 1 st and 4-back, but missed the peg with one ball. Martin hit the lift and Brian, possibly with his concentration broken by news of escaping jeans (?) requiring his attention in Oxford, missed his remaining long shots at the peg lift allow Martin to scrape home. In the final of the Draw Mrs Wiggins again demonstrated the virtue of making fewer mistakes and repeated this victory over Martin in the play-off to complete a most successful week.

In the B class Jerry Guest beat Nick Hyne in the final of both halves the first game being keenly contested but the second being a conclusive victory. The most entertaining game was another 'Blues Battle', involving Nick and Peter West. After some fairly even early exchanges, Peter managed to peg out one of Nick's balls, leaving the other for 4-back and himself for 1-back and peg. Nick used two lifts to lay double targets of Peters' ball, only to discover that they were in fact 'polos' (hole in the middle) as his ball went whistling through with unerring accuracy HOWEVER, with Peter laid up with a rush to the peg Nick managed to hit his final lift shot. Having nonchalantly taken his rush to 4-back through rover (!) Nick stuck in his hoop from 9 inches allowing Peter to rejoin near rover. Having run 4-back, Nick hit these but failed to rush to penult; a speculative approach left him with an optional 5 foot position. Not only did he run this without hitting a wire, but also just snicked the pioneer at rover, cut-rushing it into ideal position as his own ball disappeared into the centre of the adjoining lawn, and enabling Nick to strike another blow for light blue dominance.

This was confirmed rather more conventionally in the C and D classes by Andy Soper and Tim Harrison who had looked likely winners throughout, although Andy was forced to fight very hard by Denis Shaw and was nearly taken to a play-off. Tim was less troubled in his small class and showed a marked improvement through the week in his first tournament.

Thus ended a week which was made enjoyable for all thanks to the hard organisational work (not to mention cheering presence) of Ed Strickland and that dedicated managerial duo of Roger and Dah Wheeler who took time off from directing their latest blockbusting epic to keep us all in line and keep us playing croquet.

All in all another season happily under way.

## Southport and Birkdale Open Weekend 23–24 April

There was a high standard of both entry and performance at this event, under the experienced efficiency of Barry Keen's management. His definition of a playable lawn raised eyebrows among regular visitors during Saturday afternoon's torrential rain and thunder, but play continued. Pat Hague is practising her golf swing and jump-take-off-over-the-puddle shots for next time. Apart from that the weather was mostly fine, and the courts, although soggy just below the surface, were nicely smooth and medium paced.

Some of the finest play was seen in the Swiss. Nick Hyne achieved a triple peel and Eddie Bell just failed one with most of the work done. Richard Hilditch, temporarily abandoning the green-tufted antennae through with some suspected that he was receiving extra-terrestrial advice, and which may have eclipsed the Kolbuszewski headgear in éclat (or éclaboussement), produced a splendid triple peel on his opponent, Andrew Collin, when both other balls were for hoop 1. To the dismay of the spectators, he resisted the temptation to peg out his own ball until he was in a commanding lead.

Undoubtedly the outstanding peeler was Keith Aiton. In one game he was robbed by lawn 3, which took his ball into a wired position on a delicate shot at hoop 3 with the balls otherwise perfectly placed for the triple peel. Undaunted, he impressed the spectators in the next game against Barry Keen by attempting to complete a triple, having already made rover, by cannon-peeling his partner ball successfully, but unfortunately did not obtain arush to the peg. In his next game, against Steve Lewis, he embarked on a quintuple peel on the opponent. Although this broke down after three peels, he completed it in a subsequent turn, incidentally peeling Steve's other ball through hoop 6 and his partner ball through 3-back. The imagination and precision of these manoeuvres were much appreciated by the gallery, and received exceptionally loud acclaim from Southport's most discriminating and vociferous audience, the park-keeper's chickens.

In the latter stages of the draw, the question was whether a formidable Bowdon contingent would be able to ward off John McCullough. In the event, the accuracy and determination of Colin Irwin triumphed. One has good grounds for suspecting that the Jubilee Tankard will by no means be the only trophy on the Irwin mantelpiece this season.

These Southport weekends are rapidly increasing in popularity, owing to the time and effort contributed by Paul Stoker and the rest of the club committee, to whom our thanks are due for a most enjoyable tournament.

forrential rain in the early hours of Saturday morning presented Tim Haste with a manager's nightmare; the lawns were so badly flooded that the whole day's play had to be abandoned. This proved to be an expensive washout for Andrew and Mary Collin, who went out and bought a new washing machine, and less unfortunate for those of us who found plenty of time to sample the delights of Higson's bitter before returning to work on the lawns.

Tim decided that his careful plans should not go to waste, and that by shortening the games in the Swiss he could still finish the Inumament about 5.30 on the Monday — and he did.

Once the lawns had drained, they were not particularly slow but still were more resistant than usual, favouring those players who need to "scoop to the hoop" from some distance away. (Your reporter began to gibber faintly when his opponent, handicap 10, produced the perfect approach to 3-back from first corner.) The balance was indressed by hoops which Paul Stoker set firmly at the correct width.

The manager had foreseen the need for extra baskets of bisques to rope with the unusual field on entry: all but one of the players were within the handicap ranges 0 to 41/2 or 10 to 16. The expert at pulling a fince of bisques artistically out of the ground was John Meads, who in five games gave 61 bisques, off which the opposition made 62 hoops. It must be said that these statistics are inflated by one apponent who took 10 bisques before a point was scored with an accidental peel of the partner ball. Club officials were watching John earefully: he did not break any hoops this time but did manage to wreck a chair — other clubs be warned.

The high bisquers did not perform well, which led to some very slow names when they played each other at the bottom of the Swiss. The lowest score, though not by very far, was six hoops to four on time, and double-bankers were kept waiting while some confusions were norted out between inexperienced players:

"Are they in contact?"

'Well, they're close enough to be in contact."

"But how can it be in contact if it missed?"

However, the experience will have done much more good for these players than playing gentle friendly games against each other every

While this was going on, the lower bisquers were playing very well, easing the manager's problems by finishing their games quickly. Of these, Martin Kolbuszewski (1½) and Colin Irwin (½) won their way into the semi-finals, where they were beaten by two improving players who know how to use their bisques, respectively Mike Wilkins from Chester and Barbara Sutcliffe from Ellesmere.

Mike is a cautious player, and he took some time in the final to establish a substantial lead. Barbara played as she had done in all her other games, with accurate strokes and a determined competitive spirit, to become the winner of the Jubilee Tankard. This was her first tournament apart from playing doubles in last year's Northern Championships, and we will follow her progress with interest, as her bold tactics and tidy breaks are sure to make their mark elsewhere.

And so another Southport tournament came to an end in the nearest to sunshine we had seen for a while, helping us to forget Saturday's disaster. Our thanks go to all who make the tournament possible. I wonder what sort of weather they intend to provide for the end of September . . . .

A strong field of 16 assembled for the second holding of this wholly 'best-of-three' weekend tournament, over half having handicaps of scratch or better. The lawns were in generally good condition and, never becoming so fast as to cause real difficulty, allowed plenty of rapid play. McCullough, Hilditch and Avery all had particularly quick first round wins before lunch on Saturday. Sue Sykes played extremely steadily to beat Hobbs in three and Phelps, a local player, scored an excellent win over the Chairman's Salver winner, Coward. Mulliner, the holder, finished three best-of-threes in one day in this event last year but was still locked in battle with Cordingley at teatime. This encounter was real 'match of the day' stuff. Mulliner had a triple going in the first game before betting hampered at hoop 4. Cordingley then picked up two excellent breaks and hit remorselessly to take the lead. He made an excellent start in game 2 as well although Mulliner eventually completed a neat triple to level matters. The final game was a copy of the first until Cordingley landed himself in rover trouble when about to win. Mulliner (for 5 and 4-back) elected to go for the triple and suffered the agony of peeling so cleanly through 4-back from 3 yards that the peelee 'went boundary' in the Antipodean vernacular. This proved fatal.

All four second round matches were notable in their way. McCullough and Avery traded triples but in both the final games McCullough's greater experience in the pegged out game proved decisive. Healy pegged out Cordingley in game 1 when a long way from home and, despite heavy betting against him 'Honest John' McC, your local bookie, eventually triumphed. However Cordingley won the second game easily and took a close final game as well. Hilditch 'vigour' proved only just too much for Griffith in a match that can fairly be described as eventful and Mrs Sykes really impressed by beating Phelps in straight games.

Cordingley and McCullough reached the final, the latter only just squeezing home against Hilditch. However, it was McCullough who took an early lead, reaching peg and penult before Cordingley hit, went round and started a triple. Unfortunately he cross-wired himself at penult and that was that. The second game began in similar fashion only this time Cordingley missed all his lift shots and McCullough became the second holder of the Southwick Salver without further ado. Both the finalists managed to display impressive consistency throughout the weekend coupled with interesting play and McCullough in particular should be pleased with the manner as well as the fact of his first win in top competition for two years.

Whiole the sheep (or do I mean goats?) were occupied in the main event, the losers enjoyed mixed fortunes. Mulliner managed a straight triple against Coward, Griffith player very well to beat Avery in three and Owen beat Arthur Tapp in what amounted to a Southwick club match. The unexpected absence of a competitor on Monday necessitated the formation of a 5-man American block in which Hobbs and Griffith emerged as winners.
