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

Too Good to be True?

It seemed quite like old times to be talking at Roehampton again of the "Best Ten." Perhaps, however, the ten on this occasion were not in fact quite the best, seeing that, apart from the unhappy circumstances which prevented Clement Watkins from competing (and his wife from continuing), three of the great team which represented England at Hurlingham were absent from the list. We can readily understand that there may be good reason, especially in so crowded a season as this, why players should feel unable to accept an invitation for this event. Yet it would really detract from the prestige and interest of this unique competition if it often failed to attract those best qualified to play in it. Nothing of what has just been said must be interpreted to suggest any reflection upon the remarkably high standard of play shown by those who came out at the top this year. John Solomon and Patrick Cotter can seldom have played better, indeed there are moments as we watch them that we wonder whether they are not playing too well for the good of the game! Elsewhere the question is raised whether croquet does not take too long to play, but looking on at our greatest players it often seems to us not to take long enough!

The Young Idea

Two years ago a writer in these pages ventured to suggest that in William Ormerod we might have "almost another John Solomon." The record of this young man (he is now, we believe, the same age as John was when he won the New Zealand Championship) as a Test Match and tournament player and as winner of the Surrey Cup, is such as not only to justify this position but to indicate that now the word "almost" might well be removed. What is perhaps most remarkable about Mr. Ormerod's rise is not even its rapidity, but that it should have been prepared for not at a Metropolitan centre among experts at the game, but at a provincial club with no minus players amongst its members. Indeed this player may almost be said (on the analogy of a famous artist and the rhinoceros) to have evolved his croquet out of his inner consciousness. No doubt we are here in the presence of an exceptional talent; yet Mr. Ormerod's prowess suggests to us how much our gameunderstandably enough—loses in skill, enterprise and nerve by the predominance in its contests of what are politely described as the" upper age groups." "Strive, strive, how so e're we strive," sang Belloc, "Youth declines at fifty-five." But now that the young men are coming along (for our hero is not the only one), may we not hope to see something of the young ladies? There were plenty of them at tournaments when Rover began the game.

Don't Just Drift!

Watching croquet this season has led one observer to the reflection that of all strokes in the game the most unprofitable is the long drifting

shot back to one's partner ball. Nothing is so difficult to achieve with accuracy; the ball goes too far, or not far enough, or on a rolly court may curve away at a most dismaying angle. The stroke, however, unlike most others, is one not to be practised but to be avoided; what does perhaps need to be practised are ways of avoiding it. For the long drift back is far more often than not the consequence of a lack of reasonable foresight. A common instance arises when one has to take off to separate two balls. In such a case if no hoop can easily be made so that a break can be begun and continued the player should never be content merely to croquet his adversary's ball away somehow, leaving himself a long return to his partner. He should either get a rush on one of them after having hit the other, and then take off to a favourable spot near his own ball, or arrange for a reasonably easy split shot which will take him to such a position. What many, even of the B class, to say nothing of higher bisquers, do not seem to realise is that accurate split shots are as necessary in laving breaks as they are in making them. And because such shots are not made from standard positions, they need even more care to achieve satisfactorily.

Shortened Games

The experiment of timed games at the Hurlingham tournament, together with Major Abbey's letter in our August issue, has brought prominently before croquet players the difficult question of whether the game of croquet as played today is too long to attract many new players. This, we think, is the crucial question and not that any change is primarily desired either to help managers or to shorten tournaments.

Doubtless the council will give consideration to the matter. It seems to us that there are two fundamental questions which must first be asked and answered. They are these: (a) is there a real and pressing need for the introduction of a shorter game, and (b) if there is such a need can the game of croquet be shortened in any way and still remain the same fascinating trial of skill that it is

Major Abbey's letter suggests that the answer to the first question is yes. Many are doubtful and few would go so far as to say that croquet will be dead in twenty years time if some change is not made (as we have on occasion heard it said). It is the natural inclination to say why not leave well alone and wait and see. Is this wise?

Still it would be far better to do nothing if the answer to our second question is no. This question seems to be even more fundamental than the first, for if croquet is to suffer by being shortened then let us make no mistake and know that there is nothing to be done about it.

We hope the matter will be given the close consideration that it deserves and will be fully discussed.

THE PRESIDENT'S CUP

September 10th-15th

THIS, the sixteenth competition for the President's Cup, was remarkable for two reasons; it was the first time since the last war that the original number of players-it was always known as "The Best Ten"—was reverted to; and never before had there been half that number our Test Match opponents playing for the International Trophy.

That fine New Zealand player, K. H. Izard, played in "The Best Ten" in 1914; and that very popular Australian, J. C. Windsor, had appeared in the competition in 1925 and 1937—in this last year he only failed to win the trophy because Miss D. D.

Steel won 13 games and he 12.

In this competition for the President's Cup it will be noted that more than one of the New Zealand Test Match team very considerably interfered with the progress of their opponents.

Miss I. Wainwright was the first to achieve this; and she applied her mallet with such consistent accuracy when playing E. P. C. Cotter that instead of his continuing in sequence from six games to seven, by her accurate play his score remained at six. Not content with this, Miss Wainwright again resorted to a concentrated attack on Cotter in the sixteenth round by which his score remained at 13 and hers went to 9.

Mrs. C. Watkins was the other New Zealander to take a game off Cotter; this was accomplished by first of all triple-peeling him and pegging him out. To the regret of every one, soon after this fine victory Mrs. Watkins was taken ill and was unable to continue in the competition. Such a sad occurrence as this had happened once before; in 1927, when W. Windsor Richards was obliged to retire

from the competition.

Dr. W. R. D. Wiggins had come back to form in this important event, finishing third. A notable game of his was that against G. Rowling in the twelfth round. Rowling had played fine croquet; but when for 4-back and the peg he accidentally hit it! Allowed later to proceed from that hoop, he failed to make the rover hoop. Wiggins by one accurate three-ball break-and another not quite in sequence-won the game. J. W. Solomon, in the eighth round, did a quadruple-but not the peg-out in sequence. In the next round he did the quadruple and the peg-out. There were several triple-peels accomplished; the 3 11/16 hoops seemed to place no bar to their completion.

As the competition neared its last few rounds, the scores of three players kept close togetherthose of Cotter, Solomon and Wiggins; at the 16th round it was a neck and neck affair between Cotter and Solomon—each player in sequence had

scores of 13, 14 and 15 games. This, of course, meant that, after the 18th

round these two players had to play a best-of-three match to decide which of them would be the 1956 winner of the President's Cup.

It was late in the afternoon when they met before a keen and interested group of spectators.

Solomon, though somewhat-for him-late in settling down to the first game, eventually played attractive croquet and won it, +14, embroidered by a triple peel.

The next game appeared, for quite a time, to be also his; Cotter, however, decided that one was enough, and he settled down to playing delightfully quick accurate croquet-winning this second game +15. We understand that it isat the time of writing-impossible to say if and when a third game will be played.

Mrs. G. J. Turketine carried out her duty as manager of both this event and the Surrey Cup, in her usual quiet-but very efficient manner. She had the help of several ladies during the week to whom also thanks are rendered.

The Surrey Cup

This comparatively new competition—in fact the second of its kind-was again kept to eight players—three of whom, M. Spencer Ell, Major I. W. Cobb and Col. D. W. Beamish, had played last year—Col. Beamish then being the winner with 11 games.

Of the other five players, W. P. Ormerod soon asserted himself-in fact it was not till the tenth round that he lost a game, Col. D. W. Beamish causing this long sequence of victories to cease. This fine player had only lost two games and finished second to Ormerod in the competition. Major Cobb was third with 7 games-and then R. Faulkner, who took some time to settle down to his true form, finished fourth.

That wonderful player, M. Spencer Ell, who finished second last year with 10 games, was not able to win more than half that number now.

It seems only fair to say something in conclusion about the weather; for by comparison with other important events on the Calendar of 1956notably the Open Championships-the week's croquet now under review was almost allowed to happen in the dry.

BRIDGE

COUTH, who was in the antique furniture Dusiness, dealt the following hand, and it is clear from his cards that he was a clever "dealer".

The score was love all and South, playing CAB opened the bidding with two Clubs, and north replied with three Clubs. This bid announces the Ace of Clubs but does not necessarily imply a Club suit. With a singleton Ace North would still bid three Clubs. Not knowing a conventional bid that would find out his partner's precise holding in Hearts, South decided to bid six Spades without more ado.

West made his natural opening of the King of Diamonds and South was in with the Ace, and gloomily surveyed the dummy. The promised Ace of Clubs was there but what a frozen asset! Now South was no palooka-he knew a thing or two about squeezes. So he thought that if he ducked a Heart he would create the impression that he was trying to "rectify the count." So he drew the trumps and led the two of Hearts, which West won with the Queen and, when East dropped the Knave he continued the suit, South false carding with the Ace. This did not fool East who knew that South must have started life with both Ace and King of Hearts. So on the continued trump leads East discarded all his Diamonds (to help West to count) and two small Clubs. Thus South had to concede a second heart loser and went one down.

Though it is satisfying to make a contract by a swindle if there is no other way, the declarer undoubtedly had a better line of play. His lead to the second trick should have been the two of Hearts. He wins any return by West and leads one, only one, round of trumps. Then he plays Ace and King of Hearts and if both opponents follow the suit has broken and all is well. If the Hearts are divided 4-2 then there is the extra chance that the holder of the remaining trump is also the holder of the four Diamonds and cannot trump. This is a safety play. As the cards were actually so divided this play would have brought home the bacon. Copyright

THE FOURTH TEST MATCH

August 20th-22nd

It may seem incredible, but it is true, that the above contest was given two of the three days without rain—in fact the sun shone on each of those days. There were many spectators keenly following the play.

The scene for the above match was set on the lawns of the Roehampton Club—for many years the Headquarters of the C.A.—and they reflected great credit on Wootton the head groundsman and his staff.

The first day's play resulted in our winning all three singles—two of them without the loss of a game—in the third Mrs. Watkins took the first from W. R. D. Wiggins. On Wednesday, the third day, Mrs. E. Rotherham was opposed to Mrs. W. H. Kirk. This was a match of quality, for both quite soon had clips on four-back in the first game; then Mrs. Kirk, playing well, seemed confident of putting her other on the peg—but a missed short roquet intervened and she lost it. The second game went to Mrs. Rotherham, though this too. was hotly contested; the scores were +16, +15. G. F. Stone had a very close first game against Miss I. Wainwright which she only lost +8; the second game went to Stone +17.

The third singles game was between A. G. F. Ross, captain of the New Zealand team, and J. Solomon; it attracted a big gallery of spectators. The first game was, wonderful to relate, remarkable for several errors from Solomon's mallet. Ross also just failed to hit shots—which would have opened the door to a break—by the proverbial hair's breadth; he lost the game +25. The second game was full of incident, both players having so

much play that the spectators were kept in a constant state of doubt as to who was going to win it. Solomon eventually was the winner, ± 3 .

Reverting to Tuesday, this was Doubles Day. The match, E. P. C. Cotter and J. Solomon v. A. G. F. Ross and Mrs. C. Watkins was keenly watched by the many spectators.

There was quite a long interval before either side made points. Solomon got going at last, and, of course, meant to finish the game with a triple—for Cotter had put his clip on 4-back; when for 3-back he let Ross in, but progress just failed. Cotter hit in and Solomon went out with a single peel +26. The second game also went to this pair, +24.

G. Rowling and Mrs. McKenzie-Smart provided the most thrilling match; their opponents were W. R. D. Wiggins and Mrs. Rotherham. The games were one-all; the third gave the spectators some excitement at the finish.

Rowling had been pegged out, and eventually Wiggins and Mrs. McKenzie-Smart were both for the rover hoop. With a lift due to Mrs. McKenzie-Smart, Wiggins elected to take position for the rover hoop.

The other ball, Mrs. Rotherham's was not more than 12 yards from Baulk A. Mrs. McKenzie-Smart hit this ball, approached the ball that had been left in position for the rover hoop, made her hoop, and went out to win the game +3.

The third Doubles Match went to Stone and W. P. Ormerod, after a rather long first game +13 +24.

Notes from the Clubs

Brighton

The Sussex County Croquet Club has just finished its third and last tournament of the 1956 season. It has been nice to welcome members of the New Zealand team to our open tournaments as well as others who have not played here before, notably the Ormerod brothers and Capt. Pullein Thompson and several ladies from Ryde. We hope to see them again. In spite of all our groundsman, Adams', efforts to get rid of worms last winter the very wet summer brought a heavy crop of worm casts. He has already begun to treat the worst lawn and will doubtless get on to the others when the season is over. Southwick District Council are almost ready to lay main drainage pipes under the path running parallel with the railway line. They promise that the lawns will not be dug up, but judging by the piles of earth excavated on the other side of the road where similar work is in progress, the three lower courts look like being covered with soil. We are hoping the work will begin early in October which should give us time to have the lawns back to normal by next season.

CORRESPONDENCE

Dear Sir.

In your September issue you invite high bisquers to give their views on the question of shortened games. I started croquet last year, so I have little experience and no inhibitions. My handicap is 7.

Before reading your correspondents' interesting letters on the subject, I had been conscious that my one complaint against the game was the length of time often taken to finish a game. Anything over three hours I become disinterested and often bored.

If a time limit is set, it is suggested that C and D class players should be allowed more time than the A and B class. It would appear, therefore, that there must be a bisque value in terms of time. Bearing in mind my inexperience, may I suggest 1 bisque—X minutes (perhaps five). To arrive at the number of X minutes allowed for a

game in excess of the agreed time, divide the joint handicaps by two. Perhaps something on these lines might be worthwhile considering.

I am also in favour of a shortened game in knock-ups, but not with 4 inch hoops. This form of game should quickly improve the standard of my class. We should find the "one hoop at a time" complex not good enough—perhaps Aunt Emma might even be forced into retirement.

One other observation if you will allow me, and here I expect to be torn to pieces, I do wish games could be played by some players in a more cheerful atmosphere. Everyone is so charming and helpful off the court—but I would like, sometimes, to hear a laugh on it!

Handicaps

As a result of reducing handicaps based on tournament results, there comes a time when the general standard is lower than desirable. In proof of this, the New Zealand team (apart from Mr. Ross) were ranked at minus 2, and practically no minus 2 in this country was able to beat them. When the writer went to Ireland with the English team, their standard was also found to be higher and the only player of our side to beat Mr. Duff Mathews, whose handicap was minus 1, was our present champion,

The suggested remedy is that every Associate should have his handicap increased by two bisques, which would regain the good standard of play expected in this country.

There will, of course, be some players, who might prefer to retain their present C.A. handicaps and the C.A. could easily arrange for this to be done on receipt of a post-card to that effect.

Necessity to reduce time taken in doubles, particularly handicap doubles

The average handicap double takes some 15 turns per side or 30 turns in all. Consultations are frequent and often occupy from one to three minutes. Assuming an average number of 30 turns and a loss of two minutes per turn, the game then becomes an hour longer than seems necessary.

The remedy suggested is that consultations by the out-players should be concluded while watching the last few strokes of the striker. Partners should be barred from subsequently going on court and conferring; with two

- (a) If the competitor about to play next finds his ball unexpectedly wired, then consultation on the court with his partner would be permissable.
- (b) Just before completing his turn, the in-player should allowed to ask his partner where he would like the balls laid.

A suggested modification to level play

It does not appear to be in the best interests of the game from either the players' or spectators' viewpoints, that A. should win a game by 26, possibly against an opponent of nearly equal skill and yet B. may never have taken croquet.

I realise that this is a controversial matter and hope that you may see fit to sound the opinions of other players, who have had more tournament experience than I have.

Nevertheless, the remed suggested is that if a player reaches 4-back before his opponent has made a hoop, then if in his second break he runs 4-back, his opponent should be allowed the option of a lift or contact. This would still permit the top-rank players to finish in two breaks by means of a triple-peel, and for such a high degree of proficiency they deserve that reward. On the other hand, it would go a long way towards giving the out-player a fair chance to show what he can do, as only a triple-peel would deprive him of contact at the end of his opponent's

Shortened games

Dear Sir.

Major Abbey in the August number asks for suggestions with a view to shortening games.


The time limited game does not appeal to us, because it often deprives players of the fascination and thrill of the

"end game" in a hard fought struggle, and because it . appears to offer an undue bias to a long bisquer.

Games likely to be unduly prolonged can be controlled under the present system whereby a Manager may at his discretion impose a time limit.

However, to initiate discussion, the following proposals

- A. Start all games at hoop 3, as is often done now for
- B. Modify the present lay out slightly by omitting one hoop, either 5 or 6 on a court 30 yards by 24 yards.



The sequence of play to be 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 1-back, 2-back, 3-back, 4-back-Rover-Peg.

The symmetry of the present lay out will unfortunately be somewhat disturbed, and the triple peel will (or may) be lost, but to the large majority of players the triple peel is almost a sealed book-and probably the pundits will find something, if the double peel does not satisfy.
