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Editorial

t two separate tournaments earlier this season I was aware of some incidents which seemed to me to be either somewhat unfair, or at least to warrant some form of discussion.

The first of these such events was the very late arrival of a competitor at a tournament. Fortunately for him it was not the Open Championsips, as if it had been he would have lost the game. As it happens it was simply an advanced weekend, but should that really make a difference? If there can be a lateness policy for one event should it not apply to all events?

My second question relates to the disappearing player. Or to be more precise, players who, on being knocked out of the main event, mysteriously find something better to do than play in the consolation event. The collection of excuses grows as each tournament passes, while those of us of a more cynical nature simply believe that the real reason for premature withdrawal from the event is in fact far more likely to be the protecting of the ever so important ranking points. Of course some will deny this. but it is strange that it is always the better players who set this poor example, and it is also unique to advanced events. Should players be able to continue in this self protecting way, which protects them from playing the rank and file tournament regulars, or should something be done to 'encourage' all players to play throughout consolation events as well as the main events? After all, we are all keen to see fairness in the use of the automatic handicapping system, but manipulation of the ranking system is far easier and serves a better purpose.

Which brings me round nicely to tournament entries. Why do advanced tournaments entries give preference to the better

Chairman's Column

Here we are again almost at the deadline date for the Gazette, and suddenly I realise no Chairman's column prepared. Guilty I am afraid, I have been playing croquet.

I would like to start this column by apologising to some clubs for not being able to accept various kind invitations to visit. Unfortunately the summer programme is already very full. I would have very much liked to be with you at Nailsea for the opening of your new pavilion but was already committed. I managed to see it two weeks later during a visit to the Bristol club. An excellent effort which I am sure will be appreciated by your members and also encourage new members to join. I even managed a short game during the visit.

One visit I did manage to make was to Ramsgate for their Schools day. After some very



ranked players? This might seem like a stupid question, but who is to say that one player's entry fee is better than anothers, and why should a player who believes he has been accepted for a tournament suddenly be told he hasn't been successful because someone with a higher ranking applied after him. Perhaps it is time all tournaments accepted entries on a first come first served basis, then everyone would know exactly where they stand.

My fourth and final question relates to the behaviour of individuals at tournaments. Let's say for example, that a player leaves a tournament before the final day without informing the manager of that event. This raises two points, firstly a severe lack of manners, and secondly the possibility that something may have actually happened to them but as nobody knows where they are staying how does one find out? (Perhaps we should think about leaving contact numbers with managers of events, as well as lists of car registrations at busy croquet car parks.)

Have we come to such a point in the game where perhaps a disciplinary committee is required? Or is it just time that lack of thought for others and lack of manners were challeneged more directly? There are some who have advocated the age of professionalism in croquet; as yet I am not one of those, I would much prefer to see the amateurs get it right.

Croquet Association AGM

The Annual General Meeting of the Croquet Association will be held at 11.00am at the Hurlingham Club on Saturday 17 October 1998. All associates are welcome to attend.

3rd World Golf Croquet ChampionshipLeamington Spa: 3rd - 11th October

England's four nominated players for Leamington Spa in October are Roy Edwards, Ivor and Richard Brand, and Syd Jones. Salah Hassan, World Golf Croquet Champion, will be defending his title, and Walid Mahmoud, last year's runner-up in Cairo, will also be competing. A strong challenge will come from the United States whose four players will be anxious to improve their 1997 rankings.

The Championship will be played as a preliminary all-play-all block competition, with 8 blocks of 6 players. All block matches will consist of single games. The top four in each block (32 players in total) will go through to the Championship knockout, where all the matches will be best-of-three games. A supplementary competition will run throughout the week to rank all players in order from 1 to 48.

All Championship matches will be played on the five Bowling Greens in Victoria Park, Leamington Spa, with additional matches being played on the two courts at Kenilworth Croquet Club. Players are expected from at least 12 countries.

In addition to forty nominated players, eight more players will qualify for places through qualifying competitions, one of which will be held at Kenilworth on Saturday, 22nd August. Additional qualifying competitions can be arranged to suit entrants from other parts of the country (contact Chris Hudson on 01270-820296). The entry fee per player will be £15, and the winner of each qualifying competition will have free entry to the Championship

A WCF Working Party has put together a set of Rules to be used in the qualifiers and at Leamington Spa. These Rules are broadly based on those used by the Egyptian CA. Rules from Australia, England, and the USA, have been studied to incorporate the best aspects of the game played in these countries.

The Championship "arena" and spectator facilities are being sponsored by Warwick District Council. Local school parties are being invited to watch the Championship and then try the game themselves on a small court nearby. The same court will be used for local corporate hospitality events.

A one-day course for potential Referees, to explain the new Rules and gain practical experience, will be held at Kenilworth on Saturday, 8th August. (This could be a useful first step for those wishing to become Association Croquet Referees.) Help will also be needed at the Championship with scoring, stewarding, and many other activities. Clubs or individuals who would like to get involved on a full or part time basis should contact Chris Hudson (01270-820296).

Biographical correction

Dear Editor

Eddie Hunt is an excellent living example of the appeal that croquet can have or all ages, as you say, but I am sorry that in a few respects I found the biographical article in the May 1998 issue of *The Croquet Gazette* slightly disappointing.

In the first place it is not pointed out that Eddie is the CA's oldest living Associate (by length of membership though not by age) having been given life membership in 1937. He is also enrolled as one of our Benefactors.

Leaving aside the question of whether Lord Tollemache might be regarded as legendary - so far as his croquet prowess is concerned he would not be classified as one of the really great players of the past and -whether his book is either "definitive" or the "first"- propositions which are open to dispute; it would have been to Eddie's credit, I think, to mention that in beating Maurice Reckitt in the fifth Test he obtained one of only three singles victories that the Australian side secured in the 1937 series. More importantly it ought not to be forgotten that the visit here in 1937 of Eddie and his fellow Australians, full of enthusiasm for rapid and enterprising play, provided the CA with a great deal of welcome publicity, for which it had a pressing need at that

The second photograph of the article is a bit of a puzzle. It cannot be, as stated, that of the teams for the 5th Test which took place at Southwick an 4th & 6th September 1937; one reason being that fact that Maurice Reckitt was a member of the team on that occasion. I believe it to have been taken at Hurlingham on the occasion of the 1st Test on July 12th & 13th 1937. Identification of the players in the photograph is not clear and in order to set the record straight for future historians still further the caption should, I think, have read as follows:-Back row: (left to right) J A McMordie (E), C F Colman (E), J C Windsor (A), Sir Francis Colchester-Wemyss (Manager), C J Miller (A Capt.) Front row; (left to right) E M Hunt (A), Lt Col W B Du Pre (E, Capt.) Miss A B Morrison (A), Miss D D Steel (E).



Well enough about tournaments for the present. All being well I hope to meet many more of you during my visits to Nottingham, Budleigh and Bowdon.

Turning to development matters. Two of the mini mats are now available for use, one in the north and one in the south. Originally it was hoped that most Federations would purchase one but only Croquet North and the South East made moves in this direction. As there has been interest only approved ball commercially available. Alan Pidcock is continuing with his development of the lawn speed measuring systems and will shortly have the laser levelling device available for clubs to borrow. It may look like a mini Dr Who's Dalek but unfortunately does not have the power to blast away all the hills on your lawns. Its duty is simply to tell you where all the hills and dales are and how big they are. Its accuracy is quoted as 1/4ins in 100ft and will be made available for any clubs to use for a very nominal fee.

It had been planned that the first club with a full-sized synthetic lawn, Bury St Edmunds, would be in operation by now but unfortunately organisational problems have delayed the start of the project.

One question that crops up regularly at my own club and I am sure at many others which hold tournament is 'What are the full ingredients for a successful tournament?' As you all well know, some tournaments are oversubscribed as soon as published but others only stagger through with very poor entries. Is it the format, the club facilities, the lawns, the manager, the bar, the home-made cakes etc or a combination of everything? Please let us have your thoughts on this subject.

May I wish all croquet players a successful season. Please remember this is your Association so please don't complain in your local bar, bring your soap boxes into the Gazette or write to me personally if you have a pet subject to air. And finally, I would like to remind all Associate Members that the closing date for nominations for the vacancies on Council this year is I August.

~ Obituaries ~

John Exell 1907 - 1998

John Exell died on Good Friday morning. His enthusiasm for croquet was unparalleled and he was a much loved member of the Cheltenham Club. which he joined in 1978. John was 91, and had entered to play in our Easter Tournament. As his son said at his funeral tribute, John's first act in heaven was to send down an unseasonal snowfall to ensure that, without him, the tournament could not start.

John had a long and successful career as a farmer in Dursley. His competitive spirit was evident even in those days. He won the coveted 'Berkley Exam' for young farmers in 1929, and had a long association with the Berkley Hunt Agricultural Society, winning many prizes for his cattle. He retired from farming in the 1970's and devoted himself with equal enthusiasm to favourite leisure activities, including horse racing, croquet

John was nearly seventy when he discovered croquet, made rapid progress and soon competing in tournaments all over the country. Some of his successes are recorded in the photograph on the cover of an issue for the Croquet gazette, showing him surrounded by the 9 trophies he had won aged 86 in 1993. He was very proud of this and enjoyed showing off the photo to non-croquet players. He probably derived even greater satisfaction from his win (aged 89) in the family doubles in the July tournament of 1996 with his grandson Tim. This was a remarkable feat, as he had won the title twice before: with his wife Doreen in 1979 and with his son David in 1980.

John was the despair of managers! Young players half his age would come to the Manager's table at the end of a game and say 'Please can you let me have a little rest? I'm completely exhausted.' John, however, would arrive - even before he had taken a restorative drink at the bar - and urge one to find him another game quickly. While other competitors were having to be chivvied into not lingering too long over their lunches. John would have to be coaxed into taking a short break to give his nonagenarian digestion a sporting chance. Towards evening, when most other players would be straining to get home, John would be hoping for yet another game.

He was a delightful and determined opponent, always difficult to beat, especially when he became a young bandit again (with a handicap of 18 or 20), but always a generous adversary with a warm personality.

The world of croquet has lost a sprightly and colourful character, who will continue to be sadly missed.

Jean was a very talented person, especially as a pianist, and at creating pictures in needlepoint, and chose to be a wonderful home-maker.

At Southwick Jean is remembered, with her late husband Colin and several others, as one of the group who did all the catering, gardening in the border, and maintenance of all the buildings in the 1980's. This included carpentry, cleaning, and painting the Pavilion - cladding had to be painted annually. Nothing was outside her capabilities.

As well, she was a good average Croquet player and very keen to encourage and help beginners; her family are giving a Cup in her memory for the Most Improved Player.

Jean is sadly missed by all who knew her.


New pavilion, new future at Nailsea

The magnificent new pavilion at Nailsea and District Croquet Club was opened officially by Dr Liam Fox MP on 8th May 1998. After many years of struggling with a summerhouse, where teas, coffee and meals were prepared and one garden shed where equipment was stored, the club now boasts an attractive brick built building providing luxury facilities, including a large kitchen, clubroom, changing rooms, a store for machinery and to the relief of all members and visitors - toilets! But no bar.

After months of preparations and planning by the committee, at last the day came. Flowers adorned the pavilion, caterers were in the kitchen at 8am preparing lunch for about 60 visitors. The lawns were cut, lines were whitened, car parking signs erected and flags hung over the door. Ribbons were tied across the door in readiness for the official cutting. Midday came and visitors arrived, many in 'whites', and the atmosphere was full of excitement as guests chatted together. After a welcome speech by our Chairman, David Murphy, the ribbons were cut and Dr Liam Fox declared the pavilion open. We then enjoyed a marvellous spread followed by an exhibition match played by Martin Murray and Bernard Neal against Kristian Chambers and James Dixon, our young champion players. The game was introduced by John Solomon, president of the Croquet Association, and was eventually won by the youngsters +12.

The pavilion has been a vision in the minds of members for over 10 years and it is a great achievement, thanks to the grant from the Lottery Sports Council fund, and to past members' work in raising the 35% of money

needed to allow the club to apply for the grant so many congratulations to all who were involved in the project. Special mention should be made of John Jeffrey, recently chairman of the club, now our president, who had the vision, masterminded the project and worked very hard to make sure the building was to the very highest standards, and also made many of the internal woodwork fittings. Club members helped with interior painting, laying floors, and cleaning up when the builders eventually finished.

Already the club is attracting new members who are benefiting from the facilities. We held our first open day on April 1st which coincided with a visit from our local radio team. 16 members of the public came, and in spite of pouring rain all of the time, all signed up for coaching. Radio Bristol gave us 13 minutes on

air! A second open day was held in May and due to a massive publicity campaign on local television, radio, posters, fliers etc we attracted nearly 40 visitors, 27 of whom enrolled for coaching. So we now have a mammoth task to teach all of these beginners the mysteries of croquet, and to encourage them to join the club

The opening of the pavilion is a new beginning for the club and is just the start of more years of hard work to improve the four lawns to enable us to host more tournaments, and to continue to increase our membership and the profile of the Nailsea club. We cannot sit back and think the hard work is now done, but it is certainly a great leap forward in the history of a club which was only established in 1981.

- 3. A report on the meeting of the World Croquet Federation at Bunbury, Western Australia in November 1997 was received from Colin Irwin and it was learnt that:-
- (1) Belgium, Spain and Palestine had been admitted as observer memers of the WCF:
- (2) work is being done by the WCF (a) to

simplify and clarify the Laws with the intention that an internationally acceptable revised edition shall be adopted in 1999 and (b) to standardise the basis for qualifying as a referee and so enable persons in countries other than Great Britain, New Zealand and Australia to be trained and become appropriately qualified: (3) a Golf Croquet working party is to be set up by the WCF to consider, inter alia, the problem of the four different sets of rules already existing - here, in Australia, in New Zealand and in Egypt.

Council agreed to a proposal that Chris Clarke be appointed World Croquet Federation Liaison Officer to be a focal point of contact with the WCF, to be the channel of communication between the CA and the WCF, and to act to strengthen the CA's relations with the WCF.

4) In order to meet the requirements of the English Sports Council the Executive Committee recommended and Council adopted the following Statement on Equal Opportunities

Croquet is a game where men and women, old and young, can and do compete together. The Croquet Association welcomes this position. Membership of the Association is open to all classes of person, whether or not croquet players, on payment of the relevant annual subscription and it is the policy of the Association not to discriminate on grounds of gender, age, race, nationality, or religion. Treasurer's Comments on the 1997 Accounts

In 1997 subscription rates rose for the first time in several years and payment by direct debit was introduced. Thanks in large measure to the excellent response of Associates to both these changes, the financial situation of the CA improved markedly through the year and significant strides were made towards self-sufficiency, i.e. a position where income *excluding* Sports Council grants (which will cease after 1998) covers expenditure.

Major changes also occurred in expenditure. Following the termination of the post of National Development Officer, the CA has started to formulate a more diverse development policy. This is reflected in more financial support for federations and clubs and in a greater allocation to general publicity and development activities. The more favourable finacial outcome has also enabled Council to set aside, by transfer to special funds, some £6,500 extra in 1997 for future development and international activities.

TIMES PAST

This new, and hopefully regular, feature will dip into past issues of the Gazette to re-visit the topical or otherwise writings of another day.

he Gazette of June 1948 reported the Annual General Meeting held at the Roehampton Club on 11 May, during the Peels. Introducing the Council's first motion, the Rev G F H Elvey

"... said that requests had been received from New Zealand and South Africa for a change of name which would emphasise the more serious and scientific character of the game. The two Dominions favoured 'Lawn Billiards', but the suggestion found little favour elsewhere. The Council had given the matter serious consideration and had come to the conclusion that 'Association Croquet' would meet the need

for stressing the difference between the game which existed in the popular imagination and the game for which the Association was responsible. He hoped that Associates would put aside any personal prejudice and vote for a change which would help recruiting. The notion to adopt 'Association Croquet' as the official name of the game was seconded by Mr E P Duffield and carried with three dissentients."

The July issue reported the results of the Inter-County Championship, played at Hurlingham a fortnight later. Seven counties competed, the winners being Surrey "... who have now won the Inter-County Championship 10 times in all, thus establishing a record. The nearest number of successes to this had been attained by Middlesex, who, up to 1939, had won this Championship 9 times."

The Editorial Notes in the same issue

included a comment headed simply 'The Out-Player':

"There is a great art in playing the role of the out-player, coming second only in importance to that of his opposite number, the in-player. He, indeed, gets most of the limelight, for he is actually on the stage in the full glare of publicity.

The out-player should be definitely 'off stage', and out of sight - particularly that of the in-player who might easily be robbed of the most important, the most critical point in the play if he catches but a glimpse of the shadow of the out-player.

Yet we have seen an out-player walking restlessly around the court, sometimes almost on the court, unable to control his chagrin at not being allowed by his opponent to come on the court and show him that he can play quite as well - if not better.

The out-player should be unseen and unheard, and must only come on the court when he sees that his opponent's turn has definitely ended."



Harrow Oak Handicap Weekend 13-14 June



discrimination policy in favour of particular groups but reduced subscriptions are available for both young players and veterans.

Under its constitution the first object of the Association is to encourage, promote and develop the game. Accordingly, so far as is possible within its financial and human resources, it will seek the establishment of playing facilities throughout the country and the availibility of information and coaching to as many as possible.

5) Council also considered alternative proposals from the Executive committee which were designed to meet a further requirement of the English Sports Council and agreed the following Statement on Conflicts of Interest:-CA Statement on Conflicts of Interest

Council adopts the following policy

"Recognition that Council and Committee members or their immediate families may conduct business with the Governing Body subject to the following procedures being put in place".

The following operational procedures will be established:

"A register of interests will be completed by all Council and Committee members, covering their own and family interests;

Committee standing orders will include directives on the conduct of Council and Committee members at meetings where the member has an interest in an item for discussion and/or decision;

Executive Committee members will not be allowed to represent their personal and/or commercial interests in discussion with the Governing Body;

Where contracts are let out on a regular basis, there may be a requirement for a commercial panel to undertake routine negotiations on behalf of the Council and its Committees. This panel will exclude members who may have a conflict of interest".

6)The final report of the Planning Group was received and action taken as recorded on pages 10 and 11 of The Croquet Gazette of May 1998. 7) Council agreed a recommendation from the Executive Committee that the award of a Council Medal should be instituted to enable outstanding services to the CA to be suitably recognized; and on the proposal of Roger Bray, seconded by Dennis Shaw, Council further agreed with acclamation that the first recipient of the medal should be Don Gaunt in recognition of his many years' work as compiler of the CA Fixtures Book.

8) The budget for 1998 and the Accounts for 1997 were adopted.

9) The increase in subscription rates and CRF for 1999 were approved.

10) Further points of interest arising from the routine reports of the Standing Committees:-

F&GP - Parsons Green Club having generously offered accommodation, many committee meetings will in future be held there instead of in the CA office.

Tournaments - Ian Plummer was authorized to place CA tournament details on the Oxford Croquet Web page until the CA's own web page was established.

Development - i) A grant of £500 will be available to each federation wishing to purchase a mini indoor carpet. ii) Grants have been made to Chester, Zeneca Huddersfield, Pendle, Bury and Medway clubs and funds have been made available to five federations to assist them in their development plans. iii) A ramp and ancillary equipment to measure court surface speed have been purchased.

Publicity - i) The CA now has an e-mail address, viz, CAOFFICE@CROQUET.ORG.UK ii) An information notice for club noticeboards will be circulated regularly to CA registered clubs. iii) A Public relations seminar will be held in November for all Federation and club press officers.

Equipment - The new Jaques 'solid state composition' balls, at their current state of development, have failed to meet the test criteria and cannot be recommended for championship use. Jaques are being encouraged to continue the development of these balls although this may

take some time to complete. For next year the only ball which can be recommended at present for championship play is the Barlow GT ball.

Coaching - i) Bruce Rannie is now the administrator of the Merit Award Scheme. ii) The "Coach of the Year Award" has been made to Tim Haste. iii) A Golf Croquet Coaching qualification is to be developed. iv) The coaching handbook is to be updated.

Handicap - The new style handicap card will be brought into use in the 1999 season.

Trophies - i) A wooden shield trophy has been purchased for the Junior championship handicap event. ii) A redundant trophy, the Council Challenge Cup, has been reallocated as a perpetual trophy for the winter indoor tournament. iii) Council decided to make no change in its policy of not insuring the CA's trophies.

International - The proposed 14 point WCF World Team Championship in South Africa will not now take place.

Golf Croquet - i) The trial Golf Croquet handicap system will be continued during 1998. ii) The Egyptian Rules of Golf Croquet will be published in a future issue of the Croquet Gazette.

11. A detailed proposal was made by Syd Jones that the CA should support the holding of a golf croquet world championship in England in late 1998 or early 1999. Council had doubts about the funding available for the event and agreed only to support the proposed plans in principle with no financial risk to the CA being involved.

12. The Secretary reported that 12 Associates had resigned and one had died since the last meeting. Council confirmed the election of 47 new Associates. As at 12th March the number of Associates was stated to be 1648, included in this figure are 97 who have not yet renewed their membership for 1998 and 64 overseas members.

13. The Secretary also reported that he had recently visited club events at Letchworth, Pendle and High Wycombe. Since the start of the year two new clubs have registered with the CA and one club has registered again after an interval of not being registered.

at 4-back. "Of couse" says his partner, "what are you waiting for?" "OK" Bang - missed the twofoot roquet - walks back off the lawn. Partner says "I thought when you said a TPO you meant a triple peel on the opponent" "No" says witty bystander "He meant Totally Pee'd Off!"

The men's and women's singles championship started on Thursday with yet more rain and the ceaseless wind. The women's championship had an entry of 11 this year which is a great improvement on recent years. It did not go to form however, with both the first seed Laa Laa and the second seed Shona Vaissiere going out on the first day. Last year's winner Bo Harris fell at the second hurdle and the final was contested between Frances Ransom and Beatrice

The final got off to an unusual start. After the toss Beatrice elected to start and Frances chose black and blue. As the clips were being placed on the first hoop it was noticed that the hoops had not been reset after mowing. The ROT was called and all the hoops reset. Beatrice then started the game but with the black ball. Frances intervened and the yellow ball was placed in corner 1. Frances put black in corner 3. Beatrice took croquet from yellow and attempted a speculative approach to hoop 1 sending yellow south of hoop 2 but failing to get position. Frances took off from corner 3 but also failed to get in front of hoop 1 and retired to corner 3. Beatrice hit in and went to 4-back. Fances hit the lift shot and went to 4-back. A quick first game looked in prospect as Frances got a break together but broke down at hoop 3. There then followed a long period with slow progress before the sparring match was finally won by Beatrice and she took the first game +8.

The second game started much more conventionally. Beatrice got going with a 3 hoop 2-ball break but broke down as soon as she picked up a third ball. Frances went to 4-back. the lift was missed and after a little to-ing and fro-ing, Frances went on to win the second game

The final game was a much more protracted affair with both players showing signs of nerves and tiredness. Both had opportunities to make breaks early in the game but all failed after a few hoops. Eventually Beatrice got to peg and rover but failed to get position in front of rover. She took a risk and laid up by rover. Frances, with both balls on hoop 4, hit the lift shot and went to 4 -back. Beatrice missed the lift and Frances took the other ball to 3-back before breaking down. 20 minutes later she made 4-back, missed the roquet and Beatrice played with her peg ball, completely forgetting the lift. She pegged out Frances' forward ball thus leaving peg and rover versus penult. The game finally finished in the last turn after time had been called with Frances making penult and shooting at Beatrice's balls (now both for peg) joined on the west boundary by hoop 1. She hit and finished a worthy but exhausted +2 winner.

26 competitors took part in the men's championship with the seeded players being Robert Fulford, Steven Mulliner, Phil Cordingley

and Colin Irwin. All negotiated the first two rounds successfully but then Steven Mulliner was defeated by James Hawkins in a high quality game -17tp, +17tp, +24tp. One of the best games in the early rounds was the second game between Robert Fulford and Peter Trimmer. Peter played first, Robert hit and split the balls to just in from corner 2 and corner 4. Peter roqueted the ball into corner 2, took off to corner 4, split the balls towards hoop 2 and in front of hoop 1 and then took the 3-ball break to 4- back. Robert hit with the fourth ball and went to 4-back, peeling Peter's ball from 1 to 3. Peter hit the lift and embarked on the triple. He completed all the peels with a straight at rover but couldn't make rover. Robert

The men's final was a best of five between Robert Fulford and Phil Cordingley. Again there was an unusual start to the match. Robert laid the 'supershot' tice, Phil put a ball just outside corner two, Robert shot at this and missed, leaving a double. Phil shot at the double and missed. Robert then played the black attempting an open cannon to put yellow into the lawn and get the rush on red. Black however 'fell' off the lawn. Phil then stuck in hoop 1 and Robert went to 4-back. After the missed lift shot Robert embarked on a triple but came to grief at hoop 5, not before 'popping' Phil through 1 and 2. Phil went to 4-back and in his next turn took his other ball to peg. Robert missed but Phil failed to finish and Robert finally took the first game after 2 hours.

In the second game Robert went to 4back on the fourth turn. Phil hit the lift but once again failed at hoop 1. Robert missed, then Phil failed at hoop 2. Robert missed, Phil ran hoop 2 and missed the return roquet and Robert finished with the obligatory triple peel. ("What makes the game so trivial to some and so difficult to others?" mused a spectator.)

yards, played a magnificent split peg-out going to David's ball and taking the Du Pre Cup by 1.


