REPORT OF COUNCIL

At a Special Meeting of the Council held at Hurlingham at 2.15 p.m. on 23rd May 1966 in accordance with Rule XIV - the following Resolutions already approved by Council and published in the April issue of "Croquet" No. 96 were confirmed and became law.

- (1) That a sub-paragraph (g) be added to Law 38 "At the conclusion of a turn the striker must give clear indication of his intention before taking bisque or a half bisque. If he fails to do so but continues to play, the provision of Law 27 shall apply. When all balls have been replaced the striker shall have the option whether or not to take a bisque or a
- (ii) That the following shall be added at the end of Regulation 22 (a) - "but in any event which lasts for two weeks or longer a player shall play at his current handicap."

It is regretted that in the June issue of Croquet on page 3. a notice pursuant to Rule 14 relating to Law 38 and Regulation 22(a) appeared. This notice was intended to have been inserted in the April issue and, as will be seen from the above announcement, is incorrect. The amendments had already been ralified at the Special Meeting above.

NOTES by ROVER

' ... they only fade away'.

WHILE OUR obituary columns have all too often lately reminded us that we cannot say that our old players never die, it is no less true that most of them fade away before they do, and so become-only too naturally yet regrettably - forgotten. This is not only unjust to them, but it tends to give a distorted perspective to the history of our game. In an otherwise admirable article appearing recently in Country Life Mr. Francis Byrne showed himself quite clearly unable to believe that any players from the past could meet those of our best today with any hope of victory. Few. if of our best today with any hope of victory. Few, if any, of our readers would, I think, accuse this column of lack of appreciation of the fine croquet being played by our 'younger generation' between the ages of thirty-seven and seventeen. But curiosity has been leading this Rover to take a look at the competitors in the 'Best Ten' during the four years from 1911 to 1914. From these he has extracted the following list: Leslie O'Callaghan, Cyril Corbally, Duff Mathews, Keith Izard (of New Zealand origin), Herbert Corbally, Maxwell Browne, Reginald Beaton, Lilias Beaton, Edgar Whitaker, H.W.J. Snell - play of all of whom (except Maxwell Browne) he well remembers. Assuming all of these to be playing as they did for many years, it is at least open to question whether a side composed of them would lose to a Best Ten of today, and half of them could not be left out of any President's Cup now. The fact that we have so many splendid players at this moment is a proof not necessarily of previously unheard of standards of play but rather of the unfailing vitality of our great game throughout half a century.

No room on the courts

Reflection suggest that associates may soon be - if they are not already - made aware of a problem for which there seems to be no obvious solution, in the immediate future at any rate. As the efforts of our zestful propagandists bear fruit more and more neophytes are likely to be brought into the game and induced to aspire to become tournament players. A laudable ambition indeed. But the fact is that once midsummer is passed, tournament entries tend to become increasingly congested, with the result that competition in respect of our Calendar Fixtures begins even before players have a chance to appear on the courts. We have already heard of at least two clubs who have had regretfully to return entries, in one case even before its programme had opportunity to appear in this journal. The problem is not altogether a new one, but it was less serious in prewar days because though we had many more associates then, we had, in most weeks of the season, several alternative fixtures between which they could choose. What is - or ought to be - becoming clear is that the future of Croquet does not depend solely on increasing the number of those who want to play it; it may be determined at least as much by a capacity to increase the 'wide open spaces' on which they may do so. More tournaments, and more courts at those now so popular, is what we need. How we are to get them is, as the Americans say, 'something else again'.

To seed or not to seed?

THIS IS a question which continues to be debated every year by players, and the debate annually reaches a climax after the Draw for the Open Championships. This Rover is in favour of seeding and is writing this before The 1966 Draw has been made. This note, however, will appear after the Champion-This note, however, will appear after the Champion-ships have been drawn and played and after all aggrieved players, if any, have enjoyed their full quota of moans around the events. The suggestion is that seeding in the first place, should be confined to the Open Singles Championship; and that the seeding authority should be identical with the body responsible for selecting the three "Fights". sible for selecting the three "Eights", a responsibility to be performed shortly thereafter. Indeed, the only subsequent play which could influence the selectors is The Hurlingham Club Tournament. It is suggested that the selectors should be directed to seed four top players jointly and that those players should then be drawn into their respective quarters of the full draw. It is further suggested that, at their discretion the selectors should be entitled to seed another four players jointly who again should be drawn into their respective positions. respective positions.

Contrary to popular believe, this is what used to happen at Wimbledon. The players who were seeded five, six, seven and eight were until very recently drawn into their respective divisions of the full draw.

This is not so hard on the lesser lights as might at first sight appear. A player toppled by a giant of the game in the first round of the Opens is not likely to be toppled by a second giant, who has himself been toppled by a third giant, in the first round of the Association Plate. The result might well be to give players a greater opportunity to play themselves into a position in The Chairman's Cup or The Surrey

Croquet And How To Play It

By David Miller and Rupert Thorp Faber and Faber 28s

THERE IS at present a welcome upsurge of interest in croquet, and it is an especially healthy sign that many young players are discovering the attractions of the game. To maintain the momentum of this advance a text aimed at the beginner who wishes to progress to the A class was needed, and so the appearance of this book, written by two young and able exponents of the game, is most timely.

The authors are to be congratulated on their advocacy of enterprising play, which they are careful to distinguish from recklessness. Croquet suffers from the existence of players, often regrettably successful, whose tactics are almost wholly negative. It is to be hoped that the young men and women who are encouraged to take up croquet as a result of reading this book will not take such players as their model but will instead absorb and apply the excellent advice offered on tactics. The positive attitude of striving to win matches rather than merely to avoid losing them, which permeates this volume, is the way to full enjoyment of the game.

It is necessary to penetrate well into the book before arriving at the descriptions of four - and three-ball breaks. However, a book which can be understood by the complete beginner must present a certain irreducible minimum of information about the court setting, terminology, rules and strokes before breaks can be dealt with, so that this delay in reaching the heart of the game is at least partly inevitable. The interpolation of an early chapter on golf croquet was perhaps unwise, but the authors suggest that the geography of the court and some aspects of stroke production will be learnt more readily by playing the simple game first.

A wholly praiseworthy feature is the clarity of the explanation of the standard four-ball break, which is achieved by the liberal use of diagrams. Beginners have great difficulty in following purely textual

descriptions of breaks when the court layout and terminology are not yet deeply ingrained. The excellent chapter on tactics is also made easy to follow by the use of further diagrams.

The wisdom of the authors in departing from accepted nomenclature in describing the basic structure of the game may be questioned. Terms such as qualifying and bonus shots are used to explain the entitlement of a player to a series of strokes in a turn. That these terms are helpful in the text cannot be denied.

However, the terms used in the rules are universally used amongst established players, and confusion will result if new ones become part of the vocabulary of beginners.

As stated in the introduction, the book starts from scratch and finishes at scratch, and so no breaks involving peels are described. This limited objective is entirely reasonable, but it is a pity that the existence of peeling breaks and their purpose is given no more than a passing reference. For the fact that double and triple peels are played, and that occasionally quadruples, sextuples, and even three-ball triples are achieved, shows that the higher flights of the game call not only for exceptional ability in stroke production but also for a great deal of tactical skill and imagination. The inclusion of even a brief description of these possibilities would have provided a further opportunity of conveying the challenge of the game.

Players already in the A class will perhaps not expect to find much material of interest in this book, which was not written with them in mind. Despite this, many established players might profit by reading this book and thereby revising the fundamentals of the game. Indeed, this reviewer has already benefitted by pondering the excellent advice given on the most fundamental question of all, how to hit the ball. But for a clear and concise exposition of the game for the beginner with ambitions to reach the A class, this book can be most highly recommended. The price of 28s is reasonable in view of the large number of line diagrams provided, which add so much to the value of the descriptions, and it is to be hoped that the book will find its way onto the shelves of many students of the game.

REPORT & RESULTS OF CALENDAR FIXTURES

The finalists in the Abbey Cup, both in the Draw and Process. are Dudley Hamilton-Miller and Leslie Kirk-Greene, the former eventually winning two close and exciting games, in both of which Kirk-Greene looked to be "home and dry" in the closing stages, but the missing of a relatively straightforward penultimate hoop in the first game reversed the balance and Hamilton-Miller made no mistake, going round and out in the next turn from the fifth hoop. In the second game, when his opponent's clips were on the peg and fourback, Kirk-Greene hit in and made an all round break from the second hoop, he pegged out Hamilton-Millar's blue ball and in his next turn established a three-ball break which took him one-back. By some accurate wiring he proceeded to four-back, and then, having made this and the penultimate, laid up by the first hoop, forgetting that there was a "lift" !

Hamilton-Miller hit the six-yard shot and finished the game, having at this point only the rover hoop to make.

The B Class Opens was won by Maj. R. Driscoll who was in good form throughout the week and also reached the final of the Handicap Singles where the unaccustomed experience of receiving instead of giving bisques upset the rythm of his play in the early stages of this game and allowed Hamilton-Miller to establish a commanding lead; but a late spirited challenge and a missed peg-out enabled Driscoll to cut the gap to 7 points, before Hamilton-Miller hit the peg.

D. E. Buckland had the misfortune to sprain a wrist in the final of the B Opens and was forced to retire.

A level game took on a suddenly exciting aspect in its closing stages, which were fraught with misfortunes and break-downs on both sides, while Mrs Temple endeavoured to make her last two hoops and then peg out Mr. Roper's ball, and Mrs Karmel endeavoured to obtain the opportunity to make her rover hoop. Finally, after many hair-raising adventures, Mrs Karmel judged a long approach shot to perfection and the game was won! Under the expert and ever-considerate management of Maj. Dibley, all went smoothly to a well-timed finish on Saturday afternoon, including an extra Event, won by Mrs G.W. Solomon who had a good week and in this final (to quote her opponent, W. B. C. Paynter) "played superbly". A mention must also be made of the three fastest games played during the week, all completed within 65 minutes; by Maj. Driscoll against Miss K. D. Hickson; by Mrs W. A. T. Synge against Lady Ursula Abbey (and this while suffering from an attack of jaundice!); and by Lady Ursula Abbey against W. B. C. Paynter,

Finally, a heart-felt tribute of thanks to Mrs Chittenden, with Miss Hazel Parker and helping staff in attendance, for those "five-star" lunches and teas, and to Miss G. V. Pirie, to whom Mr Scott in an eloquent prize-giving speech referred, for dispensing of "liquid refreshment" in the bar!
